## COWL AND UNION LISTS

On November 18, 1982, COWL approved union list projects totaling approximately \$50,000 to cover costs of profiling, annual agent fee, and Local Data Record creation for 289 non-OCLC libraries and LDR creation for 5 OCLC libraries who have already been profiled.

The projects include libraries represented by the Council of Wisconsin Health Sciences Library Networks, Northeast Wisconsin Intertype Libraries, Fox Valley Library Council, Wisconsin Valley Library Service, U.W.-Superior, and Sheboygan County Federated Library Service.

When some health sciences libraries appeared both in the Council application and in an intertype application they were retained in the intertype application rather than in the Health Sciences group. The impact of this move should be minimal since all Local Data Records will be entered into the Statewide Union List (WSCU) and subsets of any part of this can be produced once the data is in.

OCLC plans to offer hard-copy off-line products (paper, fiche or tape) in the third quarter of 1983. WILS, our agent, will purchase an off-line product of the statewide list. At that point, subsets of the union list group can purchase the off-line products desired. As pricing and timing information become available it will be passed on to Council members.

will be on the network to discuss those items. And last, but not least, Mary Campfield, Director of the Libraries at Winnebago Mental Health Institute, a relatively newcomer to the field of elected officials will discuss the view from the elected office as they must look at programs and budget priorities. Mary is a county supervisor for Winnebago County.

The second program in the Seminars for Health Sciences Librarians will be at 10:00-11:50 on Wednesday, January 5. Because of the currency of the program there will be no hand-outs available since most are not yet released. Join the ETN again for a full session of issues.

## WHSLA EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT

### Call to Order

The meeting of the Executive Board was called to order by Ann Taylor at 6:05 PM on Thursday, October 7, 1982 at the Pfister Hotel, Milwaukee. Following discussion of the menu for the cocktail party, members agreed to cancel dinner reservations.

### Present

Those present were introduced. Board members present included Ann Taylor, Margaret Allen, William Nielsen, Susan Anderson, Glen Salter, Deborah Hall, Harvada Oitzinger and Barbara Schmiechen. Committee chairpersons and members present included Jean Hawkins, Kay Cimpl, Betsy Merriam, Neil Hootkin, Deb Nordgren and Mary Bayorgean. Margaret Allen was appointed to serve as acting Secretary.

### Minutes

The last paragraph on the first page, under Bylaws, was corrected to read as follows: Deb Nordgren also requested that the Bylaws Committee suggest how to fill incomplete terms of Members-At-Large. (Later examination of the Bylaws indicated that the Bylaws had dealt with the problem). M. Allen moved that the minutes of the May 20, 1982 meeting be approved as corrected; the motion was seconded and carried.

### Treasurer's Report

The Treasurer's report was accepted as distributed (Copy attached). The Membership Directory was discussed and errors noted. Sharon Hoepfer is the Fox River Valley area representative; Margaret Allen is the Northern. At least one member, Joan Zweifel, was omitted from the list.

### Committee Reports: Bylaws

J. Haekins reviewed the concerns regarding the bylaws as outlined in her memo to the WHSLA bylaws committees, along with committee responses. (Copy of memo attached to official minutes). Discussion followed. Regarding petitions, for the nomination of additional candidates, a date needs to be specified in the bylaws-February 14 was suggested. Members agreed that the 90 day ballot mailing was unnecessary, and that the three weeks last year was fine. Mailing of ballots can be addressed in the guidelines. The major problem was the dues deadline in March, which is too

late for an accurate mailing list for ballots. A due date of January 15 was recommended, with mailing of dues notices in November. Dues will then be applicable to the year for which they are paid. The idea of membership cards was discussed and rejected. A. Taylor directed the Bylaws Committee to incorporate the ideas discussed in Bylaws revisions to be presented to the membership in the Spring of 1983.

Legislation

Members discussed the article distributed by A. Taylor regarding proposed changes in Federal Regulations for hospitals that apply to all participants in Medicare and Medicaid. These rules would eliminate the requirement for a Medical Library that carries a monetary impact. B. Schmiechen reported that MLA advises waiting to respond until the proposed change is published in the Federal Register. At that time, responses from clients, including physicians, nurses, and administrators, will be needed as well as librarians. A. Taylor volunteered to write a letter and phone members to initiate appropriate action at the appropriate time. If feasible, the Newsletter will also include information.

Membership

D. Hall presented the brochure as developed by a subcommittee consisting of Carolyn Barloga and Darrel Robb. The basic brochure will be typeset, with an insert to be used when appropriate. The latter will not be typeset and will be easy to update. The cost will be \$67.50.

Planning and Development

K. Cimpr reported that the survey report is complete and they are waiting for further direction from the President.

Program

The final report of the 1982 Program Committee was mailed with the agenda (copy attached to official minutes). A. Taylor reported on plans of the 1983 Program Committee, co-chaired by Laverne Samb and Sr. Louise Terese Lotze. The meeting will be April 28-29, 1983 at the Holiday Inn in LaCrosse. The program theme will be Improving Your Image; four speakers from the LaCrosse area will address various aspects of personal and professional growth.

Continuing Education

M. Allen reported that two MLA CE courses, MeSH and NLM Classification and the Literature of Allied Health have been tentatively selected for the annual meeting, based on the 1981 CE Survey. Concerns regarding offering two courses were discussed; the board agreed that WHSLA would support the risk of offering two courses. Discussion regarding half day workshops followed - presentation of two workshops on different levels was advocated. The Continuing Education Committee will review data from the WHSLA CE and Planning Surveys in planning workshops for the annual meeting.

Old Business

(1) Correspondence

A. Taylor read a letter from Bessie Stein thanking WHSLA for the lifetime membership. We must be sure to continue to list this in the membership directory.

(2) Budget/Newsletter

The impact of newsletter costs on the budget continues to need monitoring. Decreasing the frequency to ten may not help that much because the number of pages

will continue. B. Schmiechen reported that the combined August/September cost was \$114; WHSLA's share would be 30% of the annual cost according to the current agreement with Middleton Health Sciences Library.

New Business

(1) Online Users

B. Schmiechen reported that she is working with the Online Users Subcommittee of the CE Committee and with U.W. Extension regarding use of ETN in alternate years for an online users group. She will be meeting with the subcommittee, chaired by Jacqueline Glick, at 8:00 AM Saturday, October 8, 1982.

(2) WHSLA Monograph

M. Allen reported that information will be forthcoming in the Newsletter. Alana Ziaya and Al Zimmerman will serve as co-editors.

(3) Stationary

B. Schmiechen announced that she has WHSLA stationary available to those who need it.

Adjournment

The meeting adjourned at 7:50 PM.

Included within the Newsletter is an updated journal list of the holdings of Milwaukee Children's Hospital. Meg Wold in her note states "This is a freely offered service; no reasonable request will be denied. In several instances, there is no library listed in this region as holding the title. Requests for these journals have been referred to NLM although I have repeatedly offered them. Turn-around is roughly 8 hours; phone requests are acceptable (if you can reach me). Avoid the network; shop at home". Remember that this is not an exchange list but a holdings list.

HHS AND MEDICAL LIBRARIES-UPDATE

Word from one of our Wisconsin Congressman indicates that the HHS guidelines are still at the Office of Budget and Management (OMB). MLA HOSPITAL LIBRARY SECTION NEWS

Medline Terminals for Hospitals

Hospital librarians presently without access to National Library of Medicine data bases may want to check with their hospital's purchasing department for a terminal which can be used to access these data bases. The terminals in the purchasing departments of many hospitals are used by purchasing to access the American Hospital Supply Company and other hospital suppliers. Since these terminals are not in constant use they can be utilized by the hospital librarian for accessing Medline and other NLM databases.

Librarians and Patient Education

The American Hospital Association (AHA) has recently released a new policy and statement on the hospital's responsibility for patient education services. In addition, an implementing kit for the policy and statement was mailed to AHA member hospitals in June.

Librarians are specifically mentioned under the human resources sections of both the statement and support materials and in the examples of specific patient education activities in the support material.

MORE PUBLICATIONS FROM MHSLN

Basic Library Management for Health Science Librarians, 2d ed., 1982.

The second Basic Library Management for Health Science Librarians, has become a reality! The 1982 edition is a complete revision of the original MHSLN publication of 1977. The updated version of "BLM 2" is a valuable resource tool which can serve as a "ready reference" manual for the inexperienced or untrained health science librarian.

The looseleaf format of the publication allows easy access to each of the twelve indexed "basic" chapters. Topics covered include specific information on the various services health science libraries are expected to provide. Some of the chapters are "The Health Science Library/Information Center," "Administration of the Health Science Library," "Selection: Building the Library Collection," "Cataloging and Classification," "Patient/Consumer Information," and "Resource Sharing and Library Cooperation."

There is a bibliography and an index plus a chapter for each of the six states in the Midwest Health Science Library Network. (State chapters will be available to MHSLN members in the appropriate state.) Price: \$32.00 (\$40.00 outside Region VII).

Hospital Administrators' Packet

The Hospital Administrators' Packet is a collection of articles and statements designed to provide hospital administrators with useful information on the establishment of effective library service, and to make them aware of the nature and value of well-developed hospital library services.

The packet includes statements from health-related organizations and health science professionals concerning the promotion and support of library services in health science libraries, as well as information on resources and collection development, bibliographies of core lists and management resources, the whys and hows of establishing a hospital library, suggested minimum guidelines for average costs and acceptable standards for the development of library services in hospitals. Price: \$4.00 (\$5.00 outside Region VII).

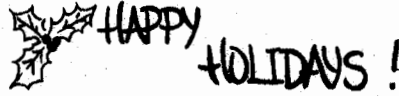

The Medical Library Association has collaborated with the University of Wisconsin—Extension Communication Programs/Library & Information Science in redesigning one of their regular continuing education courses to be presented over ETN. Members of MLA may use this course towards recertification.

This course is intended to acquaint librarians, who have online searching experience in the National Library of Medicine Databases, with the techniques of searching the literature of psychiatry. The course will include an indepth examination of the psychiatric terminology in the third, *Diagnostic and Statistical Manual (DSM-III)* of the American Psychiatric Association, and of the relationship between DSM-III and Medical Subject Headings (MeSH). There will also be a comparison of psychiatric searching techniques in four databases: Medline, PsychoINFO (Psychological Abstracts), National Clearinghouse for Mental Health Information, and Social SciSearch. It is hoped that participants will thus become more effective mediators between the end users and the database systems.

- II. Diagnosis and Assessment
- III. Treatment Methods
- IV. Special Populations
- V. Forensic Psychiatry
- VI. Major Online Databases
- VII. Other Pertinent Databases



They are designed to: increase patient ability to cope with the disease by offering examples of how other adolescents have dealt with them; enhance communications with parents, peers, and caregivers; help patients deal with the reactions of others; and reduce patient sense of isolation and of being different. These materials were developed after extensive evaluation and pretesting with adolescent patients and health professionals.
