BY-LAWS COMMITTEE

WHSLA's By-Laws Committee report will be mercifully brief at the October 17 business meeting. The Committee (Jacobsen, Zimmerman, Hawkins) is recommending changes only in Article V. Officers. Section 5-Vacancies. This section deals with the succession of officers which occurs in the event of a vacancy. The current Section 5 and the suggested revision are shown below. The inadequacy of the existing section was well demonstrated this year when a vacancy occurred in the office of President-Elect.

Note that the revised Section 5 introduces a new concept--the naming of a Vice-President in the event of a vacancy in the office of President-Elect. The Vice-President would serve only until the next annual meeting by which time a new President and President-Elect would have been duly elected. The person serving as Vice-President would, of course, be eligible to run for either the President's or President-Elect's office. The Committee adopted the Vice-President concept from the newly revised MLA By-Laws.

This proposed change in Section 5 will be discussed with WHSLA members as part of the business meeting agenda. At that time other amendments to the by-laws may be proposed. Final approval of any changes made at the meeting requires a mail ballot to the full membership.

The current Article V. Officers. Section 5-Vacancies reads as follows:

Vacancies in office other than that of the President and President-Elect shall be filled by Presidential appointment from the members of the Executive Board. The office of President-Elect shall remain vacant until the next Executive Board meeting. At that time the board shall select a member to serve until the next general election. If an officer's term exceeds his or her term as a board member, the officer shall remain in office until expiration of his or her term.

The proposed replacement reads as follows:

Section 5-Vacancies

- (a) President. Any vacancy arising in the office of President after the annual meeting shall be filled by the President-Elect who shall serve the unexpired term of President and continue for the full succeeding term for which elected.

If a Vice-President instead of a President-Elect is in office when the Presidential vacancy occurs, the Vice-President shall become President only for the unexpired term of the President. At the end of the unexpired term, a President shall have been elected by the membership for the following term.

- (b) President-Elect. Any vacancy arising in the office of the President-Elect after the annual meeting shall be filled by an Executive Board appointee from the Board membership and shall be known as the Vice-President. The Vice-President shall have the same duties and powers as the President-Elect but shall serve only until

the close of the next annual meeting when a President-Elect shall have been elected by the membership. A vacancy in the position of Vice-President shall be filled by an Executive Board appointee and shall serve only until the close of the next annual meeting when a President-Elect shall have been elected.

- (c) Secretary and Treasurer. Vacancies in the offices of Secretary and Treasurer shall be filled by Presidential appointment with Executive Board concurrence.

WHSLNAC--WHAT IS IT?

Wisconsin Health Sciences Libraries Network Advisory Council (WHSLNAC) is still a relatively new group within the state, and as a result the question--what is it?--still arises.

A year ago the Consortium Coordinators and the State Coordinator met at the Oshkosh WHSLA meeting to discuss statewide health science library issues. An informal proposal was presented urging the formation of a Council to bring together the different components of the Wisconsin Health Science Library Network. This would include the Basic Units, Consortium Representatives and Resource Libraries. In order to do this the initial structure included the WHSLA President and part-time State Coordinator to represent the basic units, the six Consortium Coordinators representing the Consortium members and the two Resource Library Directors. The first meeting was held in March of this year.

Some of the issues the group has begun to develop is the potential for a serials locator list, state wide health sciences library survey, guidelines for consultants, and a clarification of consortium boundaries.

The composition of the Advisory Council and guidelines will be the major new topics of discussion at the forthcoming meeting October 16, 8:30 p.m. at the Marshfield Clinic, Room G303-304. Interested persons are invited to attend the meeting.

LEGISLATIVE BACKGROUND SERIES #5

The answer to these statements can be determined after reading the following explanation.

WHAT'S THE DIFFERENCE?

Confusion often arises about the difference between the Midwest Health Science Library Network (MHSLN) and the Midwest Regional Group (MRG), and between the National Library of Medicine (NLM) and the Medical Library Association (MLA). The basic difference between these groups can be stated simply: MHSLN and NLM are part of the Biomedical Communications Network with membership primarily composed of institutions and libraries; like the Wisconsin Health Science Library Association (WHSLA), MRG and MLA are professional organizations with membership primarily composed of individuals. The differences can be further explained by looking at the purpose and functions of each of these groups.

MLA

MLA's major purpose is to foster medical and allied scientific libraries; to promote the educational and professional growth of health science librarians; and to exchange medical literature among the members. MLA is a national organization with membership open to persons working in or interested in medical or allied scientific libraries; an institutional membership with dues based on the number of subscriptions is also available. At the present time MLA has regional groups and special interest groups such as the Hospital Library Section, the Mental Health Librarians, etc. Each of these groups meets separately or at the time of MLA's annual meeting which is usually in June. MLA is responsible for the certification of medical librarians. Certification as a Health Science Librarian is granted upon graduation from an American Library Association (ALA) accredited library school program, a passing grade on an examination administered by MLA, and two years post-library degree experience in a health sciences library at the professional level. Health Science Library Technician certification can be obtained following completion of an Associate Arts (AA) degree or the equivalent of two full years of college level work, a

passing grade on an examination for technicians administered by MLA, and two years experience in a health sciences library. Recertification is required every five years and is granted upon successful completion of an examination or evidence of completion of MLA or MLA-approved continuing education (CE) courses. MLA CE courses are offered at the meetings of MLA, MRG and occasionally at WHSLA. MLA provides a Placement Service for individuals seeking positions and for institutions seeking qualified individuals to fill vacant positions. The publications of the MLA include, among others, the Bulletin of the Medical Library Association which is issued quarterly; the MLA News, issued monthly; the annual Directory of the Medical Library Association; and the Handbook of Medical Library Practice, now in the fourth edition. The MLA exchange program provides a means for institutional members to exchange duplicate publications for the cost of postage. Only institutional members may participate in the Exchange program.

MRG

MRG is actually a smaller component of MLA. This regional group of MLA includes the following states: Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kentucky, Michigan, Minnesota, North Dakota, Ohio and Wisconsin. MRG's purpose is similar to MLA's but MRG has a special role to provide programs especially geared for the smaller health sciences and hospital libraries featuring local talent of interest on a regional basis; to provide MLA CE courses at a reasonable distance; and serves as a "Junior League" giving younger professionals avenues for achievement and contribution on committees. Membership is also open to individuals interested in medical or allied scientific libraries; however, membership in MLA is not required for membership in MRG. MRG also meets annually, usually in fall.

Bylaws Changes

Currently MLA is revising its Bylaws. The amended Bylaws were sent to the voting membership in August. Results of the vote will be announced in November. The proposed changes in the MLA Bylaws necessitate a change in MRG Bylaws. Accordingly MRG has extensively revised its Bylaws and a general membership vote on MRG's Bylaws awaits approval of MLA's own Bylaws. If all Bylaws changes are approved, MRG will become the Midwest Chapter of MLA. An article explaining these changes will be published later.

WHSLA

In the 1970's health science librarians in Wisconsin saw a need for a professional association of health science librarians at a more local level. The Wisconsin Health Science Library Association (WHSLA) was formally organized in 1977. Again, its purpose is similar to MLA and MRG: to promote the development of health science libraries and librarianship in Wisconsin; to provide a forum for the mutual discussion of problems and the exchange of ideas and information among members; to encourage the continuing education of all health science library personnel by sponsoring appropriate educational programs; to serve as liaison to other organizations desiring input from WHSLA. Membership in WHSLA is open to any person engaged in health science library work or interested in health

science libraries. The annual meeting is held each year in spring. UW-Extension or MLA CE courses are conducted in conjunction with the meeting and program. WHSLA, in cooperation with the Middleton Health Sciences Library, publishes the WHSLA Newsletter.

THE BIOMEDICAL COMMUNICATIONS NETWORK

The second article of this series in the January, 1980, issue explained the Biomedical Communications Network. To reiterate, the Biomedical Communications Network consists of NLM and its component Regional Medical Library (RML) Network. MHSLN (Region 7) includes Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Minnesota, North Dakota, and Wisconsin. Any institution in Region 7 that has a need for health science information may become a network member; that is, an institution joins by using the network. To become an effective participant, a member institution should also join the MHSLN Council of Health Sciences Libraries which constitutes the Network user group. There are no dues and one can join by contacting the MHSLN Management Office in Chicago. The Council reviews network programs, provides feedback to the governing body and, among other things, is the forum through which the RML may be advised about ways in which MHSLN members wish to influence NLM. At present, modifications of this structure are being considered and may be implemented by 1981.

COOPERATIVE EFFORTS

As might be expected, there is cooperation among MLA and NLM and their components. MLA, through its MLA/NLM Liaison Committee, as well as through special forums of members called by NLM, has influenced the direction and detail of a significant number of NLM programs. NLM has called on members of MLA to serve on special bodies to discuss continuing education, service to hospitals, and other topics. The Liaison Committee meets twice annually with NLM staff to review ongoing programs and propose new programs, as well as to bring to NLM, in an organized way, the views of MLA members. This committee has brought about a change in the content of Abridged Index Medicus (AIM), has influenced the publication of the Index to Audiovisual Serials, and has brought NLM and the Library of Congress together to discuss some differences in cataloging practices which were causing problems for MLA members, especially those with computerized systems. These are but a few of the activities in which this Committee has engaged over the years. It is intended to provide a voice from the general membership to the NLM. All MLA members are encouraged to submit problems and questions to the Liaison Committee. The Liaison Committee reports at least twice a year to the membership through the MLA News and arranges a sponsored session at the MLA Annual Meeting on issues relating to the interaction between the NLM and its largest organized body of users, MLA. MRG and MHSLN, since they cover the same basic geographical area, often meet at the same location with piggybacked meetings.

COOPERATIVE EFFORTS - Continued

The purpose and organization of MLA and NLM, MHSLN and MRG, and WHSLA are unique; yet all are involved with health science libraries so at times there will be overlap. It is important to recognize the differences and the similarities and take advantage of what each has to offer.

Do not pass up this opportunity for input before the Assembly meets October 21-22.

PROFESSIONAL MEETINGS

Do you feel overloaded with making decisions about attending professional meetings this fall? If you do, almost everyone is feeling the same way. You will be interested to know that several changes are coming in the future to alleviate this fall overload.

As a result of a poll among Wisconsin Health Sciences Librarians, the WHSLA annual meeting will be held in the spring. In order to make the transition, particularly in regard to the election of officers, the spring meeting 1981 will be the Annual Meeting. The meeting in October at Marshfield this year is designated as the WHSLA Fall Meeting. MRG/MLA which in past years has met both in spring and fall will be held in the fall only. These decisions should ease the fall calendar for 1981.

INTERLIBRARY LOAN ISSUES

Interlibrary loan work is one of the time consuming activities of libraries, both large and small. Every so often people need to be reminded to take great care in asking services of other libraries whether they be members within a consortium or accessing resource libraries. Services can be provided more efficiently if interlibrary loan personnel use an extra minute to recheck requests.

The Resource Libraries emphasize several things to you.

- 1) You must check the copyright compliance box for journal material.
- 2) Use your own tools to verify materials as much as possible.
- 3) If you are able to verify resources, give the full citation of the verification.
- 4) Remember to sign the Interlibrary Loan form.

MHSLN COUNCIL MEETING

A group of Wisconsin Librarians attended the MHSLN Council Meeting September 19 at the Library of the Health Sciences, University of Illinois at the Medical Center.

The morning program included presentations by Jana Bradley on Managerial Writing and Margaret Ovitsky on MHSLN's Quality Assurance project.

The main discussion of the afternoon centered on the importance of the establishment of state councils to ensure representation from each state in the new structure that will be established for MHSLN. Either structure that is selected by the Assembly on October 20-21 calls for state councils, and a representative from each of the six states will sit on that new regional body. The present MHSLN Council has assumed the responsibility of seeing that each state moves toward creating a council that will adequately represent each state in the Assembly. Wisconsin's creation of the Advisory Council (WHSLNAC) meets the preliminary requirements of the proposed structure of state councils. Although guidelines will be established, the councils will be autonomous in their make-up and tasks.

THE LIBRARIAN AS A SERVICE PROFESSIONAL

Belief in service is a fundamental part of our professional commitment, yet library staff members may need help in identifying ways to translate this service philosophy into service actions - actions that will communicate their sense of service to others.

To assist library staff members in translating belief in service into service behavior, the Midwest Health Science Library Network (Region VII Regional Medical Library Program) announces the publication of the THE LIBRARIAN AS A SERVICE PROFESSIONAL: A PROMOTIONAL KIT. The kit consists of a booklet designed to help librarians increase their awareness of service oriented actions, a slide/tape designed to present librarians to users as service professionals solving information problems, and a descriptive brochure.

The booklet, A Sense of Service: A Librarian's Guide to Service-Oriented Action, discusses the importance of the behavior of the library staff, the policies of the library, and the physical facility itself in communicating service attitudes to users. Written in a direct, informal style, the booklet includes checklists for each area under discussion and suggestions for ways to carry out changes. The booklet can be used by individuals or as a text for group discussion at a meeting or workshop.

The slide/tape, The Librarian as an Information Service Professional, is designed to be shown to users of health science libraries in hospital, academic, and industrial settings. The program has two objectives: (1) to inform users that librarians are professionals trained to solve information problems, and (2) to communicate to these users the library staff's willingness to provide services - the "can do" attitude of librarians who feel very much a part of the health care team.

Within Region VII, one copy of the booklet has been distributed free of charge to every MHSLN member. Each Resource Library and each consortium in the Region will receive a complete kit free of charge. MHSLN members may borrow the kit from a local Resource Library or from the Management Office, using standard inter-library loan procedures.

ETN-MLA-CE COURSE

The MLA-CE course on Statistical Sources For Health Sciences Librarians is a good example of the versatility of the ETN Network. Twenty-seven participants listen to Sidney Owens of MIT Science Library speak to them from her home in Cambridge, Massachusetts. The participants are from North Dakota, Wis. and four people travel from Minn. to Wisc. listening sites. ETN does have its disadvantages in not being able to experience face to face interaction, but the voice to voice interaction across many miles is an exercise in an alternative form of communication in continuing education. The course began September 10, is meeting for four sessions, and will conclude October 22.
