MHSLN ASSEMBLY VOTES IN NEW STRUCTURE

The two day meeting of the of the MHSLN Assembly October 21-22 gave Region VII a new forth coming structure. The vote was taken Tuesday morning, after an extensive discussion of the issues on Monday afternoon. The model known to the Region as Structure I was the selected structure. This structure creates a decision making body made up of seven representatives of the states through State Councils, the twelve Resource Library Directors and one Resource Medical Library Director.

A segment of the morning was then spent giving direction to both the By-Laws Committee and the Guidelines Committee for State Councils. Two of the major suggestions were that there be a periodic review of the new structure, and secondly, that the composition of the Executive Committee be designed not to include, at any one time, more than either three state representatives or three resource librarians. The present Assembly will continue until the By-Laws are in place with an implementation date of July 1981.

The MHSLN Council Governing Board will be the catalyst in forming State Councils. A State Council member may sit on the Assembly as early as May if there is a meeting at that time, and all criteria for State Councils are met.

Several grant proposals and MHSLN funded projects were reviewed.

- 1) An NLM grant has been written for the Quality Assurance Project. This will provide for one day workshops throughout the region on qualitative measurement of services.
- 2) The creation of a manual for workshops on statistics gathering for basic units is proceeding. Reviewers will be named from the MHSLN help wanted sheet.

- 3) Two of the projects utilizing applicants from the help wanted sheet will proceed, namely The Information Request Form Project and the Information Resources and Ideas Project.

Interlibrary Loan issues were discussed with further refinement being needed before the implementation of the 1981-82 program year on June 1. At that time there will no longer be NLM funding for direct fills. An ILL self-study and self-testing module will be designed.

Margaret Ovitsky, Program Coordinator: Evaluation and Design, was recognized for her very capable service to the MHSLN Region. Margaret became Director of Information Services at the University of Illinois at the Medical Center Library on October 22.

WHSLA FALL MEETING

Despite the grey and foggy days of October 16 and 17 the hospitality of the Northern Wisconsin Consortium and specifically the Marshfield area was enjoyed by the WHSLA members who attended the Fall Meeting.

Thursday's schedule included WHSLA Executive Committee, WHSLNAC, and Northern Wisconsin Consortium meetings. Two continuing education courses on marketing libraries and management of nonprint material filled the afternoon. A wine and cheese party, tours of both the Clinic Library and St. Joseph's Nursing IMC, and interviews by the Wisconsin Library Network Project ended the day.

Three very informational presentations highlighted the day on Friday. David Draves of Marshfield Clinic talked about rural health care delivery and the role of Marshfield Clinic in a specific program. The Statewide Nurses Study and its potential impact on libraries was reviewed by Marjorie Lundquist of St. Michael's Hospital- Steven's Point. The afternoon was a discussion of unit productivity in measuring library service. Ruby May, of the MHSLN management office, was the principal speaker for that segment with Carolyn Barloga - St. Francis Hospital, Milwaukee, and Eileen Emberson - Luther Hospital, Eau Claire responding by presenting their own library's case study.

Minutes of the business meeting will be included in a future issue of the Newsletter.

NLM GRANT FOR ON-LINE CATALOG APPROVED

The NLM grant proposal that would give Region VII an online catalog of the monograph holdings of the Resource Libraries in the Region was approved. It was given a high priority ranking almost assuring funding.

Data bases will be merged by the end of the year with hoped for January 1 funding. Some of the grant money will be used to buy more BRS passwords so that hospital libraries using MEDLARS can access the BRS data base. Protocol will be worked out so that MEDLARS users can apply for passwords.

WHSLNAC MEETING

The second meeting of the Wisconsin Health Science Library Network Advisory Council (WHSLNAC) was held at Marshfield, Thursday evening at a late night session. Barbara Schmiechen served as facilitator.

The State Serials Locator List Committee has been organized. Joy Shong is serving as chair. Other members are Dona Bowman, Eileen Emberson, Mary Heim, Betsy Merriam, Lavern Samb, and Al Zimmerman. Work will begin shortly in identifying funding sources, format and storage.

There will be a survey of the health sciences libraries in Wisconsin. The survey is at the testing stages and should be in the hands of librarians and library managers by January 1.

Each consortium in the MHSLN region has been invited to apply for participation in an NLM grant proposal. The proposal would involve the use of electronic transmission for information delivery. South Central Cooperative has met the preliminary criteria and has submitted an application to be a part of this proposed three year pilot project.

As MHSLN Council Representative for Wisconsin, Deb Gilles will be the person responsible for working with WHSLNAC in meeting the guidelines for acceptance as the State Council in the new MHSLN structure.

Interconsortium sharing for interlibrary loans was discussed. Preliminary criteria was established. More information will be given in a later Newsletter.

The next WHSLNAC meeting will be at the spring WHSLA Meeting.

LIBRARY NETWORK PLAN

The Wisconsin Division for Library Services is sponsoring a project to investigate the problems and develop a structure for area library cooperation or networking programs in Wisconsin. The project is partially funded by Library Services and Construction Act funds.

Project Goal

The goal of the project is to design and recommend an appropriate structure and funding for cooperation among libraries of all types at the area level in Wisconsin, tying this structure to the state-level library network.

Project Objectives

- To analyze existing and possible networking structures and models.
- To identify strategic problems with existing and possible networking structures and models.
- To assess, review and update the results of previous Wisconsin planning efforts and studies on multitype library cooperation and networking; e.g., the Task Force on Interlibrary Cooperation and Resource Sharing, 1976; Wisconsin Governor's Conference on Library and Information Services, 1978; and, Statewide Interlibrary Loan Guidelines, 1980.
- To assess the recommendations of current Wisconsin library planning efforts and studies, particularly of the Statewide Automation Study Committee.
- To review and assess the recommendations of the Wisconsin Legislative Council Special Committee on Library Laws, 1978-79.
- To assess current Wisconsin library laws (Chapter 347, Laws of 1979) as they relate to library cooperation and networking.

The health science library field is represented by Mary Campfield, Director; Library Winnebago Mental Health Institute and Virginia Holtz, Director; U.W.-Health Science Library.

Although much information on the barriers to cooperation is already available, a needs assessment will be done to bring this information up to date. This will be accomplished in two ways. Librarians had the opportunity to express their concerns to interviewers at the Fall meetings of the Wisconsin Library Association, Wisconsin Chapter of the Special Libraries Association and the Wisconsin Health Science Library Association. Also, the users of 100 public, school, academic, and special libraries around the state will be surveyed as to their knowledge of networking arrangements and whether such arrangements would be helpful to them.

The next meeting of the Steering Committee will be November 17, 1980. At this meeting Committee members will identify major issues to consider. Working groups of librarians and users will then be appointed to deal with these specific issues.

Do you have questions about copyright? We have answers.

"May I reprint that Peanuts cartoon in my newsletter, as long as I say where I got it?"

"Is it all right to reproduce copies of a Beatles song lyric and pass them out to my English class? May I do the same with a scholarly article on the literary merits of those same lyrics?"

"If I rephrase the text in my own words, will I violate copyright?"

"How large a portion of a book may I quote in my review?"

"May our school perform music or a play protected by copyright without paying royalties, even though we sell tickets to the performance?"

"May I videotape a television program and show it to my students?"

"What happens if I get caught violating copyright laws?"

The revised copyright law, which went into effect on January 1, 1978, has generated a great deal of confusion and anxiety.

Attorney Michael Skindrud has straight-forward answers to many questions on copyright and can offer useful rules for those questions without simple answers. Michael will share his insights into the new law in a practical, day-long workshop offered by UW-Extension on Tuesday, December 2, 1980 at Madison's Wisconsin Center.

Who should attend?

This workshop is for anyone interested in learning how the copyright law works, and especially:

- *Teachers who wish to reprint materials for classroom use;
- *Musicians and directors who wish to perform songs and plays;

*Editors who plan to reprint material in their publications;

*Graphic designers who use image as well as word in their work;

*Librarians who permit copies to be made from their books and periodicals;

*Researchers, scholars, reviewers, and writers who use and build on the ideas of others.

What will be covered?

The day begins with an overview of copyright law and the changes brought about by the new law.

Michael will explain how to determine whether material is protected by copyright, how to obtain permission to use the material if it is, whether the use you contemplate would violate another's copyright, and how to obtain copyright protection for your own work.

Along the way, Michael will discuss the rights conferred by copyright, the limitations imposed on these rights, including the fair use doctrine, the current confusion regarding the obligation to pay performance royalties for non-profit use, the difference between copyright violation and plagiarism, and the penalties for infringement of copyright. There will be ample time for your questions.

Who will teach the workshop?

Michael Skindrud is uniquely qualified to conduct workshops on copyright law.

As attorney, teacher, and performing artist, Michael has examined all aspects of copyright.

Michael earned his law degree with honors from the University of Wisconsin Law School in 1975. After gaining admittance to the bar in both Wisconsin and Minnesota, he served as coordinator of the Arts Legal Assistance Program for the Affiliated States Arts Agencies of the Upper Midwest in Minneapolis and gave numerous legal education programs for arts groups and artists throughout the midwest on topics including copyright.

He returned to Madison to join the law firm of LaFollette, Sinykin, Anderson, and Munson, where his practice includes work in copyright and related areas.

A dynamic teacher, Michael began his association with UW-Extension Communication Programs last May, when his discussion of copyright proved to be the highlight of the Midwest Newsletter Conference.

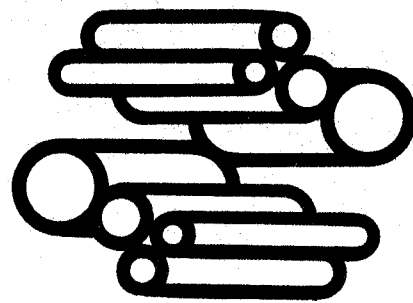

CONTINUING EDUCATION FOR PUBLIC LIBRARIANS

This year you have truly selected the subjects to be covered by this ETN series. During the spring of 1980 we decided to begin this new decade with a survey of the continuing educational interests of Wisconsin librarians. From the top twelve subjects resulting from that survey we, in cooperation with the Division for Library Services, selected seven for this year's sessions of Continuing Education for Public Librarians. We also feel that we have persuaded some of the best speakers in their fields to share their knowledge with you. We hope you will agree.

SCHEDULE

Sessions will be the second Wednesday of each month from November 1980 through May 1981. 10:00 - 11:20 a.m. at the ETN location nearest you.

November 12 - LOCAL HISTORY AND GENEALOGY

Where do you look when someone wants to trace the relatives of Aunt Edith on her mother's side who supposedly lived in the area after the Civil War? *Kathleen Gasz* of the T. B. Scott Free Library in Merrill and *Kris Adams Wendt* of the Rhineland Public Library have some useful ideas for anyone who has ever faced this problem.

December 10 - RURAL LIBRARIANSHIP

Rural librarians face some very special problems serving the needs of their far-spread clientele on often very limited budgets. For ideas and examples of some creative solutions, *Helen Krievial* of Iowa will draw from her many years of experience as a consultant with the Northeastern Iowa Regional Library System.

January 14 - LIBRARY CONSTRUCTION, MAINTENANCE AND FUNDING FOR ENERGY

Having just completed a survey of public libraries throughout the state, *Larry Mix*, Consultant for the Department of Public Instruction, will discuss the state of the art of Wisconsin libraries assisted by representatives from the Wisconsin Division of State Energy with useful advice on analyzing existing problems, some possible immediate solutions that can be applied, and what state and federal agencies may have funding for energy conversion municipal buildings.

February 11 - CERTIFICATION AND RECERTIFICATION

There still seems to be some confusion about public librarian certification and recertification

throughout Wisconsin. Who better to address this issue than *Dottie Heibing*, Public Library Consultant for the Bureau of Public and Cooperative Library Services.

March 11 - TIME MANAGEMENT AND WORK ORGANIZATION

Librarians never seem to have enough hands nor hours in the day, and with funding cutbacks in many areas, the problems have multiplied. Help is on the way in this session with practical suggestions of new ways to organize for more efficient utilization of you and your staff's time.

April 8 - COMPUTER USES IN ALL AREAS OF THE LIBRARY

Do you have an "apple" in your library? If you do, you know it isn't round and red, but a black or white microcomputer with a multitude of practical applications. From these miniatures, that scientists tell us will soon be in every home, to the large network computer systems like OCLC and DIALOG is not such a long jump. Where and how do they all fit in the public library will be discussed in this session.

May 13 - LOW VOCABULARY, HIGH INTEREST BOOKS FOR YOUNG ADULTS

A leader in this area, *Dr. Patsy Perritt* from Louisiana State University Library School will share ideas and titles of works to serve this difficult-to-reach audience. Her professional expertise is recognized nationally, and she has recently completed a chapter in a new book on this subject.

FEES

Library System—Headquarters library—\$25.00. For each member library registered and paid for by the headquarters library—an additional \$13.00 per library. The headquarters library will receive a set of materials for each library registered.

Independent Library—Each library, whether a member of a system or not, which sends in its own registration form, will pay \$25.00 and receive one set of materials.

Additional sets of materials may be ordered at \$13.00 per set for the series for branch librarians or other staff members of the independent libraries.

CEU's—Continuing Education Units (CEU's) will be awarded on the basis of a completed Attendance & Evaluation Form.

Educational Telephone Network (ETN)—The ETN stations are located in every county in the state. Each location has identical equipment—a loudspeaker and four microphones. Through this network, questions and comments from listeners are heard simultaneously by all statewide participants and by the speakers at the station where the programs originate. Be sure that you specify your location choice on the registration form.
