BASIC GUIDELINES FOR INVOLVEMENT IN LEGISLATIVE ISSUES - PART II

IDENTIFYING THE ISSUES

True or False

1. If passed, HR 3137, entitled the Information Science and Technology Act would provide a structure for coordinating and orchestrating technological information.
2. Laboratory Animal Data Bank (LABD and the National Institute of Mental Health Database (NIMH) are two online databases that are still receiving federal funding.
3. Many federal and state research grants are being cut. This means fewer researchers to use the library, fewer journal and book publications, and in general reduces the need for the library in information location and dissemination.

Since my assignment is to inform you how to identify current legislative issues that effect libraries in general and health science libraries in particular, I thought I should first try to identify some of these issues myself. But how??? I'm a librarian, not a politician.

I began with personal "consciousness raising". I started to "think" legislation, to be more aware of articles concerning legislative issues in publications I normally scan, and to read such articles more thoughtfully.

I soon discovered that identifying pertinent legislative issues is both easy and difficult. Difficult because it is not something you can look up in an index, a manual, or a handbook. Easy because it boils down to a basic awareness, a level of consciousness, an attitude.

Most of you are probably already identifying legislative issues right in your own library or living room. You do not have to attend every legislative session to know what items will effect your job, your library, your profession.

Some ways to identify legislative issues:

1. Read professional literature. I found relevant items (such as those above) in ONLINE and DATABASE, as well as LIBRARY JOURNAL, AMERICAN LIBRARIES and the MLA BULLETIN. State library publications are also a good source, such as CHANNEL DLS put out by the Wisconsin Dept. of Library Services.
2. Scan some of the medical and health science items received in your library, particularly JAMA and NEJM. Their editorials sometimes deal with health related legislative issues that have potential ramifications for health science libraries. I have also seen legislative related articles in WISCONSIN HOSPITAL ASSOCIATION NEWSLETTER and HOSPITALS. MODERN HEALTHCARE has a monthly feature "Washington News Briefs".

3. Pay special attention to legislative articles in your local newspaper and on radio and TV news.
4. Get on the mailing list of your congress person or senator. Many state legislators send newsletters to their constituents.

In the April newsletter, we will discuss how to find more information once you have identified the issues.

ANSWERS

1. True. If passed, this bill will provide a national policy toward the production, maintenance and distribution of information.
2. False. Due to federal budget cuts, neither of these databases are receiving federal funding.
3. False. Although federal and state research monies are being cut, since money is tight there will be greater competition; thus the researchers (and also health care providers, as hospital beds are cut and the supply of physicians goes up) should have an even greater need for information location and dissemination.

St. Luke's Health Sciences Library - Milwaukee is now charging 10¢ a page for photocopying and \$1.50 shipping and handling for any intra-consortium inter-library loan activity.

RAY PALMER NEW MLA DIRECTOR

The announcement has been made that Ray Palmer has been appointed Executive Director of MLA. He will join the staff on February 15. He has been employed from 1974 to the present time as Health Sciences Librarian, Wright State University, Dayton, Ohio. In his present position, he has founded and developed the library from the ground up. In Dayton, he has had extensive experience working with hospital librarians. He founded a MEDLINE consortium that is presently composed of 20 members and has operated a processing center for local hospital libraries. Most recently he has served as the very capable chair of the MLA Legislation Committee. He has been active on numerous other MLA Committees as well as the Bio-medical Communication Network Board of Directors.

MLA LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE NEWS

NLM FUNDING: Word has been received that through the mechanism of another continuing resolution through March 31, 1982, NLM's projected budget will be \$44.402 million for FY 1982, including \$7.5 million for the Medical Library Assistance Act. This is a substantial reduction from the \$47.6 million which was hoped for and will, no doubt, pose considerable hardship for NLM.

BIOMEDICAL RESEARCH PENALIZED IN STOP GAP FUNDING BILL:

The most recent Continuing Resolution (CR) expired on December 15 and the President and the leadership of his party have reportedly agreed to further reduce spending levels in the extension by an additional four percent. This blanket reduction would strip and additional \$4 billion from non-defense domestic programs.

Because of the Senate's failure to act on an FY 1982 funding bill, all HHS programs, particularly those of the NIH and ADAMHA, will be severely and unfairly penalized by such a percentage decrease. The formula in the vetoed CR would have funded each institute at two percent below the House or Senate recommended level. This approach with a four rather than two percent cut would provide NIH with a FY 1982 appropriation of only \$3.6 billion, a bare two percent increase over the FY 1981 level. NCI, NIADDK, NLM and FIC will receive virtually no increase. A four percent decrease would reduce ADAMHA's research and training funding below the FY 1981 level.
