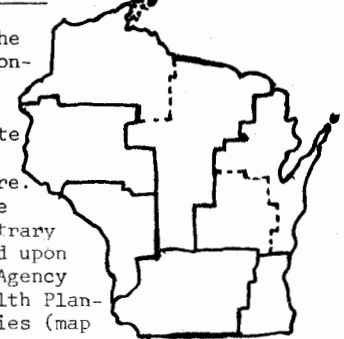

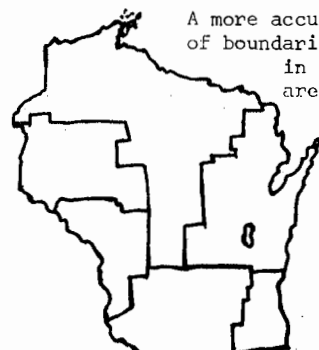
Correction - CONSORTIA BOUNDARIES

In the last Newsletter the Legislation Committee included in their article a map of the boundaries of Wisconsin health science library consortia. There is some debate about just where those boundaries are. The boundaries have been somewhat arbitrary but generally based upon the Health System Agency (or Governor's Health Planning area) boundaries (map of original health planning areas shown). Original Wisconsin



Health Planning Areas

The map shown in the last WHSLA Newsletter issue was based on "Wis Pro Districts" (Wisconsin Medical Journal v. 77, June 1978, p. 97), and those districts are quite different from presently used consortium boundaries.



Wisconsin Library Consortia

A more accurate representation of boundaries as currently used in defining consortium areas is shown on the accompanying map and is the same as the original health planning areas with the exception of two lines, forming our large Northern Consortium area and our Fox River Valley Consortium area. The issue of boundary definitions is going

to be considered by the Wisconsin Health Science Library Network Advisory Committee.

LEGISLATION COMMITTEE'S BACKGROUND SERIES #2

This is the second in a series of articles intended to spur interest in the often difficult issues involving health science libraries and their relationships with MLA, NLM, state level resource providers, etc.

In response to the interest shown in the questionnaire preceding these articles, any group is free to reprint the questionnaire or articles or excerpts as long as credit is given to the Legislative Committee of the Wisconsin Health Science Library Association composed of Deb Gilles, Virginia Holtz, Betsy Merriam and Ledell Zellers.

Answers to the following questions are included in the article below:

- 4. The membership of the assembly of MHSLN is composed of: (a) graduate medical students in the extern year from MHSLN, (b) consortium coordinators, (c) directors of all MHSLN member libraries and the council president, (d) directors of resource libraries and the council president.

They are addressed in the underlined portions of the article.

THE REGIONAL HEALTH SCIENCES LIBRARY NETWORK

The Midwest Health Science Library Network (MHSLN) is a component of the federally funded Biomedical Communications Network established through the Medical Library Assistance Act of 1965. Under the Act and its extension, the National Library of Medicine (NLM) has provided funding and guidance for the development of Regional Medical Libraries (RMLs) in eleven regions. Region VII (MHSLN) includes Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Minnesota, North Dakota and Wisconsin.

Its ultimate purpose, like that of its component state networks is to bring to those involved in the delivery of health care, the information they need for patient care, health care research, planning and education. Under contract to the National Library of Medicine, the Network is governed by, serves and is responsive to its member libraries. Network structure encourages active participation in program development by both users and providers of health science information.

NETWORK MEMBERS

Network members are institutions in Region VII that have a need for health science information, largely Basic Units and Resource Libraries. Representatives of these member institutions are encouraged to participate in regional Network activities through membership in the MHSLN Council, through regular contact with the Council Governing Board representatives and through work on MHSLN committees. Network members can communicate with regional components of the network through several channels. They can reach the Assembly of Resource Libraries through their Resource Library Directors, they can address the MHSLN Council through their state representative, and their access to the Management Office is direct.

MHSLN COUNCIL OF HEALTH SCIENCES LIBRARIES.

The Council is a Network user group; membership is free and open to any institution using the Network. The Council President is a voting member of the Assembly of Resource Libraries and Council membership enables users to have a formal voice in Network activities and decisions. The Council Governing Board includes one representative from each state in the Region. Council Officers and Governing Board are elected by the membership at an annual business meeting. Ad Hoc Council Committees make recommendations on issues of importance to Network members. Council news is carried to the members through the MHSLN Network newsletter, Resources.

MHSLN ASSEMBLY OF RESOURCE LIBRARIES.

There are presently twelve Resource Libraries in MHSLN. Each has made a commitment to regional development within the national framework and assumed responsibility for certain services within the region. The Director of the Resource Libraries with the Council President, form the Assembly which is the policy and decision making group for the Network. The Assembly delegates much of the work of the Network to working committees, Ad Hoc or standing, largely made up of members of the Assembly, the Council and the MHSLN Management Office. Members of the Network may communicate with the Assembly through the Council President or through their respective Resource Library Directors. The Assembly communicates with other components of the Network through the newsletter, Resources, through meetings and through special mailings.

MHSLN MANAGEMENT OFFICE

The Management Office houses the Region VII staff. It is responsible for the day to day operation and coordination of Network activities. It provides the personnel and continuity to keep the volunteer activity of the Region going forward and to provide back-up services to volunteer committees and other working groups. Staff members attend all meetings of the Assembly and the Council and many committee meetings as well.

They communicate with the various other parts of the Network through their presence at the various meetings, through Resources and other announcements and publications. They can be contacted directly by any present or potential Network Member.

THE REGIONAL MEDICAL LIBRARY

Each of the eleven regions in the United States has a Regional Medical Library. This Library negotiates the regional contract with the National Library of Medicine, represents the Region at the national level in meetings of Regional Library Directors and on other occasions, and houses the Management Office which carries out or facilitates work on the plans and programs of the Region. For the past ten years the Regional Medical Library has been the John Crerar Library in Chicago. As of January 1, 1980, the Regional Library will be the University of Illinois at the Medical Center, also in Chicago.

THE REGIONAL MEDICAL LIBRARY - continued

The MHSLN Contract from the National Library of Medicine provides continuing funding to support the Management Office staff and services and to facilitate the work of the governing bodies, the MHSLN Assembly and Council. It also provides some support for interlibrary loan activities, largely dedicated to supporting referrals and "out of state" traffic. In addition the contract may, in any one period, be negotiated to support special projects or activities of the region. MHSLN, through the Regional Medical Library and the Management Office also applies for grants from NLM and other sources to fund special programs or projects.

The overall contract is negotiated every three years and is renegotiated annually. Its character may change from time to time as the interests of the Region and NLM change.

MHSLN, REGION VII

All of these parts make up the Midwest Health Sciences Library Network which, like the consortia, can accomplish more in the aggregate than could its individual components working separately.

LIBRARY SERVICES FOR PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES

The Division for Library Services, Department of Public Instruction, Madison, Wisconsin is sponsoring a two day conference entitled Wisconsin Conference on Library Services for Persons with Disabilities. It will be held at the Sheraton Inn, Madison, on April 20-21, 1980. The conference audience includes academic, school, public, and special libraries and media centers, as well as representative rehabilitative agencies.

Conference modules will cover the following areas: legislation affecting library services for the handicapped; attitudinal barriers to serving the handicapped; and appropriate library materials and equipment by, for and portraying the handicapped. Discussions will take form of consumer panels, case studies, small groups and learning groups. Speakers on the program include Dr. Kieth Wright, Dean of the University of Maryland Library School and author of the recently published Library and Information Services for Handicapped Individuals; Dr. Harris McClaskey, Professor of Library Science at the University of Minnesota and specialist in resources for the handicapped; Eunice Lovejoy, Library Development Consultant, Services for the Handicapped, State Library of Ohio; and Alice Hagemeyer, Community Librarian for the Deaf, Martin Luther King Memorial Library, Washington, D. C.

There will be no registration fee for the conference. Meal, lodging and transportation costs will be the responsibility of conference participants. Detailed information on group lodging rates and meals, as well as sign up information for small group discussions, will be included in a forthcoming brochure.
