## HHS AND MEDICAL LIBRARIES

A recent newspaper report indicated that "new rules for hospitals would relax or repeal many of the requirements governing hospital staff qualifications, sanitation, social services, medical libraries and food served to patients. The stated purpose of the proposed rules is to give hospitals 'increased flexibility in assuring patient health and safety,' by eliminating detailed and specific requirements".

Richard S. Schweiker, Secretary of Health and Human Services, has given preliminary approval to the new rules. The article stated that the rules would be issued next month and the public could then comment on them.

Hospitals must comply with federal regulations if they wish to participate in Medicare and Medicaid. The Schweiker proposals would delete the requirement that each hospital have a medical library. This proposed deletion would not affect JCAH Standards.

A memo from the MLA Legislative Committee indicated that the document is "Regulation Action Memorandum-Medicare and Medicaid Hospital Conditions of Participants" from the Health Care Financing Administration (HCFA) of Health and Human Services. Section 3 on Pages 1 and 2 give the rationale for the proposed deletion of the medical library section. "While availability of current literature may be useful, there is no evidence that the deletion of this standard would result in risks to patient health and safety".

The report has left HHS and is being reviewed by the Office of Management and Budget (OMB). It will return to HHS and be printed in the Federal Register probably after the election. People will then have 60 days to respond to the report.

A discussion with MLA Officers indicates that MLA is collaborating with the NIH legislative people and that the strategy is not to respond to the rules until they are printed in the Federal Register, if it should proceed to that point. Responses will then have the greatest impact as Mr. Schweiker makes his decision about implementation of the rules. He has the power to issue final rules having the force of law.

Although there is a great urge to want to respond immediately, it is best to wait to see whether the rules are published at all. MLA is monitoring the situation closely and will alert people to the most advantageous time to respond. At that time it will be important to encourage other people who feel strongly about this issue to also write letters.

The first issue of the Medical Reference Services Quarterly was published in the Spring of 1982. Library rate is currently \$40.00 and individual subscriptions are \$25.00. It is published by Haworth Press, 28 East 22 Street, New York, NY 10010.

The first issue was well written, practical and informative. It is directed toward both hospital and academic reference librarians. There will be regular sections on User Education, Online Updates, Opinion and Exchange, and Book Reviews. M. Sandra Wood, Head Reference, the George T. Harrell Library, The Milton S. Hershey Medical Center, Hershey, PA is serving as the Editor.

#### CONSULTANTS QUESTIONNAIRE

Included in this Newsletter is the application for people to be a part of the state consultants program. Please refer to the August-September Newsletter for the guidelines for that program. You must meet the criteria as indicated in the guidelines in order to apply for the program. As you will notice there is an opportunity to be a part of two different types of consulting - a consortium consultant and an on-site consultant. Some consortia already have their consulting program in place, but if a consortium does not, then the procedure for finalizing a consortium consultation program rests with each individual consortium. The State Coordinators Office will keep a registry of the on-site consultants and will supply names when queries are made. A committee from the CWHSLN will decide on the members of the registry. Applications must be returned by November 15, 1982.

#### AUDIOVISUAL COPYRIGHT UPDATE

On August 11, 1982 Nancy Marshall testified before the Subcommittee on Courts, Civil Liberties and the Administration of Justice of the House Judiciary Committee concerning HR 5250 and HR 5705, both of which deal with off-air taping of copyrighted television programs. This testimony is important for copyright issues above and beyond off-the-air recording. Nancy, as you may know is not only the Associate Director of Libraries at U.W. Madison Memorial Library, but also Chair of the ALA Ad Hoc Copyright Subcommittee.

HR 5250 provides that it is not an infringement of copyright for an individual to record copyrighted works on a video recorder if:

- (1) the recording is made for a private use or in a private home; and
- (2) the recording is not used in a commercial nature or for purpose of direct or indirect commercial advantage.

While ALA agrees with the above it is concerned that when the law says that something is not an infringement of copyright it implies that other uses are, and therefore requests that a third clause be added that would exempt school and library uses that meet the educational guidelines approved earlier by the Subcommittee (in conjunction with HR 3530).

HR 5705, on the other hand would cause serious problems for all users of recording tapes and video and audio recording equipment. This bill would impose an indirect value-added tax (or royalty fee) on the consumer who purchases a home videorecorder or blank videocassettes or tapes for home use. This tax would also apply to audio recorders and audio tapes and cassettes. The proposed tax would be paid by all consumers engaged in any audio or video recording irrespective of the material taped or recorded. Thus the purchaser pays a tax for royalty purposes even though the use of the material and equipment may have nothing to do with off-the-air recording of copyrighted materials.

ALA opposed this bill on the following grounds. Consumers paying the royalty tax added to the purchase price are being subjected to a hidden tax. Even some off-the-air recording and use of materials is fair use and not subject to royalty. Legislation should await the information collected for and the decision resulting from the Supreme Court determination in the case of Universal City v. Sony Corporation. Producers of copyrighted materials are already compensated for their work by those to whom they license the work for broadcast purposes. Payment is predicated on ratings and the rating services count tapings as well as viewings in arriving at their numbers. Since consumers indirectly pay those who constitute the existing market for these programs, to pay again in the form of a tax on recording materials and equipment constitutes double payment. Another cost of double payment is exemplified by ABC which is planning some middle-of-the-night scrambled broadcasts especially for recording and viewing on VCRs. Those who pay to subscribe to this service would also have to pay extra for tapes and equipment. Several surveys have shown that the majority of video recorder owners record for the purpose of watching at a more convenient time (time-shifting) rather than for the purpose of keeping the program indefinitely (known as librarying) and that most of them then reuse the tape to tape another program. This practice is fair use. Home and other users of tapes and equipment use tapes and recorders for many purposes other than off-the-air recording, including such medically related uses as taping psychiatric interviews for diagnostic purposes, taping specific nursing techniques for teaching purposes, taping lectures for the use of students, etc.

HR 5705 (Section 6, amending Sec 109(a) of Chapter 1 of Title 17) would allow the copyright owner to prohibit or otherwise regulate the rental or loan of copies of its products, video or audio. Not only would this affect private purchasers who could conceivably be forbidden by the copyright proprietor from exchanging materials among families or making a gift of a collection of purchased recordings but has serious implications for libraries. Some libraries have received ordered videocassettes labeled "Not to be Used in Libraries". This section would have serious implications for the "First Sale Doctrine" in the copyright law under which a copyright owner's control of the product ceases with respect to a particular copy once he or she has parted with ownership of it. (The purchaser may not, of course, copy the item except for fair use purposes). The "First Sale Doctrine" is one well worth protecting.

HR 5705 also would nullify the current exemption for home sound recording for private use of off-air or tapes or records which has been in effect since 1971. This provision would be disallowed under HR 5705. Similar bills extend the exemption to video.

Librarians are advised to keep a close eye on both the Supreme Court decision which is pending and on the work of the Legislature in the area of video and sound recording.

COLAND - Council on Library and Network Development. Appointed by the Governor as an Advisory Committee to the Superintendent of Public Instruction.

COWL - Council of Wisconsin Librarians. An organization with the primary goal of facilitating resource sharing among all types of libraries in the state. Under auspices of COWL, WILS was established in 1972 and WLC in 1975.

CWHSLN - Council for Wisconsin Health Sciences Libraries Network. A council of the libraries of the health sciences network. Representatives are from Resource Libraries, Basic Libraries and organizations.

LCOMM - Library Council of Metropolitan Milwaukee. An organization that plans, promotes and coordinates cooperation and resource sharing among area libraries to help them better serve residents of metro Milwaukee. MASL - Milwaukee Area Serials Union List. A projected 1982 list of journal collections in 33 LCOMM libraries.

Its dues are \$5.00 per year and provide members with meeting notices, dues renewal notices, and a publication entitled MIDLINE which contains Chapter news. Membership states include: Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Kentucky, Michigan, Minnesota, North Dakota, Ohio and Wisconsin. It meets annually in the Fall in various locations within its member states. Ask a member for an address - officers and addresses change.

MEDLARS - Medical Literature Analysis and Retrieval System. Computer based information storage and retrieval system of NLM established to furnish rapid access to NLM's large biomedical literature collection.

MEDLINE - MEDLARS On-Line. On-line search service providing access to MEDLAR citations of over 3000 journal articles and material from selected monographs.

MeSH - Medical Subject Headings. Annual, current authority list for subject analysis of biomedical literature of NLM.

MHSLN - Midwest Health Science Library Network. Soon to be new 10 state region.

MIDLNET - Midwest Regional Library Network.

MLA - Medical Library Association. Annual membership dues will be \$60.00 which includes a subscription to BULLETIN OF THE MEDICAL LIBRARY ASSOC., MLA NEWS, directory of the Medical Library Assoc.
