LEGISLATIVE BACKGROUND SERIES #5

This article relates to Questions 5 and 10 of the Questionnaire which appeared in the September, 1979 issue of the WHSLA Newsletter.

5. Health Science Libraries in Wisconsin can belong to public library systems.
 _____ True _____ False
10. The following state level areas of decision making affect Health Science Libraries:
 (a) LSCA grants, (b) funding formulas for public library systems, (c) proposed legislative change creating a board on library development and networking, (d) funding levels of contracts between Ref. and Loan & WILS, & Ref. & Loan & Milw. Public Libr.
 (e) all of the above.

I will take Question 5 first. The answer is False, as there is no provision for health science libraries or other non-public libraries to join public library systems in Wisconsin. There are possibilities for librarians other than public librarians to work together with public library systems in a variety of ways. This has been true since the beginning of public library system planning and development in Wisconsin. Wisconsin Statutes 43.11 (3), regarding planning for public library systems states that committees planning for potential public library systems "shall conduct public hearings to which representatives of all libraries in the county shall be invited."

In Section 43.24 (2)(f) and (g) of the statutes, public library systems are mandated to "... by the end of the 2nd year of operation develop formal agreements with other types of libraries in the system area, providing for appropriate sharing of library resources to benefit the clientele of all libraries" and "... engage in continuous planning (for) ... furthering cooperative activities among all types of libraries in the system area."

Cooperation among all types of libraries in system areas takes different forms in different parts of the state. In some parts of the state, such as the Wisconsin Valley (similar to the Northern Wisconsin Health Science Libraries Cooperative area), librarians from all types of libraries traditionally have been represented on the Library Advisory Committee of the Wisconsin Valley Library Service. Recently this arrangement has been more formalized: i.e., the method of selection of representatives to serve on the Library Advisory Committee has been made more clear. This is not a multitype library system, but representatives of librarians from all types of libraries do have a mechanism to meet, talk and plan together for sharing materials. In other areas of the state, as the Madison area, an incorporated multitype library council (the Madison Area Library Council (MALC) was formed before the development of a library system in the area. Now MALC and the South Central Library System are coterminous, covering the same territory: Dane, Green, Sauk and Columbia Counties. The system does not have representation of all types of libraries on its Library Advisory Committee, but does belong to and participate in the resource sharing activities of MALC.

In other parts of the state there are other arrangements. Some systems provide some of their services to other types of libraries; e.g., continuing education courses offered to librarians from other types of libraries, or interlibrary loan.

The bottom line is that although public library systems do not include non-public libraries, in some services or activities are made available in various degrees and ways, to non-public librarians or libraries.

Question 10. The answer here is (e) all of the above. Many state level areas of decision making affect health science libraries directly or indirectly. How?

- a) Library Services and Construction Act (LSCA) grants: directly and indirectly. Luther Hospital in Eau Claire has received (pending waiver of bid approval) a LSCA Title III grant in cooperation with the L. E. Phillips Memorial Eau Claire Public Library for consumer health information. LSCA Title I grants are meant primarily for the public, hence, are traditionally given to public libraries. However, in some cases another type of library can apply for and receive a LSCA grant that involves multitype library cooperation. Health science libraries which belong to a multitype library organization receive LSCA/grant. - b) Funding formulas for public library systems: indirectly. The relationship between public libraries and other types of libraries is discussed somewhat under Question number 5. The statutory funding formula per se for public library systems may not be of direct relevance to librarians from other types of libraries. Public library system funding does provide funds that some systems use to extend services to libraries of other types, for example, some systems provide interlibrary loan for continuing education to other types of libraries. However, it is possible that there may be some future recommendations for state financial support, on an on-going basis, of multi-type library cooperation or networking in Wisconsin. It is politically useful for librarians from all types of libraries to be somewhat familiar with current funding formulas so that if lobbying for state aids (e.g., for other types of libraries or for cooperation) should become necessary or advisable, we would all be better prepared. (A future article may deal with this subject in more detail.)

- c) Proposed legislative change creating a board on library development and networking: indirectly and directly.

When this questionnaire was printed in the September, 1979 newsletter, this was proposed legislation. It is now passed. The legislation created a governor appointed Council on Library and Network Development (COLAND) (43.07 of the Wisconsin Statutes). COLAND has recently been appointed by Governor Dreyfus. COLAND will advise the State Superintendent of Public Instruction in areas of interest to librarians from all types of Wisconsin libraries; e.g., "43.07 (2) Advise the state superintendent in regard to the general policies and activities of the state's program for library development, interlibrary cooperation and network development." COLAND will also make recommendations to the state superintendent regarding the state superintendents's annual report of state-wide library development including the development of networks and intertype library cooperation. COLAND shall also, study: "... the development and structure of, standards for, and the desirability of providing state aids to regional organizations for interlibrary cooperation and resource sharing, and make recommendations to the State Superintendent of Public Instruction. The council shall make its recommendations and the state superintendent shall transmit the recommendations to the governor and the legislature on or before December 31, 1982." Key words repeated in sections of the statutes are "intertype library cooperation" and "networks." These concepts involve librarians from all types of libraries, including the health science libraries.

Most specifically relating to health science libraries, COLAND shall study "aids to medical libraries and system resource libraries, and, ...the desirability of providing state aids to medical libraries in hospital and health care institutions and to public library system resource libraries and make recommendations to the state superintendent of public instruction (who)...shall transmit the recommendations to the governor and the legislature by December 31, 1982.

- d) Funding levels of contracts between Reference Loan Library and WILS, and Reference and Loan and Milwaukee Public Library: indirectly and directly. The Wisconsin Interlibrary Loan Service (WILS) provides the state "back-up" library, the Reference and Loan Library patrons access, through contract, to the UW-Madison campus and other academic library collections. WILS provides its own members, mostly academic libraries, interlibrary loan services on a fee basis. A second contract provides Reference and Loan Library patrons access to the Milwaukee Public Library. These contracts affect health science libraries in the following ways.

-Health science libraries (for non-health related requests), according to the recently published Wisconsin Interlibrary Loan Guidelines, may, under some specific circumstances, send requests for materials directly to the Reference and Loan Library, to WILS and to Milwaukee Public Library. See the Guidelines, Pages 18 and 19.

-In a more abstract way, knowledge of these state level contractual relationships is useful; e.g., could contracts be extended to Wisconsin Health Science Resource (or other) Libraries?

The issue of state level contracts and/or state level subsidy of state or area level net lenders (i.e. libraries that lend more than they borrow) is, again, an issue that could affect all types of libraries. It is an issue that is currently being investigated by the continuing work of the statewide Committee on Interlibrary Loan and Reference Referral. The state level areas of decision making for Wisconsin libraries are becoming less related to school and public libraries only, and more relevant to libraries of all types. Wisconsin does not have state level funding specifically for library cooperation of all types of libraries, but we do have a mandate for continued planning and coordination in these areas. The recently revised Wisconsin Statutes, Chapter 43 demonstrates this trend. (Contact Betsy Merriam for a copy of the revised Chapter 43.)

COLAND BEGINS ITS WORK

The Wisconsin Council on Library and Network Development (COLAND) held its first meeting in Madison on Friday November 21. The Council was appointed by Governor Dreyfus.

This Council is to advise and consult with the State Superintendent of Public Instruction and the Division for Library Services in performing their duties concerning library services. Specific duties include preparing a biennial report on library services with recommendations on how services may be improved, advise on interlibrary cooperation and network development, and creating recommendations on public librarian certification and public library system standards.

Currently the Governor has announced the appointment of thirteen of the fifteen persons to the Council. The professional appointments have been completed with no direct health science library or special library representation. That representation will be through the academic representatives.

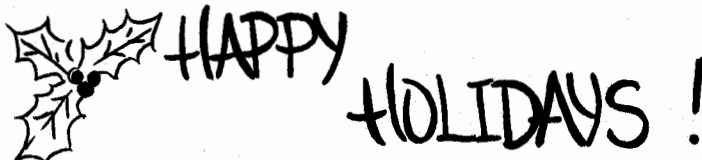
