This is a practical course for library managers and/or librarians who need to sharpen their health science library management skills. The session is via ETN from 10:00-11:50 A.M.

WHSLA BY-LAWS

The By-Law Committee (Jacobsen, Hawkins, Zimmerman) has completed its work on revision of the WHSLA By-Laws. The proposed changes will be reviewed at the Business Session of the Annual meeting October 19, 1979. The final hearing of the By-Laws-- including amendments proposed at the meeting, will be mailed to the membership for ratification. The revised By-Laws would take effect after the membership has been polled, probably around January, 1980.

The principal charge of the By-Laws Committee was to review and/or update the WHSLA By-Laws, with special consideration being given to the section on Area Representatives. To fulfill this mandate, the Committee proposed a list of revisions and submitted them for review at the May 4, 1979 Executive Board meeting. The Board then returned its recommendation to the Committee. An excellent survey of Board action on By-Law Committee proposals can be found in the minutes of the May 4 Executive Board Meeting prepared by Ruth Holst.

The Executive Board returned the following comments to the By-Laws Committee with regard to their recommendations:

1. Art. II, Sect. 4 Dues-agreed that the treasurer should send an annual membership renewal notice to members.
- 2a. Art. IV Executive Board-rejected idea of electing Board from general membership at this time. Geographic representation is still needed to assure the participation of all areas of the state during the formative years of the organization.
- 2b. agreed that the President and President-Elect should be elected by the general membership and that the Secretary and Treasurer be appointed with Board concurrence, by the President.

- 2c. rejected addition of need for a smaller Board.
- 2d. rejected addition of goals statement from candidates as part of by-laws more appropriate for inclusion in organizational guidelines.
- 2e. rejected concept of nomination by petition from less than 15 members.
- 2f. agreed with addition of minimum numbers for nominees for Board and Officers-- suggested 2 nominees for President and President-Elect and at least 9 nominees for Representatives at large.
3. Art. IV, Sec. 4 Meetings - agreed that Executive Board should meet twice in conjunction with Annual meeting.
4. Art. VII Committees - rejected addition (and) to By-Laws of relations of committees to Board and President and addition of planning calendar - more appropriate for inclusion in organizational guidelines.
6. Art. IX Amendments - rejected concept of eliminating mail vote on amendments.

The major change accepted by the Board is that the President - Elect should be elected by the general membership instead of selected by the Board, as is now the case. Several other items were referred for inclusion in organizational guidelines (see 2d, 4 and 5). The Board rejected the idea of electing the entire Board from the general membership. It was felt that geographic representation assures participation from all state areas. The Board did recommend that the mechanics of the area representative election could be more sophisticated. While the By-Laws Committee agrees, it was felt that no one election procedure would satisfy the diversity which exists in the Comprehensive Health Planning Districts.

The proposed changes in the By-Laws are being printed in the Newsletter to allow members ample time for review prior to their presentation at the Annual meeting. It is the By-Law Committee's hope that these revisions will strengthen the organization structure and provide for greater membership involvement. This is a new and evolving organization and "change" will remain a keyword for some time. The Committee has attempted to follow the Board's recommendation that initial changes be moderate until we have time to observe the workings of the Association. PROPOSED CHANGES TO WHSLA BY-LAWS

Article III. Membership

Section 4. Dues. Dues for both classes of membership shall be determined by vote of the Association at any annual business meeting. Dues for the calendar year are payable to the Treasurer at or after the annual meeting. Any member whose dues are unpaid on March 1 shall be considered delinquent and shall cease to be a member of the Association.

CHANGE: Dues for both classes of membership shall be determined by vote of the Association at any annual business meeting. INDIVIDUAL DUES NOTICES FOR THE CALENDAR YEAR SHALL BE MAILED BY THE TREASURER IN JANUARY AND ARE PAYABLE TO THE TREASURER BY MARCH 1. DUES APPLY ONLY TO THE CALENDAR YEAR IN WHICH THEY ARE PAID. Any member whose dues are unpaid on March 1 shall cease to be a member of the Association.

Article IV. Executive Board

Section 2. Composition. The Executive Board shall consist of one representative chosen by each of the original comprehensive health planning districts in Wisconsin and an equal number of representatives-at-large elected by the membership. The Coordinator for Health Science Libraries in Wisconsin shall be a non-voting ex-officio member. The immediate past President shall serve as a voting ex-officio member for one year following term of office as President.

CHANGE: The Executive Board shall consist of one representative FROM each of the REVISED comprehensive health planning districts in Wisconsin and an equal number or representatives-at-large elected by the membership. The immediate past President shall serve as a voting ex-officio member for one year following term of office as President.

Section 4. Meetings. The Executive Board shall meet at the time of the annual meeting and at least one other time during the year. Special meetings may be called by the President or upon the written request of five Executive Board members.

CHANGE: The Executive Board shall meet TWICE IN CONJUNCTION WITH the annual meeting. ADDITIONAL meetings may be called by the President or upon the written request of five Executive Board members.

Section 5. Selection of Members.

(a) Area Representatives. Area representatives shall be chosen* by the active WHSLA members of each of the original comprehensive health planning districts and their names submitted to the President by June 1 of the years in which area representatives are chosen.

CHANGE: Area representatives shall be chosen IN ODD-NUMBERED YEARS by the active WHSLA members of each of the REVISED comprehensive health planning districts and their names submitted to the President by June 1.

Section 5. Selection of Members.

(b) Representatives-at-large. *The Nominating Committee shall prepare a slate of *candidates for *representatives-at-large to be sent to the membership with the call to the annual meeting. Additional candidates may be nominated by written petition signed by no less than 15 active members. Such petitions must be sent to the chairperson of the nominating committee no later than 60 days prior to the annual meeting. *Nominations shall have the consent of the nominee. Election results for representatives-at-large shall be announced at the annual meeting.

CHANGE: IN EVEN NUMBERED YEARS the Nominating Committee shall prepare a slate of AT LEAST NINE candidates for ELECTION OF SIX representatives-at-large to be MAILED to the membership with the call to the annual meeting. Additional candidates may be nominated by written petition signed by no less than 15 active members. Such petitions must be sent to the chairperson of the nominating committee no later than 60 days prior to the annual meeting. EACH nomination shall have the consent of the nominee. Election results shall be announced at the annual meeting.

Section 6. Terms of Office. The first year, representatives-at-large shall be elected for terms of two years and area representatives shall be chosen for terms of one year. Thereafter, all shall be elected to serve terms of two years. Representatives-at-large shall assume their Executive Board responsibilities at the annual meeting at which their election is announced. Area representatives shall assume their Executive Board responsibilities at the annual meeting following their selection as prescribed in Article IV, Section 5(a).

CHANGE: TERMS OF OFFICE FOR BOARD MEMBERS ARE TWO YEARS AND BEGIN AT THE TIME OF THE ANNUAL MEETING. TERMS FOR REPRESENTATIVES-AT-LARGE BEGIN IN EVEN-NUMBERED YEARS. TERMS FOR AREA REPRESENTATIVES BEGIN IN ODD-NUMBERED YEARS.

Article V. Officers

Section 2. Duties.

(c) Secretary. The Secretary shall record the minutes of all meetings, submit copies of the minutes to the Executive Board, and be responsible for meeting notices*and correspondence.

CHANGE: The Secretary shall record the minutes of all meetings, submit copies of the minutes to the Executive Board, and be responsible for meeting notices, MAIL BALLOTS and correspondence.

(d) Treasurer. The Treasurer shall*receive dues, make disbursements, maintain the financial records of the Association, and submit an annual financial statement to the membership. The Treasurer shall also serve as Chairperson of the Membership Committee and maintain the membership rolls.

CHANGE: The Treasurer shall MAIL DUES NOTICES, receive dues, make disbursements, maintain the financial records of the Association, and submit an annual financial statement to the membership. The Treasurer shall also serve as Chairperson of the Membership Committee and maintain the membership rolls.

Section 3. Election* The officers of the Association shall be elected by the Executive Board from the membership of the Executive Board at the meeting held at the time of the annual meeting.

CHANGE:

Section 3. Election/SELECTION

(a) THE PRESIDENT-ELECT SHALL BE ELECTED BY THE MEMBERSHIP. EACH YEAR THE NOMINATING COMMITTEE SHALL PREPARE A SLATE OF AT LEAST THREE CANDIDATES FOR PRESIDENT-ELECT TO BE MAILED TO THE MEMBERSHIP WITH THE CALL TO THE ANNUAL MEETING.

ADDITIONAL CANDIDATES MAY BE NOMINATED BY WRITTEN PETITION BY NO LESS THAN 15 ACTIVE MEMBERS. SUCH PETITIONS MUST BE SENT TO THE CHAIRPERSON OF THE NOMINATING COMMITTEE NO LATER THAN 60 DAYS PRIOR TO THE ANNUAL MEETING. EACH NOMINATION SHALL HAVE THE CONSENT OF THE NOMINEE. ELECTION RESULTS SHALL BE ANNOUNCED AT THE ANNUAL MEETING.

(b) THE SECRETARY AND THE TREASURER SHALL EACH BE APPOINTED FROM THE BOARD MEMBERSHIP BY THE PRESIDENT, WITH BOARD CONCURRENCE.

Section 4. Terms of Office.

The President and President-elect shall each serve for one year. The Secretary* and Treasurer* shall each serve two year terms*. All officers shall assume their positions at the conclusion of the annual meeting at which their election is announced.

CHANGE: The President and President-elect shall each serve for one year. The Secretary - ONE YEAR and Treasurer - TWO YEARS shall each BE APPOINTED AND MAY BE REAPPOINTED. All officers shall assume their positions at the conclusion of the annual meeting at which their election is announced.

Section 5. Vacancies. Vacancies in office, other than that of the President and President-elect shall be filled by Presidential appointment from the members of the Executive Board. The office of President-elect shall remain vacant until the next Executive Board meeting*at which time, the office shall be filled by election by the members of the Executive Board. If an officer's term exceeds his or her term as a board member, the officer shall remain in office until expiration of his or her term.

CHANGE: Vacancies in office, other than that of the President and President-elect shall be filled by Presidential appointment from the members of the Executive Board. The office of President-elect shall remain vacant until the next Executive Board meeting. At THAT time THE BOARD SHALL SELECT A MEMBER TO SERVE UNTIL THE NEXT GENERAL ELECTION. If an officer's term exceeds his or her term as a board member, the officer shall remain in office until expiration of his or her term.

Article VI. Association Meetings

Section 1. There shall be an annual meeting of the membership in the fall for the purpose of announcing election results for *representatives-at-large, receiving reports of officers and committees, and for any other business, that may arise.

CHANGE: There shall be an annual meeting of the membership for the purpose of announcing election results for PRESIDENT ELECT AND FOR representatives-at-large, receiving reports of officers and committees, and for CONDUCTING other business.

Section 2.

(a) Nominating Committee. At least six months before the annual meeting, in those years when representatives-at-large are elected, the President shall appoint three active members no one of whom shall currently be a member of the Executive Board, to serve for one year on the Nominating Committee. *One member shall be appointed to serve as chairperson. *The Committee shall prepare a slate of candidates for *representatives-at-large. *The slate shall be presented to the President at least 50 days before the annual meeting.

CHANGE: At least six months before the annual meeting the President shall appoint three active members to serve for one year on the Nominating Committee. NONE OF THESE MEMBERS SHALL CURRENTLY BE A MEMBER OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD. One member shall be appointed to serve as chairperson. EACH YEAR the Committee shall prepare a slate of candidates for PRESIDENT-ELECT AND FOR representatives-at-large IN EVEN NUMBERED YEARS. The slate shall be presented to the President at least 50 days before the annual meeting.

(c) Program Committee. The Program Committee shall be chaired by a member representing the site of the annual meeting. With approval of the President, the chairperson shall appoint sufficient members to support the activities of the Committee. Members of the Committee shall serve for one year. The Committee shall be responsible for planning and presenting an educational program at the annual meeting of the Association.

CHANGE: The Program Committee shall be chaired by a member representing the site of the annual meeting. With approval of the President, the chairperson shall appoint sufficient members to support the activities of the Committee. Members of the Committee shall serve for one year. The Committee shall be responsible for planning and presenting the annual meeting of the Association.

(f) Election Committee. The Election Committee shall consist of a chairperson and two members from approximately the same geographic area and appointed by the President for a one-year term. The committee will be responsible for receiving election ballots, tallying the votes, and determining the results. Results shall be reported to the President within ten days of the ballot due date.

CHANGE: The Election Committee shall consist of a chairperson and two members from approximately the same geographic area and appointed by the President for a one-year term. The committee will be responsible for receiving election ballots, tallying the votes, and determining the results. Results shall be reported to the President within ten days AFTER ballot due date.

(g) LEGISLATION COMMITTEE. THE COMMITTEE SHALL CONSIST OF A CHAIRPERSON AND MEMBERS APPOINTED BY THE PRESIDENT FOR YEAR TERM. THE COMMITTEE IS RESPONSIBLE FOR MONITORING PROPOSED AND PENDING LEGISLATION AND PROVIDING THE MEMBERSHIP WITH INFORMATION. IT WILL ALSO REPRESENT THE ASSOCIATION'S BEST INTEREST BEFORE APPROPRIATE GOVERNMENTAL OR OTHER GROUPS.

BASIC PRINCIPLES OF LIBRARIANSHIP

New and needed is the way we feel about UWEX Communication Program's offering via the Educational Telephone Network (ETN) for the 1979/80 season.

Who Is It For? Support staff with no formal library training/education employed in any type of library, CETA employees working in any type of library, trustees or friends of libraries who wish basic understanding of libraries and librarianship. This is not a certification course nor is it designed for library directors.

What's It For? (1) This course is designed to help learners better understand the development of libraries, librarianship and the role libraries have had in society, (2) to help learners understand basic library operations and procedures, (3) to help learners understand the function of reference service in libraries and learn the basic reference sources, and (4) to help learners understand library technical services and resources.

Course Schedule: The course is divided into four units of three class meetings each. Each class meets two hours for a total of six hours per unit and twenty-four hours for the entire course.
