## WWSLA EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETING MINUTES

March 28, 1980  
Madison, Wisconsin

The meeting was called to order at 1:30 p.m. by President Joy Shong. Members present: Mary Bayorgeon, Ellen Cooper, Kay Cimpl, Eilenn Emberson, Deb Gilles, Ruth Holst, Joy Shong, Anne Taylor. Members absent: Debbie Hall, Shelley Jordon, Betsy Merriam, Guests present: Peggy Allen, Larry Jacobsen, Margaret Marik, Barb Schmiechen, Bess Stein, Ledell Zellers, Al Zimmerman.

Minutes of the Fall 1979 Board meeting were approved as read.

It was moved and seconded that Article V, Section 3 of the Bylaws be interpreted to mean that a President-Elect appointed by the Board will, in fact, succeed to the Presidency. The motion passed. Deb Gilles and Ellen Cooper were nominated for President-Elect. Deb Gilles was elected by secret ballot of the Board to take office immediately.

President Shong asked each area representative on the Board to submit in writing by July 1, 1980 a method for electing the area representative from each of their respective areas of the state.

The Executive Board voted to proceed with incorporation and to charge the Ad Hoc Committee on Incorporation with the additional task of recommending to the Board possible alternatives for implementation, including costs related to each alternative.

The Board voted on each of the three recommendations individually. Recommendation #1: That WWSLA should not undertake to publish a separate newsletter at this time. Board voted yes. Recommendation #2: That WWSLA should have a column in the present newsletter written by a designated reporter containing organization news. Board voted yes. Recommendation #3: That the membership or the Executive Board allocate a yearly sum of money to alleviate the financial burden of publishing the existing state newsletter. Five alternatives were offered. The Board voted to give the Middleton Health Sciences Library an annual sum to cover labor, assembly, mailing and printing of the newsletter, this sum to be a percentage of the total cost equal to the percentage of WWSLA members on the total mailing list. Barb Schmiechen, editor of the Newsletter, will write an agreement and submit it to the Board for approval.

WHSLA EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETING MINUTES-Continued

The Board voted to formally adopt the logo which had been used on our stationery since the Fall 1978 WHSLA meeting. Margaret Marik, Larry Jacobsen and Barb Schmiechen will design new stationery using the logo. They will also look into the availability of logo stickers which could be used on envelopes.

Committee Chairman Ellen Cooper reported that the Committee has decided not offer on an MLA CE Course at the Fall 1980 meeting in Marshfield. A survey will be sent to members offering a choice of topics for two half day workshops to be presented by UW-Extension staff for Continuing Education Units (CEU's). The Program and Education Committees will make the final selection based on the survey results. Peg Allen has joined the CE Committee, but additional members are still needed.

Chairman Peggy Allen gave a progress report on the status of the program and meeting arrangements for the Fall 1980 meeting in Marshfield on October 16 and 17. The Board offered several suggestions to the Committee including a suggestion that more break time be incorporated in the program. The Executive Board meeting will be held at 11 a.m. Thursday, October 16 at the Holiday Inn.

President Shong, on behalf of the Southeastern Wisconsin Health Science Library Consortium, invited WHSLA to meet in Milwaukee in the Spring of 1981, probably April or May.

Chairman Deb Gilles reported that 75 renewal notices were mailed on February 6th. Twenty-nine members did not renew. Current membership is 98. Deb presented a draft of the new membership brochure to the Board. Several members offered suggestions. Deb will send a revised brochure and information on the printing costs to the Board for their approval. Later in the meeting it was suggested that the Committee compile a packet of materials for new members to include the Bylaws, membership directory and brochure.

Due to several requests from non-members for the WHSLA membership mailing list, the Board decided that the WHSLA membership list should be distributed to paid members only.

Chairman Ledell Zellers reported that the WHSLA Legislation Committee is in contact with several other legislative committee regionally and nationally for the purpose of keeping up to date on all legislative matters. Ledell described a bill from New York which may have implications for other states. Ledell was asked to send information to Board members for further feedback.

President Shong announced that she is looking for potential members for the Planning and Development Committee. Offers to serve were received from Ruth Holst, Kay Cimpl and Margaret Marik. Joy will appoint the Committee and write the Charge soon.

The work of the Ad Hoc Committee to write Organizational Guidelines has been delayed somewhat by the maternity leave of Chairman Debbie Hall. The Board urged Joy to ask the Committee to begin work as soon as possible.

The Board commended the Bylaws Committee for the excellent job they have done revising the Bylaws and having them printed.

Peggy Allen gave a brief report on the activities of this statewide committee. More information will appear in a future issue of the Newsletter.

The meeting was adjourned at 4:35 p.m.

MHSLN ASSEMBLY TWO DAY MEETING

MHSLN Assembly members, Management Office Personnel and Library Extension people met in Chicago, April 24-25 for the Assembly's quarterly meeting to conduct its business and to discuss proposals for the restructure of the Assembly.

Thursday was the day for general business at which time several items were discussed pertaining to the MHSLN Council. The President-elect of the Council Joan Zweifel will be funded to attend the July meeting as a transition to the September change of Council leadership. The possibility of naming an alternative from each state to attend the Council Executive Board meeting was suggested as an assurance that a state would be represented if the delegate could not attend. No official action was taken.

Much of the activity centered around the reports of design planning committees and decisions leading to the wrap-up of all these committees work in September. The Sense of Service project of the Public Relations group, the Reference Committee's Directory of Libraries which will be updated before publication, and a new project proposal from the Statistics Committee were among the items discussed. The Statistics Committee project will take the form of an educational design for a low cost workshop in basic library statistics gathering, making use of a video tape presentation. The project was approved pending Assembly Executive Committee budget approval.

Many issues in Interlibrary Loan were discussed. Commendations were given to Pat Jones of the MHSLN Office for her fine synthesis of the fifty member response to the NLM draft on the national network cost sharing plan. Some of the future items the committee will have to address include LDL's, interstate and inter-consortium cooperation, and the ILL computer sub-system of MEDLARS III. The Committee also requested a future meeting of Resource Library Interlibrary Loan Staffs.

MHSLN ASSEMBLY TWO DAY MEETING-Continued

The positive evaluation of the Consortium Coordinators meeting at the Yahara Center, Madison indicated a strong interest in future Coordinator's Regional meetings. A standing committee on Consortium issues was created by the Assembly. Irwin Pizer, RML Director, gave an update on the On-Line Union Catalog of Monograph's. The grant has been submitted to NLM and will be reviewed in October. Meanwhile Resource Libraries holdings that are part of OCLC are being loaded into the BRS system. A demonstration should be ready for the MLA Meeting in June.

On Friday the Assembly devoted its efforts to examining various restructure options for the Region's decision making body. Prior to the meeting assembly members reviewed all of the options identified up to that point and listed the criteria which they thought should be applied in evaluating the various models. By the end of the day the Assembly had referred to the Structure Committee, for its consideration, a model which would add five representatives from basic units to the one position which now exists on the Assembly. The six basic unit members would represent the six states in the region and would probably be elected from the state councils which were also recommended as part of the structure. The Structure Committee was also sent the ranked criteria developed by the Assembly. The Committee will consider this recommendation along with those it has received from the Council Governing Board, the Consortium Coordinators meeting at Yahara and ideas submitted by individual network members.

NLM MEDLINE MORATORIUM LIFTED

It was announced in March that the NLM moratorium on new MEDLINE centers had been lifted. You may get your application kits from the MHSLN Office. The applications must be sent directly to NLM. There are two priority groups with the first being health care providers-basic units, health research and local, state, and federal agencies in the health care field.

MEDLINE for the new center will be accessed through SUNY which does not have all the data bases of the MEDLARS system, but MEDLINE, TOXLINE, CHEMLINE, RTECS, and Toxicology Data Bank will be available.

MRG/MLA FALL MEETING

It is not too early to begin thinking about the FALL MRB/MLA meeting October 2-4 in St. Louis. This will be an expanded meeting for Midwest Regional Group will meet jointly with the Midcontinental Group at the Chase Park Plaza Hotel in St. Louis. The theme for the meeting is Update: Skills for the 80's. MLA CE's will be offered on Thursday with a full day of programing Friday and a Saturday morning program. More information will follow.

PROMINENT WOMEN LIVE LONGER

The secret for living longer for women is simple - become famous, or at least prominent in your field of endeavor.

The Metropolitan Life Insurance Company studied 2,352 eminent women listed in "Who's Who" and found that their overall annual death rate was 29 percent lower than for women in general.

If you want to ensure your chance of living the longest, become an archivist, librarian, museum director or curator. Their annual death rate was 54 percent below the general rate.

"The results of the first longevity study of prominent women indicate that women who have achieved distinction in various fields enjoy exceptional longevity," said the group. The new findings parallel similar results of an earlier study showing that prominent men also lived significantly longer than their counterparts.

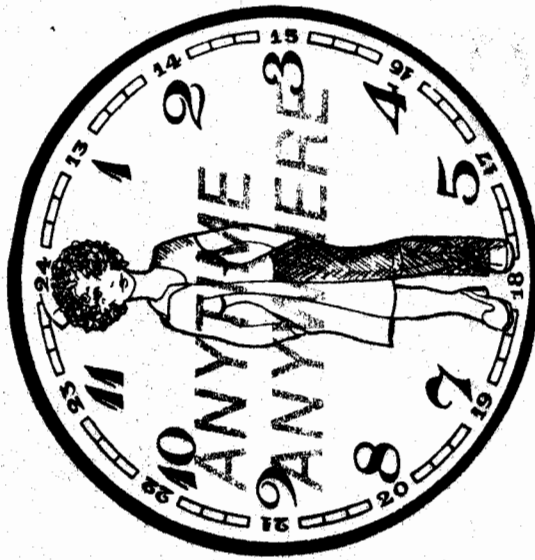

## For Nurse Educators

**TEACHING IN NURSING** is designed to assist the registered nurse strengthen knowledge, understanding and skill in nursing education. The **TEACHING IN NURSING** and **CURRICULUM IN NURSING** courses were developed through a project of the Extension Continuing Education in Nursing with the active participation of nursing consultants on the staff of the Division of Nurses, Department of Regulation and Licensing, State of Wisconsin. Financial assistance to enable the project was provided by the Board of Nursing, State of Wisconsin.

**Successful Completion:** The State of Wisconsin Board of Nursing will recognize the successful completion of Teaching in Nursing as meeting the principles of teaching requirement and Curriculum in Nursing as meeting the curriculum development requirement for the faculty member as listed in the Wisconsin Administrative Code-Rules of the State of Wisconsin Board of Nursing. Successful completion means that performance on the final examination, as reflected in the number of CEU earned, is at a level that is determined as satisfactory by the State of Wisconsin Board of Nursing. # For Nurses Giving Direct Patient Care

Underlying theoretical concepts of learning are explained. Specific learning activities are included with each lesson to strengthen the analytical skills needed to plan and engage in patient teaching so that improved care results.

Content examines chemotherapy, radiotherapy and surgical treatment methods; principles of care with particular emphasis on nursing aspects; prevention and detection; rehabilitation; and involvement of the patient in care.

**UPDATE ON FAMILY CENTERED MATERNITY CARE** is designed for the R.N. entering or returning to this speciality area of practice. Topics include pregnancy, labor (the family and the fetus), birth stages I and II, first twenty-four hours after birth, newborn assessment, and postpartum learning needs. Learning activities are designed to update clinical knowledge as well as provide a conceptual basis for the nursing care of the expanding family.

# Format of Courses

The independent study courses using audiocassette tapes are organized so that the enrollee will have the advantage of hearing the instructor lecture at the same time that appropriate printed materials referred to in the lecture are before him/her. Both the tapes and the printed materials are in an attractive, hard-cover, three-ring notebook that is specially designed to hold 8 cassettes.

Besides listening, reading, and taking notes, the learner is encouraged to engage in a variety of suggested activities to involve him in the learning process. These activities vary with each course and may include check tests, supplementary reading, reviewing diagrams and exhibits, and discussion with clients and/or peers.

After all the lessons in a course have been studied to the satisfaction of the learner, the individual may elect to take the final examination using the request form included in the notebook. The final examination is comprised of objective-type test items covering the entire course and is to be completed without the aid of any instructional learning materials.

Upon receipt of the completed examination from the learner, the test performance will be evaluated and the learner will be notified of the number of continuing education units (CEU) to be recorded on a transcript. The number of CEU earned will be based on the number of correct responses to final examination items.

Enrollment should not be confused with the award of CEU as evidence of successful course completion.

## Individual or Group Study

These courses are adaptable for either individual or group study. If several persons wish

to study together, they can enroll by purchasing one complete course and additional sets of printed materials (without lectures) in a loose-leaf binder. Enrollment by purchase of either establishes eligibility for the final examination.

## Enrollment

The printed material alone is insufficient for course completion. Those who wish to purchase only the printed material need to make their own arrangements for use of the tapes already purchased by someone else. Tapes alone are not available.

Each paid enrollment registers one individual for the course and establishes eligibility for the final examination. As in any course, only the person registered may take the exam.

Twelve months (from the date of enrollment) is allowed for course completion. You may request an extension of time from the address to which the application was mailed. Your enrollment becomes inactive if you do not request an extension. A fee is required for reinstatement. Extensions are not granted after twenty-four months.

## Transcripts

Each transcript of continuing education work done through University of Wisconsin-Extension, whether to show enrollment or award of CEU, costs \$1.00 and is sent only at the request of the enrollee to a designated recipient. The transcript is a cumulative, permanent record identifying all the courses and the respective number of CEU earned in each. Do not confuse the transcript with the "grade report" which is sent automatically to the student at no cost within two months after completion of a course.
