MHSLN REGIONAL ASSEMBLY OCTOBER 19

The words from the song from the Wiz "Don't nobody bring me no bad news" greeted us on the chalk board in the meeting room of the October 19 Regional Assembly Meeting at the Ramada in Rosemont, Illinois. The statement was needed as we moved through the day's business. Dana McDonald of Southern Illinois University

served as the new Assembly Chair.

Irwin Pizer, RML Director, scribe of the chalkboard quote, led us through his report. The funding for the Online Regional Catalog has not yet been approved, although word has been received that the approval is imminent at approximately \$25,000 less than anticipated. It has been an arduous task for the Management Office to rewrite and resubmit this proposal in various forms, first as a grant, now as a contract. Money for the proposal will probably come from the fiscal 1982 year.

The contract for 1982 Regional Activities has not yet been received. The present contract expires at the end of 1981. It is already known that NLM plans to drastically cut the interlibrary loan program by 60% from \$139,000 to \$55,000. With the indefiniteness of the 1982 contract, it was suggested that final screening could take place for the position of Program Coordinator - Regional Development, but that hiring should not take place until the 1982 budget is solidified.

The final cutback will be the reconfiguration of the eleven regions. This will be announced after the October Board of Regents meeting, and more details of the changes will be discussed at the November RML Director's meeting in Omaha.

The Illinois Council Guidelines were approved. Their appointed representative, Prudy Dalrymple of Rockford, was given temporary status until a spring election is held. With this seating, the work of the MHSLN Council was completed. Balloting for formal dissolution of the Council will begin shortly. Joan Zweifel of St. Marys, Madison, President of the Council was formally thanked for her extensive work in guiding the transition from the MHSLN Council to State Councils. Jim Parrish of IU-Medical Center will be asked to serve as Archivist for the Council.

Discussions and actions centering on Interlibrary Loan took a large portion of the day. The ILL-Self Study was discussed at length. Preliminary results of the test show that the area of copyright is the most complex for people. The Assembly was also interested in some type of follow-up or educational support mechanisms for persons with low scores.

Many ILL reciprocal agreements have been worked out between Resource Libraries for their own on-site users. This is not to be confused with the referrals for Basic Units which are currently receiving funding.

Because of the large cutback proposed for interlibrary loans by NLM, the Assembly voted to continue the program exactly as it is now, which would mean funding for referrals to other Resource Libraries until the funding runs out, probably in May, 1982. There is no ILL funding for 1983. This means that the announced Direct Access Program for Basic Units to Resource Libraries for 1982 will not be established. Adequate tools have not been developed

and there will not be continued support to begin something new. LDL's also will no longer be in existence.

The Communication Committee Project that will potentially involve the South Central Consortium in Wisconsin will be looking toward grant writing and technical consulting assistance to develop a program utilizing microcomputers to assist in ILL transactions, technical services, online searching and transmitting messages.

Other items of interest included. . . a decision to create a policy for distribution of MHSLN publications inside and outside the region at different costs. . . There will also be a differentiated charging system for prepaid materials. . . The MHSLN Directory will be out shortly. . . Consortium Coordinator's meeting will be March 25-26 at which time there will be both a workshop on statistics using the forthcoming MHSLN Publication on statistics and a Serials Locator List Workshop.

Other projects in progress include the editing of the new Basic Management for Health Sciences Librarians and a Hospital Administrator Packet. The MHSLN irregular publication Issues and Trends will continue for the present to be sent with the MHSLN Resources.

STATE CODE H-24

A special committee has begun consideration of needed changes to H-24, the State's administrative code for hospitals. The Code has remained virtually unchanged since it was first established in 1968.

The Committee is made up of representatives from the WHA and State Medical Society of Wisconsin, two nursing service directors, a director of medical records and hospital surveyors from the State's Bureau of Quality Compliance.

Primary work of the Committee will focus on technical revisions to the code such as deleting or modifying outdated regulations and reorganizing various sections of the code to make it more understandable. Some of the major functional areas to be considered will include: rules relating to the governing body, the medical staff, employee health and infection control, pharmacy, and the nursing department.

The committee is expected to conclude its work by the end of this year.

Major code revision work in the area of the Health Science Library was completed in 1977 by a Committee consisting of Betsy Merriam, Diana Slater and Joan Zweifel of Madison. These people again agreed to evaluate their 1977 work and will adapt their prior work to the present objectives of the H-24 Code Revision Committee. The new health sciences library section of the Code H-24.11 will be submitted to the Code Revision Committee for consideration by the end of the month. This new section draws on the 1978 JCAH standards and is more clearly written. There will be public and legislative hearing for this code. Watch for notices of it.

NLM REGIONAL RECONFIGURATION

Word has just been received by the MHSLN Management Office that the Board of Regents of the National Library of Medicine has approved the reduction of RML Regions from eleven to seven. MHSLN Region seven will be merging with Region 5 which includes Kentucky, Ohio and Michigan. All reconfigurations will take place in the eastern part of the country.

MCW'S NEW MEDLINE SEARCH CHARGES

Since the National Library of Medicine has raised its online charges, MCW has had to increase the cost of searches for the first time since it began charging for MEDLINE in 1975. As of October 1, searches of the current file will be \$5.00, back-files will remain at \$1.00 per year and offline prints of over 100 citations will be \$7.00.
