ETN SEMINARS BEGIN

His responsibilities include teaching of seminars and workshops pertaining to the many facets of management including the management of volunteers. Bob is not new to the field of health science librarianship as he has taught ETN courses and has spoken at the MRG/MLA meeting in Madison. We look forward to hearing him again. WHSLA ANNUAL MEETING

The WHSLA Annual Meeting was held October 18-19 at Oshkosh with the Fox River Valley Consortium serving as the host group. Mary Campfield of Winnebago Mental Health Institute was the chairperson of the program committee. A MLS-CE course on patient education and a UW-Extension course on management were held Thursday. JOY SHONG NEW WHSLA PRESIDENT

The Wisconsin Health Science Library Association is just beginning its 3rd year as a formal organization, though it has existed informally for a number of years. My predecessors, Al Zimmerman and Kay Cimpl, have done a lot to get the organization "off the ground."

The basic structure for WHSLA was established in 1978, and in 1979 committees were developed to begin to examine the needs of the Association and its members. I see 1980 as the year for the Association to begin to reach its potential by serving the membership.

My personal goals as president are, first, to follow up on committee recommendations made in 1979. The Incorporation Committee, have all worked hard and presented good recommendations for improving the organization. Secondly, I feel it is time to better define the role of WHSLA in the state and in the regional network. I will be establishing a long range planning committee to assist in the objective. Thirdly, in order to insure the smooth operation of WHSLA, guidelines need to be developed to assist officers and representatives to meet their responsibilities. A guidelines committee is being formed to develop a much needed procedure/guidelines manual.

I think 1980 will prove to be a challenge for me as president, as well as for the Executive Board and committee members. We look forward to the challenge but need the cooperation of the entire membership if we are to meet the Association's needs.

1978 - 79 PRESIDENTS REPORT

WHSLA was in its second year of formal association at the time I accepted Presidency. The groundwork for the 1978-1979 year, I felt, needed to begin with committees. As committee members began work, directions would form and progress would be made toward structuring and strengthening WHSLA.

COMMITTEES

WHSLA members who had expressed specific committee interests, or who were already involved in some facet of their professional work which related to a WHSLA committee, were considered for committee membership. Close geographic proximity was a factor for some committees (i.e. Program). I felt it was essential that new members, and members who had sent in blue volunteer slips, be also drawn into committee work.

Each committee, naturally, would work on defining and solidifying one aspect or area of WHSLA keeping in mind the total WHSLA goal.

Following is a brief progress report for each committee:

Standing Committees:

Program- Mary Campfield, Chair:
- planned 1979 annual WHSLA meeting in Oshkosh, October 1979.
- evaluated Continuing Education needs of membership through survey in conjunction with Continuing Education Committee and offered one MLA and one UW-Extension course at annual meeting.

By-Laws- Larry Jacobsen, Chair:

- reviewed by-laws and made recommendations for proposed revisions to Executive Board at Madison meeting May 4th.
- acting upon input from Executive Board meeting in May, drafted revisions which were presented to membership in September WHSLA newsletter to be reviewed before annual meeting.
- presented above by-laws revisions to membership at annual meeting in Oshkosh for discussion and final revision to be voted on by mail ballot by end of 1979.

- attended meetings pertinent to libraries and legislation.

Study of Incorporation of WHSLA - Linda Oddan, Chair:

- gathered information regarding incorporation of WHSLA.

Publications- Karen Woods (Oct-Feb)

- Margaret Marik (Feb.- present):
- studied and presented list of options recommended for alternate ways of publishing and funding WHSLA newsletter.

RESIGNATIONS

Resignation was the key-word this year. Janis Anderson, who moved to a different department within La Crosse Lutheran, resigned as Treasurer and Chair of the Membership Committee in December. Deb Gilles, Woodruff, accepted the position of Treasurer and thus Chair of the Committee. Karen Olmstead Woods, who moved with her husband to Cleveland, resigned as Secretary in February and also vacated the Chair of the Ad Hoc Publications Committee. Ruth Holst accepted the position of Secretary and Margaret Marid accepted the Chair. Debbie Hall resigned as President Elect in September due to pregnancy. This office was filled by Joy Shong at the Executive Board Meeting in Oshkosh in October.

REPRESENTATION

The end of October, I contacted Colorado, Illinois, Ohio, Michigan, Minnesota, Kansas, Missouri and Indiana in an effort to open up lines of communication between state associations and their presidents. A meeting was held at MRG/MLA in September with the Presidents of the Michigan and Illinois and Wisconsin associations.

Through WHSLA, we now have two candidates for election to COWL (Council of Wisconsin Librarians) - Virginia Holtz and Mary Bayorgeon. This is a representation I had worked on securing all year.

OBSERVATIONS

I feel my original goal was met by all committees. Hard work and effort by all committee members set up beginning groundwork.

Despite periods of groping in the darkness for ways and means to achieve results desired by the membership to firm-up WHSLA and make it a working, prestigious and valid association, the path has begun to be cleared. Organizational guidelines, as well revised and more workable by-laws will help to set direction.

As I see it, some of the areas that need concentration in 1979-1980 are:

- 1) appointment of Nominating and Election Committee.
- 2) mail ballot of by-laws.
- 3) WHSLA incorporation.
- 4) organizational guidelines/administrative calendar.
- 5) study and act on recommendations made by Ad Hoc Publications Committee.
- 6) create mechanism for better feed-back to WHSLA from area reps.

READERS FORUM - continued

Dear Editor:

During the business meeting at the WHSLA convention in Oshkosh, last month, a motion was introduced to change the by-laws to create only one type of membership and to open the membership to anyone interested in health science libraries. This amendment was introduced after a tedious series of changes in the by-laws, and I maintain that not enough time or thought was given to the implications of this amendment. I do not have the exact wording since that was left up to the by-laws committee. Frankly, I am disturbed that the attendees voted such a "blank check", and I strongly disagree that anyone interested in health science libraries should be able to one day be the presiding officer of this association.

It seems strange that all the other amendments which dealt with minor details were thoroughly studied and explained in great detail, whereas this amendment which changes the whole complexion of the organization slipped by at the last moment. It isn't as if the membership question were not considered before. At the executive committee meeting last May the idea of changing the type of membership was considered and rejected.

We are a special breed and have unique needs. We must have an organization behind us to represent us at inter-type meetings, at state meetings, and at regional and at national meetings. Together we have clout; without strong leadership we are as potent as a wet noodle.

Health Science Librarians of Illinois have the following membership qualification; "any person who is actively engaged in working in a health science library may be admitted to active membership. Associate members shall be those individuals interested in health science libraries".

If a non-health science library person were an officer, would he know the machinery of consortia, regional and NLM network operations? It takes a while to differentiate between the council, the Assembly, MRG and MLA. Right?

This amendment along with others will be sent to the membership for approval or disapproval. Please consider them carefully.

WHSLA is still a baby, hardly breathing, and already we're chopping it up into little pieces.

I would like to speak in favor of the proposed by-laws change to create one class of membership.

Although there have been few objections to the change, one thing mentioned is that people who know nothing of health science libraries would be joining. With the multitude of library associations available I think this possibility is highly unlikely. If one had enough interest to join without the knowledge--what a good way to spread the word about health science libraries and get some additional support, support which we can surely use. I wish I could imagine there were enough people interested in health sciences libraries that there would be the possibility of a problem: We should not make those few people not presently employed in a health science library who are interested in them second class citizens.

In terms of the possibility of people not presently employed in health science library becoming officers--the process is such that members are involved in selecting those officers. And if a person not presently employed in a health science library had a strong interest and desire to contribute, and we as a group felt they had the knowledge and ability, such a selection would be possible with a single class of members. If we as a group did not think the person qualified (whether employed in a health science library or not) we have the option of selecting someone else.

At the present time, although a distinction between members is included in the by-laws, it is my understanding that no records have been kept differentiating between classes of members; no such distinction is made on the membership form. It is simply not needed.

I believe that our organization, although new, is vital and as such is growing and developing. I hope we will not cut people off from full participation when they wish to contribute to that growth and development.

UPDATE ON AB20

When last reported in this newsletter AB20 was in the Joint Committee on Finance awaiting action. As you recall AB20 includes one area which has created major controversy. That area is the creation of a Governor-appointed Board on Library and Network Development which would be responsible for leadership and policy-making in library matters including multitype library cooperation and networking, and the operations of the Reference and Loan Library. Part of the controversy is that although the Board includes all other types of libraries it would not regulate school libraries which would remain under the State Superintendent at the Department of Public Instruction. Although some people see this proposed state level reorganization as being more accountable than the present organization, many see the proposal as creating many difficulties in accountability. For example, the Administrator of the Division for Library Services and division staff, though appointed under the authority of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction, would be responsible both to her and to the Board which is appointed by another constitutional official (the Governor).

UPDATE ON AB20 - continued

An amendment attached to the bill reported out of the Joint Finance Committee reduces the size of the board to nine members, six lay and three professional. The only other major change was to reduce the public library system aid-index level from 20 per cent of the previous year's public library expenditures to 11.25 percent. This would mean that in 1981 the system aids would be at the equivalent of 59.6 cents of the purchasing power of the 1974 aids dollar.

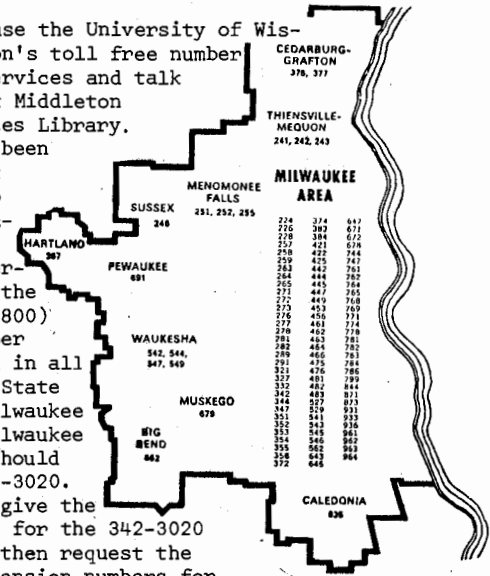
The section regarding the study of aids to medical libraries and system resource libraries came out of the Joint Committee on Finance unchanged.

The bill was scheduled for hearing in the house on November 2, 1979. It was postponed, however, until early 1980.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS ABOUT LIBRARY OF CONGRESS CARD SERVICES

- ▶ WHAT catalog card services does the Library of Congress provide?

The Library of Congress offers card service for over 7,000,000 titles. Cards printed from 1901 to the present are available on demand at \$.45 for a set of 8 when ordered by card number.

- ▶ HOW does the Library of Congress keep 7,000,000+ cards in print?

The Library of Congress is able to make all these cards available by using the latest equipment and methods for printing cards. The Cataloging Distribution Service (CDS) has just installed a new laser printing system, called CARDS, which prints MARC cards on demand. (See the enclosed description for details.) Another xerographic printing system enables CDS to print over 6,000,000 non-MARC cards on demand.

- ▶ HOW fast is Library of Congress card service?

Currently we are working on ways to improve our turnaround time in responding to your card orders. We haven't solved all of our problems yet; but recent statistics show that with our new electronic card printing system, we are able to fill most orders for MARC cards in less than two weeks plus time in the mail if ordered by card number.

- ▶ WHAT is the turnaround time for non-MARC orders?

Currently it takes approximately one month plus time in the mail for us to make a first shipment for non-MARC card orders. Because non-MARC orders are still processed in a manual system, we have to pull a master card from a 6,000,000+ card file arranged by card number, then reprint it on a xerographic system, and finally match the reprinted cards with your orders for billing and mailing.

- ▶ DO cards have to be ordered by card number?

No, but fastest service is given orders with correct card numbers. Cards may also be ordered by author and title, but it takes an additional two to three weeks for the order to enter our printing system if we have to search for a card number (at an additional charge of \$.60 to you if a number is found).

- ▶ WHY might some cards not be available from the Library of Congress?

Cards may not be available for several reasons:

- . The Library of Congress does not catalog everything published. Cards are not available for most laboratory

- manuals, elementary and secondary textbooks, pamphlets, work and loose-leaf books, documents of an administrative or procedural nature, and certain vanity press publications. Orders for these are returned after searching.
- A book may not yet be fully cataloged, even though a card number has been pre-assigned (i.e., for Cataloging in Publication, or CIP). The Library of Congress must have the book in hand in order to complete cataloging; cards are not available until cataloging has been completed.
- The LC card number may be incorrectly printed in the book itself, in another source, or on your order form. We do not verify that numbers on your order slips are correct.
- A change or correction may be in process for the cataloging you require; revised cards may not yet be available.

Our goal is to return all orders with cards or reports within 90 days.

▶ DOES the Library of Congress still offer standing orders for cards?

Yes, in addition to regular card service, the Library of Congress offers several selected card services. You can receive a copy of each new card on a continuing basis by broad or specific subject, by type of material and for certain language groupings.
