Larry Jacobsen served as editor for the publication after the Committee reviewed and incorporated the By-Law changes. Ann Hughes of Middleton Health Sciences Library typed the copy.

## MHSLN ASSEMBLY - JANUARY 8

The MHSLN Assembly meeting on January 8, brought together Resource Library Directors, the Council President, and Extension Librarians, giving all of these people an opportunity to begin to get a picture of the MHSLN Management Office within the context of a new Resource Medical Library (RML).

The people instrumental to all of this are the new RML Director, Irwin Pizer, the three staff members who moved from the MHSLN Office at John Crerar Library - Ruby May, Pat Jones, and Margaret Ovitsky, and new staff member Linda Sanford. All things are moving through this period with great efficiency, although I'm sure the staff will attest to the fact that transition is never as smooth as it appears to observers.

Words of commendation were given to John Crerar Library and specifically to William Budington, Director of Crerar for his contribution to the development of the Region since 1973 when Crerar Library was named the first Resource Library. John Crerar will retain its status as a Resource Library in the Region.

MHSLN ASSEMBLY - JANUARY 8 - Continued

It was announced that MHSLN has preliminary plans to develop an exhibit for MLA Annual Meeting; that the Interlibrary Loan program year would run from June 1, 1980 - May 30, 1981; and sub-contracts were awarded to the Resource Libraries to sustain their support of the ILL program in the Region.

Several studies are being developed for Resource Libraries in terms of the continuity of the Region's ILL program.

A BRS pilot experiment of an on-line catalog for the monograph holdings of three Illinois libraries was demonstrated. The Management Office was asked to investigate both NLM and private grants to mount a BRS system to create a pilot project on-line regional union list of monograph holdings. It would be searchable by author, title, and subject and would link with NLM CATLINE data base.

Sheldon Kotzkin from NLM was present at the meeting and related the part SERLINE would have in the MEDLARS III program. SERLINE would merge various data bases to create a uniform listing of serials with potential impact on regional, state and local union lists of serials. A consistent entry format for all libraries, large and small, would allow for flexibility in creating various listings.

Since the design phase of the MHSLN long range planning is coming to a close, the newly formed Committee on Planning and Evaluation will be responsible for a preliminary list of MHSLN standing committees and implementation committees, and will report on this at the April MHSLN Meeting.

The Ad Hoc Committee on MHSLN Structure will create a preliminary plan to present to the Consortia Coordinators at their meeting at the end of March in Madison.

Two major projects evolving out of the design committees are underway. The Sense of Service Project is now in the production stage and will be in the form of a slide tape presentation as a teaching aid for librarians and an orientation type program for users. Author assignments for the chapters of the Revised Basic Library Management manual are to be made very shortly and work will begin to create that new publication.

Each health sciences library management intern will spend the 1980-81 academic year working closely with the director and senior administrative staff of one of the country's academic health sciences libraries selected for its administrative excellence.

ASCLA PLANS WORKSHOP

The human relations aspect of networking and library cooperation will be the focus of three regional workshops, scheduled for 1980, sponsored by the Multitype Library Cooperation Section of the Association of Specialized and Cooperative Library Agencies.

Workshop topics will include team building, facilitation skills and conflict resolution especially designed to meet the needs of staff members in cooperative organizations.

The first workshop will be held May 12-14, St. Benedict's Center, Madison, WI; the second, October 29-31, New England Center, Durham, NH; and the third, November 6-8 (immediately following the Colorado Library Association Conference), Tamarron Resort, Durango, CO.

David Gustafson, Management and Systems Consultant and Professor of Industrial Engineering and Preventative Medicine, University of Wisconsin, Madison, will be workshop leader for conflict resolution and facilitation. A second workshop leader will be responsible for team building.

READERS FORUM

To the Editor:

The vote on amending the WHSLA By-Laws to provide a single class of membership is complete and the amendment has passed. I favored the change for reasons stated so well by Ledell Zellers in the November 1979 issue of the Newsletter, but the wisdom of the change will be determined by time and events.

The purpose of my letter is to convey a different perception of the events described by my friend Anne Taylor and to assure the membership that the proposal came to a vote by due process.

In chronological order, the proposal for a change was considered and debated at the May 1979 meeting of the Executive Committee, and it was approved. Somehow, that action was not recorded in the minutes; therefore, it was not conveyed in the President's charge to the By-Laws Committee. Nevertheless, as a member of both the Executive Board and the By-Laws Committee, I reported the Board's approval to the By-Laws Committee for its consideration. After considerable discussion we agreed to confine ourselves to the formal charge that we had received.

At the business meeting in Oshkosh in October, a proposal to have a single class of membership came to the floor after all proposals from the By-Laws Committee had been discussed. My own recollection is that this proposal did receive a long, vigorous, and fair discussion of its merits and implications. Because the voice vote was unclear, the vote was repeated by show of hands and the proposal passed by a clear majority, a majority later affirmed by 52 (76.4%) of the 68 members who returned a mail ballot.

Let's give the change a fair trial, remembering that it and any other part of the By-Laws can be amended. Taking a line from Dr. Joseph Mazza (UW-Oshkosh) who addressed the October WHSLA meeting, "A good constitution or By-Laws does not make an effective organization, PEOPLE do."

Let's go forward in good faith and make what we can of WHSLA.

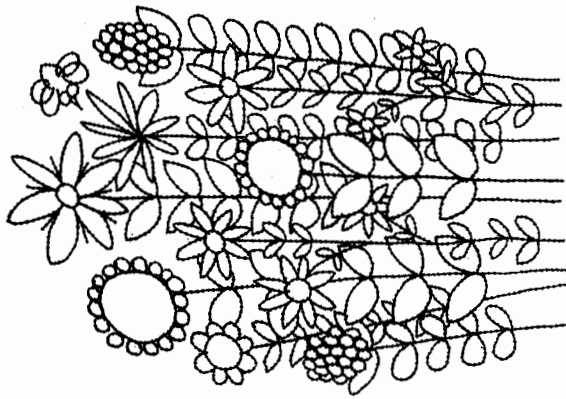
