## MHSLN ASSEMBLY MEETING - JULY 13-14

After months of designing, developing, and refining a new structure, the new MHSLN Regional Assembly came into fruition July 13-14. The meeting convened as the Assembly of Resource Libraries. That Assembly quickly completed its important business of approval of the state councils of Iowa, Indiana, Minnesota, North Dakota and Wisconsin. Illinois submitted two proposals and is working to arrive at a representative council. A facilitating committee of three was appointed from the Assembly to assist Illinois. The new by-laws were approved and the "old" Assembly adjourned. The newly constituted Regional Assembly was then seated.

The following full day's activity consisted of participation in an experience for which many people worked hard and long. It was the merging of ideas, expertise, foresight, and struggles to form an Assembly representative of all the units within the Region. The new State Council Representatives and their terms, which were determined via lottery, are:

Indiana - Millie Grunow - Evansville - 3 yrs.  
Iowa - Mary Wegener - Des Moines - 3 yrs.  
Minnesota - Patty Williams - Minneapolis - 3 yrs.  
North Dakota - Ardis Haaland - Fargo - 2 yrs.  
Wisconsin - Eileen Emberson - Eau Claire - 2 yrs.

Irwin Pizer, the RML Director, indicated that we will shortly move into Phase III of the RML program. NLM has indicated that they can no longer support eleven regions nationally. Reconfiguration of various state combinations is in the process and plans will be released in Oct., 1981. All indications show that the RML's will not disappear but that there may be five or six rather than eleven. New grant proposals will be submitted for the reconfigured RML's in 1982.

Mr. Pizer reported that the forthcoming MHSLN Regional Catalog of monographs is progressing. The NLM contract was granted, but final funding approval is pending. BRS will be loading tapes in a month or so. Computer codes for basic units without BRS contracts are built into the NLM contract. Basic units will have to pay for telephone charges. This file will be updated in three or four months, with the addition of hospital libraries being a priority. Libraries that use Trinco services are possible candidates. (See Trinco Survey in this issue.)

Pat Jones, Program Coordinator: Communications and Administration, has resigned effective July 17. The Search and Screen Committee hopes to complete its work of filling Pat's and Linda Sanford's positions by September. Pat was recognized for

her 4-1/2 years of service and creative productivity. We found out at the meeting she is also a MHSLN humorist!

The MHSLN Interlibrary Loan Self-Study Program has been published and was distributed with the July issue of Resources. This is an excellent resource for sharpening ILL skills. All persons are urged to take part in the study test. Consortium coordinators will act as graders for their consortiums. Future ILL program changes were discussed, but finalization of plans was deferred until the October Assembly meeting.

An interesting sharing time between Directors of Resource Libraries and Hospital Librarians concerning their impending funding status created a better understanding of that important area. Hospital librarians will see few staff increases because of rate review and the limitation of personnel based on bed size. Resource libraries in some instances face personnel cutbacks but more uniformly must deal with little in collection development funding -- in most cases just enough to keep up with inflation. The Wisconsin situation is unclear because the 1981-83 budget is yet to be finalized.

There was strong support for reactivation of the Collection Development Committee. The current economic situation makes this imperative. Two committees, Monograph Development which will work with the Online Regional Catalog project, and Serials Development, were formed. The serials committee will have two task forces or subcommittees -- Serials Development and Locator List/Online Development.

The South Central Wisconsin Health Sciences Cooperative was chosen as the pilot consortium for a Communication Committee demonstration project. Approval was given for a grant to be written to support this project.

The MHSLN Serials Locator publication has received nationwide recognition. The committee has been asked to design workshops to assist local consortiums in the writing of uniform serials entries for any serials list that may be created at any level.

Final plans were developed for the publication of Basic Library Management, revised edition. Pat Jones will continue to edit the manual to retain editorial consistency. The target publication date is early 1982.

Dana McDonald of SIU replaces Glenn Brudvig, University of Minnesota, as the 1981-82 Chair of the Assembly. Bessie Stein is chair-elect. Mary Wegener of Iowa and Patty Williams of Minnesota are the new Executive Committee members. The next Regional Assembly meeting will be October 21.

EAGLE RIVER HOSPITAL RECEIVES NLM GRANT

Eagle River Memorial Hospital has just received word that their newly developed library is the recipient of a \$4,000 NLM Resources Improvement Grant. Lynn Haarala of the Medical Records Unit is the principal investigator for the grant. The library has received assistance from the hospital

auxiliary in the past year to develop the library. This is one of the first Resource Improvement Grants awarded to a library in Wisconsin in the past few years. Congratulations are in order to Lynn and the Hospital as they continue to develop their Hospital Library. Eagle River Memorial is a forty-one bed unit in the northern part of the state.

WISCONSIN LIBRARY NETWORK PLAN PROJECT

The Steering Committee of the Wisconsin Library Network Plan project, chaired by Professor Charles Bunge of the UW-Madison Library School, met June 11 and 12 in Madison to review and endorse or modify and endorse preliminary recommendations of the WLNP Study Report. The Report was the product of seven working groups of librarians involved in the WLNP project since August, 1980, and was based also on WLNP project librarian interviews, user surveys, reviews of other states and past and recent Wisconsin studies or projects relating to multitype library cooperation at the area level. In all, the WLNP project has involved over 250 library media professionals and 1,597 patrons from 61 libraries in Wisconsin.

The Steering Committee worked hard at its two-day meeting, making editorial and substantive changes in the draft report. Issues discussed included purpose, need for, possible services, governance framework, definition of geographic area and participation in area multitype library networks. Any changes in the Steering Committee's work of June 11 and 12, and consideration of appropriate functions and funding for area multitype library cooperation will be work the Steering Committee will complete before and at its August, 1981, meeting.

The WLNP project recommendations should be completed by the end of September, 1981.

INTERLIBRARY LOAN SELF-STUDY PROGRAM

The July mailing of Resources included one of the new publications of MHSLN - the Interlibrary Loan Self-Study Program. This instructional program is designed to test knowledge and understanding of both the MHSLN interlibrary loan program and interlibrary loan procedures.

Consortium members will work under the direction of the Consortium Coordinators. The Coordinators will be scoring the test for their members. Non-consortium people are asked to send the test directly to Nancy Stump at SIU, Springfield. Directions are in the front of the manual. Nancy has developed and edited the Program.

We urge everyone to participate in the Program for it is an excellent resource to assist people in strengthening their interlibrary loan skills.

UNION LISTS OF SERIALS: GUIDELINES presents a framework which assures that manually constructed lists can be easily transferred to machine-readable format and provides maximum format compatibility with the National Library of Medicine's National Biomedical Holdings Data Base. Included in the GUIDELINES are a description of the regional and national contexts in which union list activities occur, specific information for the design, funding, preparation and maintenance of a union list, and detailed procedures for reporting holdings data in the American National Standards Committee (ANSC) format.

After that first mounting, it will be updated in three or four months. At that time, the Region would like to begin to include the holdings from the hospital libraries. Any hospital library that uses TRINCO/MARCIVE service would be among the first group eligible to be included in that data base. The libraries must purchase and forward their holding reports on computer tapes to the MHSLN office for inclusion in the Online Catalog. EDITORIAL COMMENT

I've had time to reflect on my feelings about the health science library meetings I have attended within the past few months. These meetings have included both professional and network meetings. My reflections pertain to state and regional activities and the place they will have in the future of health sciences libraries.

One of the things that stands out in my mind is the strength and caliber of leadership that has come from the Midwest Health Sciences Library Network. The Minneapolis Consortium Coordinators' meeting in March was a well-planned, timely and productive meeting. The majority of the presenters were librarians from within our Region. The guest speakers were well chosen and enhanced the theme of the meeting.

Even more evident was the place that MHSLN held at the MLA meeting in Montreal. The Region's publications and educational activities were cited often in presentations by people from all over the country. Two hospital library directors, Jana Bradley of Indianapolis and Judith Messerle of Alton, Ill, were elected to the MLA Board of Directors. Both Jana and Judy have been very active MHSLN committee members. The forthcoming publications Hospital Library Management and Basic Library Management for Health Sciences Librarians have their roots in this Region and State. Ruth Holst of Columbia Hospital in Milwaukee is serving as one of the co-editors of Hospital Library Management. The writers for Basic Management are all from Region VII.

This all may sound like regionalism, or parochialism if you prefer, but we are being encouraged to think this way as we contemplate the future. There will probably be structural changes in the national regional program that will continue the trend toward even a stronger focus on narrower boundaries, namely the state.

We are seeing a number of federal programs being eliminated. Some are undoubtedly more crucial to people's lives than the continuation of funding for the Medical Library Assistance Act, but we cannot negate the importance this funding had in enhancing the library information services that deal crucially with the quality of people's health care.

There will be changes in the future, but after observing our State people at work during the past year and especially at the Annual Meeting and at various meetings held in conjunction with the Annual Meeting, I feel that Wisconsin is in a position of strength to continue quality library services to people directly involved with people's health.

Editorial Comment - CONTINUED

One of the librarians put it quite succinctly in a comment written on the Wisconsin Survey:

"Wisconsin health sciences librarians and libraries have been leaders in the midwest region. Wisconsin has larger and more active consortia. Our resource libraries are supportive and sympathetic with the needs of the basic units. The textbook developed for 'AS1' was the basis of Basic Library Management. Wisconsin has had its own newsletter for more than 10 years. The health sciences librarians of the state have impressed me with their service orientation, creative solutions and willingness to provide mutual support and problem solving...besides being able to play hard and have a good time."

Health sciences libraries and librarians have come of age in this state and we can continue to provide quality service. We will have to be more creative to maintain that level, but we have a solid professional organization and a State Council to add support. This will hopefully help us keep pace with the changes we'll see in the 80's.

The Medical Library Association has collaborated with the University of Wisconsin--Extension Communication Programs/Library & Information Science in redesigning one of their regular continuing education courses to be presented over ETN. Members of MLA may use this course towards recertification.
