WHSLA SECRETARY'S REPORT

The annual meeting of the Wisconsin Health Science Library Association was held at the Pioneer Inn in Oshkosh on October 19, 1979. President Kay Cimpl presided. Highlights of the business meeting include the following:

Membership Committee: Debra Gilles reported that total membership in WHSLA is 113, which is a 38% increase over last year. The committee has designed a membership brochure which will be presented to the Executive Committee at its next meeting.

Education Committee: Ellen Cooper reported that the five most requested topics for continuing education are: 1) patient education; 2) hospital library management; 3) management of reference services; 4) Medline; and 5) cataloging of AV materials.

Legislation Committee: Ledell Zellers reported that the results of the questionnaire distributed to the membership earlier in the year had been tabulated and presented to the Legislative Council Subcommittee on Library Laws. This committee will continue to write informative articles for the WHSLA Newsletter.

Publications Committee: Anne Taylor reported that this committee has recommended that WHSLA should have a regular column in the present state Newsletter but that WHSLA should not undertake publishing a separate newsletter at this time. They further recommended that the Executive Committee allot a yearly sum of money to the Middleton Library to help finance the cost of publishing the current Newsletter.

Incorporation Committee: Kay Cimpl reported that she had received a package of materials outlining the process of incorporation from the committee.

Bylaws Committee: An extensive discussion of the proposed Bylaws Amendments was conducted by Larry Jacobsen. As a result, many of the proposed amendments were changed to reflect the consensus of the membership present at the annual meeting. Ballots will be mailed to members in mid-November.

STATE WIDE STATISTICS FOR INTERLIBRARY LOAN

Many people have indicated a concern that after the bonus vouchers for MHSLN were no longer part of the ILL procedures, no systematic method was continued to measure the interlibrary loan activity within the State. These are important figures to have for they indicate to ourselves and other library networks within the State the vigorousness of the health sciences network ILL traffic. That traffic needs to be measured further for potential State support which is the thrust of NLM's future plans. Pat Jones of MHSLN had begun to request ILL statistics from the consortia for 1978-79, as a step toward again retrieving this information.

Barbara Schmiechen, MHSL Extension Librarian indicated that she would be willing to gather the statistics of Wisconsin ILL activity. Conversations with Pat Jones indicated that MHSLN will again be asking for statistics at the end of the MHSLN program year - May 1980. Rather than create any more work for consortia statistics gatherers, it was decided that Pat would forward the MHSLN statistics to Barb Schmiechen. The form will be similar to the one used in 1978-79.

Basic units are urged to keep statistics on a format that is comparable to the form

required by MHSLN. Enclosed is the form that is used by the Northern Wisconsin Consortium which meets that requirement. This is the data that will be requested from the basic units in the spring. Please think in terms of this format when keeping your records for the 1979-80 reporting year.

We know that this method does create some loopholes, namely those units that are not members of consortia, but some cooperative method will be developed to survey those units.

Please attempt to make your data as complete as possible and do respond when it is requested.

LEGISLATION COMMITTEE'S BACKGROUND SERIES #1

This is the first in a series of articles intending to spur interest in the often difficult issues involving medical libraries and their relationships with MLA, NLM, State level library resources, etc. Many of these issues have political and funding implications.

In response to the interest shown in the questionnaire preceding these articles, any group is free to reprint the questionnaire or articles or excerpts as long as credit is given to the Legislative Committee of the Wisconsin Health Science Library Association composed of Deb Gilles, Virginia Holtz, Betsy Merriam and Ledell Zellers.

Although none of the questions in the September, 1979 questionnaire referred directly to the WHSLA, the Legislative Committee felt it was best to start at the beginning and discuss Wisconsin first.

The next article to appear will begin to address questions found in the questionnaire.

THE HEALTH SCIENCES LIBRARY NETWORK IN
WISCONSIN

The Wisconsin Health Sciences Library Network (WHSLN) is the Wisconsin segment of the Midwest Health Science Library Network (MHSLN) and ultimately of the nationwide Biomedical Communications Network, topped by the National Library of Medicine. (The Wisconsin Health Science Library Association (WHSLA) is not part of the network as such. Rather it is an organization of individuals interested in health science libraries. It will be included in a future article.)

BASIC UNITS

Basic Unit Libraries are the building blocks which make up the foundation of the network. Every library or library service in a hospital, health planning agency or other local health related organization is automatically a Basic Unit. Though libraries in individual Basic Units may be smaller than those in other components of the network, they constitute the first line of service to most health care practitioners. When they combine in consortia or other group efforts they comprise a powerful resource.

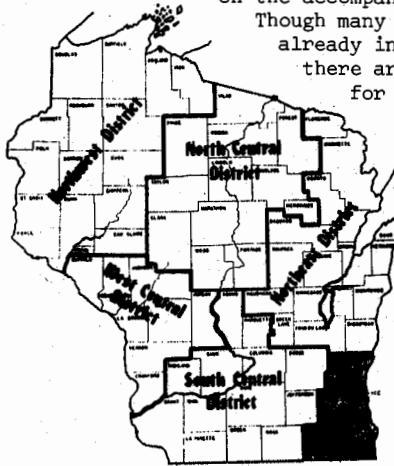
Currently in the Network, the voice of individual Basic Units is heard through two Councils, the WHSLN-Advisory Council, at the state level (formed at the 1979 WHSLA annual meeting) and the MHSLN Council for the six state region. They may also communicate with each other through Consortia.

CONSORTIA

There are six consortia of health sciences libraries in Wisconsin. They are the:

- 1) Fox River Valley Area Library Cooperative
- 2) Northern Wisconsin Health Science Libraries Consortium
- 3) South Central Wisconsin Health Planning Area Cooperative
- 4) Southeastern Wisconsin Health Science Library Consortium
- 5) West Central Wisconsin Hospital Library Consortium
- 6) Western Wisconsin Consortium

The geographic area covered by each is shown on the accompanying map.



Though many libraries are already in consortia, there are others which for one reason or another have either not yet joined consortium.

Those which have joined have been able to provide each other with fast and inexpensive access to many needed resources through interlibrary loan. They have also combined

forces to accomplish a great many other projects which basic units operating alone could not carry out. These have included self-help consulting programs, educational activities and regular meeting at which ideas are exchanged and the smaller problems of individual libraries are solved. Many other activities of this kind are also engaged in depending on the characteristics and needs of the individual groups.

Consortia also act as channels of communication between basic units and resource libraries and between basic units and MHSLN. They bring to state and regional level bodies the united voice of a group of Basic Units rather than the uncoordinated voices of each unit acting alone. Each consortium is represented on the WHSLN-Advisory Council by its Consortium coordinator.

RESOURCE LIBRARIES

At present there are two Resource Libraries in the State (the Todd Wehr Library, Medical College of Wisconsin, and the Middleton Health Sciences Library, University of Wisconsin-Madison). Generally Resource Libraries are located in university or college libraries though this is not universally true. The collections and services of Resource Libraries must be large and diverse enough to insure their ability to provide back-up services to basic units in and outside of consortia. They are required to have a commitment to regional development and to be involved in the planning and development of the overall regional network. Each Resource Library in Wisconsin has one representative on WHSLN-Advisory Council and one representative on the MHSLN Assembly of Resource Libraries, they also communicate with other components of the Wisconsin network through newsletters.

WISCONSIN HEALTH SCIENCE LIBRARY NETWORK-ADVISORY COUNCIL

The Wisconsin Health Sciences Library Network - Advisory Council is composed of the six Wisconsin consortium coordinators, the Directors of the two Resource Libraries (the Todd Wehr Library, Medical College of Wisconsin and the Middleton Health Sciences Library, University of Wisconsin-Madison), the Wisconsin Coordinator for Health Sciences Libraries, the President of the Wisconsin Health Sciences Library Association (WHSLN) and the Wisconsin representative to the MHSLN Council. This Advisory Council was formed at the 1979 Wisconsin Health Science Library Association (the organization for individuals, not institutions) annual meeting.

It is planned that this state level council will consider network problems which are specific to the state, such as cooperation with other types of library networks; will address operational problems and needs; and will provide a forum for the development of state position on regional issues.

Basic units in consortia may make their voices heard through their Consortium Coordinators while those outside of consortia are represented by the WHSLA President, the Wisconsin MHSLN Council representative or the Wisconsin Coordinator for Health Sciences Libraries. The interests of Resource Libraries are addressed by the Directors of those Libraries. The Advisory Council of the WHSLN can communicate with all components of the Wisconsin Network through the Wisconsin Health Science Library Association Newsletter and through its members. Its views can be transmitted to the MHSLN Council via the Wisconsin representative and to the MHSLN Assembly by the Resource Library Directors.

BASIC UNITS

All health care institutions whose primary role is health care delivery (hospitals, clinics, etc.) are called Basic Units. Their libraries are members of WHSLN.

The primary role of basic unit libraries is to provide information to those engaged in the delivery of health care, or in education research dedicated to that aim.

Basic units may communicate with WHSLN through the WHSLN Network Advisory Council and with MHSLN through the MHSLN Council of Health Sciences Libraries.

CONSORTIA OF BASIC UNITS

Basic Unit libraries which band together on the basis of geography or common fields of interest (e.g., mental health).

Libraries which are members consortia communicate with the WHSLN through Consortium Coordinators who are members of the WHSLN Network Advisory Council and with the MHSLN Council as individual members of that body.

RESOURCE LIBRARIES

WHSLN has two Resource Libraries, the Todd Wehr Library, Medical College of Wisconsin and the W. S. Middleton Health Sciences Library at the U. of Wisconsin-Madison. Resource libraries are libraries whose collections and services in the health sciences are significant enough to benefit and assist the other libraries in their geographic areas.

These libraries must have a commitment to and assume the responsibility for serving, developing and coordinating a geographic area. They must provide backup loan and reference services and facilitate communication within their areas of responsibility.

Resource Libraries may contact Basic Units directly (and vice versa) about individual operational problems. Resource Libraries also issue newsletters and communicate on general network problems through the WHSLN Advisory Council.

WHSLN ADVISORY COUNCIL (WHSLN-AC)

WHSLN-AC is made up of all Wisconsin Consortium Coordinators, the Directors of the Resource Libraries, the President of WHSLA, the Wisconsin representative to the MHSLN Council Governing Board and the Wisconsin Coordinator for Health Sciences Libraries.

The WHSLN-AC is a forum for discussions concerning the development and operation of the Wisconsin Health Sciences Library Network.

WHSLN-AC communicates with the MHSLN Assembly through the Directors, with the MHSLN Council through the Wisconsin representative, with the Consortiumia through the Consortium Coordinators and with Basic Units through the Wisconsin Coordinator and the Wisconsin Newsletter.
