POSITION OPEN: RESOURCE CENTER LIBRARIAN

Job Description: Resource Center Librarian serving the 9 full-time faculty and approximately 165 full-time and part-time students of the School of Library Science, University of Wisconsin--Milwaukee. This person is primarily responsible for the selection and general administrative supervision of a collection of materials and of a clerical and student staff supporting master's level instruction in library and information services. The Resource Center Librarian also provides liaison to the University Library in selecting and recommending library science materials for the University's collection; serves as information specialist for the Library Science faculty and students, conducting literature searches and developing bibliographies to support the teaching, research, and service activities of the School; demonstrates the use of OCLC and data base terminals; supervises the SLS audio-visual equipment inventory and its use; and acts as the School's public information officer, including preparation of an annual report. This appointment is for 75% of full-time; hours are negotiable.

Qualifications: Bachelor's degree from a recognized university or college; master's degree in library science from a presently accredited program; at least one year of library experience, preferably in an academic setting or in a special library; competence in the use of OCLC and data base terminals.

Salary and Benefits: Annual appointment of 75% time, with one month vacation; beginning salary of \$9,728-12,160 (full-time rate \$12,971-16,412); usual fringe benefits.

Terms of Appointment: Initially from July 1, 1979, through June 30, 1980, with possibility of renewal.

General Information: The School of Library Science, UWM, was organized in 1966 to serve the State of Wisconsin and, more particularly, its heavily populated southeastern sector, by educating professional personnel for urban libraries and information centers. The School achieved American Library Association accreditation of its master's program in 1976. It is interested in adding staff who want to be part of a school serving a metropolitan area. Many of the School's students are employed by local libraries and attend classes on a part-time basis.

The University of Wisconsin--Milwaukee is one of only two University of Wisconsin campuses offering a full range of higher education opportunities. It enrolls approximately 25,000 students annually and maintains a central city campus which encourages the attendance of commuters and part-time students. 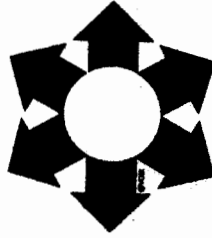

OCLC Inc. is a not-for-profit corporation based in Columbus, Ohio serving many libraries throughout the country through a computerized network which was the first major network of its kind. OCLC has two basic objectives - to reduce per unit processing costs in library technical operations and to increase the effectiveness of library resource sharing among the nation's libraries.

This short course is designed for librarians who have the MLS level of formal academic preparation and who are not presently working in a library which is participating in the OCLC system. There will be a maximum of actual experience for each participant to use the terminals for searching services and to practice on-line cataloging.

Topics covered during the course will include general knowledge of OCLC services and products; considerations for planning to become an OCLC member; implementation of OCLC in technical services operations; effective use of OCLC through on-line searching, cataloging and editing; and, understanding and evaluating OCLC subsystems for interlibrary loan, acquisitions and serials control.

Participants in this short course will have a good general understanding of OCLC after the four days and should feel comfortable sitting at the computer terminal to actually use the system. The University of Wisconsin—Milwaukee Library is making computer time available for students in this course to practice using the on-line features of the system.

Instructors:

Russell Evans: Chief catalog librarian, Carroll College since 1969. M.A.L.S. from the University of Minnesota. Part-time instructor at the UWM School of Library Science.

Tamara Miller: Coordinator, Wisconsin Library Consortium since 1976. MLS from Kentucky with academic and public library experience. She is responsible for all service to WLC members including training, planning, initial installation of OCLC and on-going support of cataloging, serial control and automated interlibrary loan activities.

Ted Samore: Professor and instructor of cataloging and classification at the University of Wisconsin—Milwaukee School of Library Science since 1966.
