## ETN FALL SEASON

Health Sciences librarians again have the opportunity to make use of the Educational Telephone Network for continuing education experiences. These programs are sponsored by several units of UW-Extension - - the Allied Health Program Unit and Communication Programs, Library and Information Science, as well as the Schools of Medicine and Allied Health.

### A51 Basic Management for Health Sciences Librarians

This very basic course will again be offered for 12 sessions beginning October 12. There must be a minimum of 20 persons registered before the course can be offered. If you are a new library manager or one who needs to create a policy and procedure manual for your library or are a second or third staff person wanting to know more about health sciences libraries, this is the course for you. The class assignments include writing policies and procedures that will meet JCAH standards.

### MLA-CE Neoplasia

We are fortunate to have the author of the course, Patti Corbett, as the instructor. Patti is a librarian at the Graduate School of Public Health Library in Pittsburgh and will be utilizing the long distance capabilities of ETN as she teaches from Pittsburgh. Although this course is designed for librarians with online experience and training in NLM data bases, the course is also valuable for enhancing your knowledge in the area of oncology. This course is limited to thirty participants and will include participants from North Dakota. Plan to register now.

## Seminars for Health Sciences Librarians

This long standing series is now carrying MLA-CE credit. Our first session on November 4 at 10:00 - 10:50 will be on the International Year of the Disabled. Geraldine Mathews, Director of the Library Information Center, Central Wisconsin Center, and Richard Bopp, Project Director, Center for Rehabilitation Information, University of Illinois, Urbana will be participants. Other programming will include Elaine Leventhal M.D., joining Pat Craven on the March program to present a session on geriatric medicine and library services to that specific area. This series is included in the annual ETN fee program of the hospitals, but people must enroll to receive credit and the materials for the courses.

OLD HOSPITAL PROVIDES TEACHING SPACE

From the outside, the stately structure at 1300 Uni-  
versity Avenue looks much the same as it did during  
the years it was home to the University of Wisconsin  
Hospital and Clinics.

But things have changed on the inside. An extensive  
remodeling project began shortly after the hospital  
moved to the Clinical Science Center in March, 1979.  
Facilities that once accommodated a 548-bed hospital  
have been transformed into laboratories, classrooms,  
and offices for the UW Medical School and School of  
Allied Health Professions. The building, now part  
of a complex known as the Medical Sciences Center,  
will be fully occupied this fall.

When the Clinical Science Center was on the drawing  
boards in the late sixties, plans called for all  
components of the Center for Health Sciences to be  
housed there, "But as we developed that plan, it  
became apparent that it was too costly," said William  
Davis, associate vice chancellor for health sciences.

Instead, plans had to be made for a "split campus."  
The hospital, Medical School clinical departments,  
School of Nursing, and Wisconsin Clinical Cancer  
Center would move to the new building. Basic science  
departments and administrative offices of the Medical  
School and the School of Allied Health Professions  
were to be housed in the building vacated by the  
hospital.

The \$25.4 million remodeling project has provided  
much-needed teaching space for the basic sciences,  
Davis said. "Before, the student laboratories were  
woefully inadequate. They were designed to accommo-  
date a class of 87 students. Now, the Medical School  
alone has 159 students, and its faculty also teach  
other students in the basic sciences."

The School of Allied Health Professions is another  
major beneficiary of the project. The new Medical  
Sciences Center brings together allied health pro-  
grams previously housed in five locations on campus.

A second phase of the remodeling project, still  
underway, will result in major improvements to re-  
search facilities at Bardeen Laboratories, Medical  
Sciences Building, and Service Memorial Institutes.  
Renovation of these laboratories--which includes  
replacement of heating and ventilation systems, and  
installation of new chemical hoods--is needed to  
bring them up-to-date with safety requirements.

## MLAA Legislative Update

On June 26, the House passed an omnibus reconciliation  
budget measure which included a one-year reauthor-  
ization of the MLAA at a maximum funding level of  
\$9 million for FY 1982. It is a simple reauthor-  
ization of all six MLAA programs. As of July 1,  
S 800 was still deadlocked in the Senate Labor and  
Human Resources Committee.
