WHSLA ANNUAL MEETING - May 20-21

The annual meeting of the Wisconsin Health Science Library Association (WHSLA) will be held May 20-21 at the Concourse Hotel in downtown Madison. The Theme of this year's meeting is "You and Your Administrator: May the Force Be With You". MLA Continuing Education courses will be offered Thursday, May 20: CE 246 "Basic Budgeting for Health Science Libraries" and CE 668 "Clinical Librarianship". Running concurrently with the CE courses will be a half-day course on "Resources for Health Care Administrators." The Thursday evening social event will include a cocktail party on Pool Terrace at the Concourse with hors d'oeuvres provided by Demco, a cash bar and piano music by Bob Auerbach.

On Friday, May 21, keynote speakers are: Alma Baron speaking on "Understanding the Management Structure" and Darlene E. Weingand on "The Janus Syndrome: Guarding the Gate in Time of Economic Need." The Friday afternoon program consists of three concurrent small group sessions which will be presented twice.

OPTIONS FOR DLS REPRESENTATION ON WHSLA BOARD

A request was made this year to include a representative from the Division for Library Services (DLS) in the Department of Public Instruction (DPI) as an ex-officio board member of WHSLA. The main reason for the request was to encourage ongoing communication between WHSLA and DLS.

The WHSLA Ad Hoc Planning and Development Committee was asked to look at implications of formal recognition to DLS and other organizations or associations (State or otherwise) that may wish to secure representation in WHSLA. For purposes at hand, the Committee presents below a possible list of options relating only to DLS, asking WHSLA members to keep in mind that this issue could arise again in the future with other organizations.

This issue will be addressed at the annual business meeting in May. Please read this carefully and come prepared for discussion in May:

1. DLS representative granted status as ex-officio member of WHSLA.
Note: Becomes official and must be included in By-Laws
Note: State Coordinator is granted ex-officio status on Board as stated in By-Laws
Note: DLS Administrator would probably determine DLS Representative
2. DLS representative regularly attends Board meetings without ex-officio status.
Note: DLS Administrator would probably determine DLS Representative.
Note: Does this become part of the By-Laws?
3. Include DLS representative on WHSLA mailing list for all "official" WHSLA mailings which could be shared among Division staff and filed.
Note: If there were no active DLS representative for a brief period of time, documents could still be read by Division staff and filed.
4. Informal arrangement with DLS with no official recognition. Choice of representative made by WHSLA Board.
Note: This may parallel #2.
5. DLS representation maintained through appropriate WHSLA Committee.

Other ideas are welcomed.

MAY 5 ETN ON BURNOUT

Who cares for the care givers? MEMBERSHIP RENEWALS

Is this a tale of joy or woe? When the WHSLA membership renewals and recruitment began in January, 1982, we had 133 dyed-in-the-wool, bonafide members. As of March 30, 1982 we have 83 renewals and 21 new members. Indeed, one can be gratified at the increase in new members because it reflects a growing interest in the association and its programs. The question is: Where are the 50 health science librarians who have not renewed? We know that some have moved from the state or have found new work. We do need the support of active librarians to continue high quality programs and services for members.

The membership renewal form included four questions for members. Out of 83 renewals, 69 (83%) returned questionnaires. These are the results to date: Did you help to recruit a new member since May, 1981? 9 current members recruited a total of 10 new members. Those recruiting new members will be identified for their good deed with a symbol on their name tags at the annual meeting. Remember that ten new members have yet to be claimed. Are you also a member of MLA, MC/MLA, SLA, ALA or another library association? 35 members have also joined MLA, 47 MC/MLA, 9 SLA, 5 ALA and 17 other library associations. 14 members do not belong to any other library association. Did you attend the 1981 WHSLA annual meeting? 36 yes, 33 no. Do you plan to attend the 1982 WHSLA annual meeting? 46 yes, 10 possibly, 13 no. If this percentage (66%) holds (or 83% if all the possibly's come through, we should have a well attended 1982 annual meeting. One disappointing note is that 48 (70%) of our members do not serve on any committee. Is this a tale of woe or joy?

BASIC GUIDELINES FOR INVOLVEMENT IN LEGISLATIVE ISSUES - PART III

HOW TO FIND MORE INFORMATION ONCE YOU HAVE IDENTIFIED THE ISSUES.

Finding more information about legislative issues is closely tied to identifying the issues -- hopefully the identification of an important issue would naturally lead one into finding out more about it. However, since it is not always convenient to follow-up on more information when pertinent items catch your eye and because we are all inundated with material, you might try keeping a folder or a notebook with bits of information (e.g. issues discussed and where you saw it). You can then go back to it at a later date to pursue more information.

It is almost impossible to pick up any professional (health or library) publication today and not see something about legislation, more specifically, the budget (or lack of it). These days, seems like everyone is being forced (via their pockets) to be aware of legislative issues. In just one morning as I was trying to pull together some information for this column. I came across several good articles relating to legislation affecting libraries and librarians.

1983 Reagan budget zeroes federal library programs; LSCA funds impounded illegally. American Libraries 1982 March;13(3):95-7

Reagan release LSCA, but \$\$ fight still looms. Library Journal 1982 March 15;107(6):581-2.

It's official. Shires, L. Channel DLS 1982 Feb;17(7). (Shires explains the ramifications of zero funding for LSCA and requests that librarians contact their legislators.)

Reagan and libraries: the first year. Library Journal 1982 Feb 15;107(4):379.

Proposed revision of federal classification and qualification standards for library... Palmer, R. MLA News 1982 March:3-4.

HOW to find more information: Read, Write, Call. That about sums it up. For librarians, finding out information is just second nature, so there's no need for further elaboration.

WHERE to find more information requires a bit more discussion.

Read "Capitol Notes" by Ray Palmer. This monthly column in MLA News presents information on national issues affecting health science libraries and librarians. (free to MLA members; nonmembers \$15.00/yr.)

The Washington Newsletter put out by ALA. This is a comprehensive and timely publication which highlights legislative activities affecting all types of libraries and outlines courses of action to take.

Other professional literature as listed in the February newsletter (e.g. Library Journal, American Libraries). Although many libraries cannot afford all the professional publications, most should have at least one subscription (or receive as part of membership).

Write to your senators and representatives (state and federal).* Their offices will send you information on current legislative issues, as well as bills that have already been passed.

Call your state senator or assembly person (all should be in the local telephone directory).*

the League of Women Voters. They will provide source material on a non-partisan level.

the Wisconsin Legislative Hotline (toll free) 800-362-9696 for up-to-the-minute information on current issues before the assembly or senate.

*If you do not know who your senators and representatives (state or federal) are, consult the Wisconsin Blue Book or call your local public library.

Many information sources (free or for a minimal cost) concerning the legislative process within the federal government and when Congress acts of plans to act are out-lined in a chapter called "Keeping Up With Legislative Activity" in Congress and Health: An Introduction To the Legislative Process and Its Key Participants. Fourth edition. Government Relations Handbook Series. National Health Council, 1740 Broadway, New York, NY 10019. This book is well worth its minimal cost.

WHY we should strive to gain more information on legislative issues affecting libraries is obvious -- our jobs, our profession and our concern with public access to information are all influenced by it. Of equal importance is that we need to know where we stand on an issue (for or against) so we can communicate effectively with the people who ultimately influence that outcome of these issues - the legislators. Now that the allocation of federal monies is shifting to the states, it is even more important for us to be knowledgeable about policies at the state level and make our opinions known to our state representatives.

The next part of this series will discuss how we, as librarians and individuals, can affect legislation.

COWL SERIALS PROJECTS

Both of the LSCA funded COWL Serials Projects are well underway. The Wisconsin Union List of Serials has been produced on microfiche and nearly 800 copies have been distributed. A microfiche reader model has been selected and an order for 200 has been placed. Selection of libraries to receive readers has been made in cooperation with Public Library System Headquarters, Multitype Organizations, and the Division for Library Services. The COWL Serials Data Base Committee is now awaiting receipt of

letters of acceptance from the libraries selected. Delivery of the readers is anticipated in April.

Planning for a series of workshops on Serials Union Listing continues with four workshops already scheduled. The Pittsburgh Regional Library Center (PRLC) staff which was awarded the contract for developing and presenting the workshops will be in Wisconsin the last week in March and the first week in May to conduct workshops and to be available for specific questions regarding union listing.
