HHS AND MEDICAL LIBRARIES

The January 3 Wall Street Journal reported that the Reagan administration has now formally proposed the revised guidelines for participation in Medicare and Medicaid. The new wording according to the January 4 Federal Register indicates that "we would delete the provisions that address Medical libraries. We believe that this should not be a federal requirement but that each hospital should have the flexibility of deciding whether to have a medical library". (48 FR 299) The original statement "while availability of current literature may be useful, there is no evidence that the deletion of this standard would result in risks to patient health and safety" has been deleted. You are reminded that these guidelines pertain to non-JCAH accredited hospitals.

By the time this Newsletter reaches you, all WHSLA members should have received an action statement from the WHSLA Legislative Committee. The statement will also be sent to other Consortia Coordinators through Council Chair Deb Hall for dissemination to other health sciences librarians. This statement outlines methods of responding during the 60 day period which ends March 7. The statement will also be published in the February Newsletter for there will still be time to respond then.

MLA-CE ONLINE SEARCH IN PSYCHIATRY

Wisconsin health sciences librarians have the opportunity to participate in the MLA-CE 464 Online Search in Psychiatry on the Educational Telephone Network. The course will be held on February 10, 17, 24 and March 3 on Thursdays from 10:00-11:50.

The instructor will be Barbara Epstein who developed the course and has taught it a number of times since its introduction in November, 1980. It was originally a project of NLM's SCORE (Standing Committee on Online Retrieval Education) Committee, and is modeled after the MLA-CE Neoplasia Course. Barbara is a Reference Librarian at Western Psychiatric Institute and Clinic, a part of the University of Pittsburgh School of Medicine. She has been on staff for the past seven years and does online searching in BRS, Dialog and MEDLARS. She has also been an instructor at the University of Pittsburgh Library School.

Enrollment is limited to 25. There is still time to register. The December WHSLA Newsletter contained a registration form.

MEDLARS CHANGES

Several important changes in the MEDLARS online system will take place this month: SUNY (State University of New York) MEDLARS service will be discontinued, and all MEDLINE backfiles will become available online. These changes; scheduled for December 13, are made possible by the recent installation of an IBM 3033 multi-processor system at NLM.

Since 1973 the SUNY Computer Center in Albany has served as a backup to the NLM computer to provide access to some of the MEDLARS databases. Since April 1980, new users have been assigned to the SUNY computer as their primary access point for selected databases, thereby distributing the use between the two facilities. The newly installed IBM 3033 will allow all users full NLM access to all databases. With the discontinuance of SUNY service, the hours of operation at NLM will be extended until 9:00 p.m. (e.t) weekdays. Saturday hours remain 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. (e.t.)

The increased storage capacity of the IBM 3033 will also allow all MEDLINE backfiles, covering journals literature from 1966 forward, to become available online. The files will be segmented as follows:

- . MEDLINE 1980-present
- . MED77 1977-1979
- . MED75 1975-1976
- . MED71 1971-1974
- . MED66 1966-1970

The addition of all MEDLINE backfiles online will allow for immediate retrieval of references to the older literature. The capability to enter a search strategy for processing at night with the results mailed the next day (OFFSEARCH) will continue to be available.

An additional change, scheduled for December 31, is the discontinuance of EPILEPSYLINE on the NLM system. NIH's National Institute of Neurological and Communicative Disorders and Stoke, producer of EPILEPSYLINE, has made arrangements for the database to be made available commercially through Bibliographic Retrieval Services (Latham, NY).

NEW COPYRIGHT SUIT

Nine major publishers filed suit on Tuesday, December 14, 1982 against New York University, 10 of its faculty members and an off-campus copy center, charging them with copyright infringement. The suit, financed by the Association of American Publishers, is the association's first legal action aimed directly at universities and faculty members accused of violating the 1976 Copyright Act.

It was reported that books or parts were copied and then used as classroom texts.

Carol Risher, of the Association, handles copyright issues and indicated that NYU was not necessarily the worst violator but is representative of the activities of many schools. Townsend Hoopes, President of the publishers association said its purpose "is to bring a stop to this illegal practice. The A.A.P. hopes that the suit will make the academic community aware that they are violating the law so that they will change their photocopying practices. A.A.P. member publishers will vigorously enforce their rights."

The A.A.P. is continuing to enforce copyright compliance. In November it announced an out-of-court settlement with E. R. Squibb & Sons which eight publishers had accused of violation of copyright compliance through its use of photocopying practices in regard to several scientific journals.

THE KING REPORT

King Research Inc. was engaged to study libraries, publishers and photocopying by the Copyright Office. The Research group was asked to furnish data to help assess whether section 108 of the Copyright Act of 1976 "has achieved the intended statutory balancing between the rights of creators and the needs of users of copyright works". Because of the dramatic changes as a result of the Copyright Act of 1976, Congress asked the Copyright Office to conduct a review every five years. Libraries, Publishers and Photocopy: Final Report of Surveys Conducted for the Copyright Office by Dennis D. McDonald and Collen Bush has been published for the Copyright Office (\$25.00) by King Research Inc., P. O. Box 71, Rockville, MD 20850. A summary of the report is printed in Information Hotline, vol. 14 (10), November 1982, 1, 5-8.

The reaction to the survey is mixed. Library Journal, December 15, 1982 carries an article titled "ARL disputes King report on copyright". The Association for Research Libraries claims that the Study unfairly favor the private sector and belittles library efforts to follow the new copyright laws. Shirley Eichelman, Executive Director of ARL, had previously testified to the Copyright Office that the law has achieved the intended balance. At the same time the American Association of Publishers is asking for changes in the law because they feel that balance has not been achieved. STATE DATA BASE: LATEST UPDATE AND UPDATE BACKGROUND

Update

The vendor for the statewide data base, Brodart, Inc., has now completed just over 90% of the processing to merge the 4,085,338 OCLC archival records that have been cataloged by Wisconsin libraries on OCLC since 1975. After the OCLC records have all been merged, Brodart will merge three non-OCLC data bases from Gateway Technical Institute, UW-Oshkosh, and the Oshkosh Public Schools. Six to eight weeks after the final merging of the non-OCLC records, the vendor will produce the statewide COM catalog.

The MITINET microcomputer program recently completed a 10-week testing program in 11 Wisconsin libraries. MITINET is designed to operate on the Apple II Plus microcomputer. The program will allow libraries not having MARC records an opportunity to convert their collections, and thus participate and contribute to the further development of the statewide data base. MITINET, which will be available free to Wisconsin libraries, will be operational when the state COM catalog becomes available.

Update Background

The Division for Library Services (DLS) is developing a statewide data base of print and non-print titles held by Wisconsin libraries. The initial data base is being formed by merging machine-readable cataloging (MARC) records that libraries in the state have input through the OCLC cataloging subsystem. The data base will also contain non-OCLC records from Gateway Technical Institute, UW-Oshkosh, and the Oshkosh Public Schools. Unique

titles will be retained along with the libraries holding specific titles, their local call number, and other local information. A state COM catalog will be produced on microfiche from the data base. Special subject catalogs of large-print titles, foreign language collections, A-V materials, etc., may be produced at some future date.

Once a library has its titles converted and input into the statewide data base, it can extract those records and use them to generate local products. COM catalogs on microfilm or microfiche can be produced for an individual library or for an area-wide union catalog. Magnetic tape(s) in the LC MARC format can also be produced for use in an automated circulation system or online catalog.

Throughout the late winter months and early spring 1982, Division staff were busy collecting and compiling the voluminous data that a project of this magnitude generates. Several questionnaires were sent to participating libraries seeking data on their cataloging practices. A meeting was held with a committee of librarians and a representative from the vendor, Brodart, Inc., in May 1982 to review the results of the questionnaire and discuss other problems. Robert Bocher was hired at the end of June to manage the project. Paul Jakoubek, from the Division, also began programming the MITINET microcomputer program.

In early September, 172 pages of technical specifications for the statewide data base were sent to the vendor. In mid-October, WILS sent Brodart the last OCLC archival tapes containing records through June 1982; and DLS, which subscribed to the quarterly tapes, sent Brodart the July-September 1982 tapes. Although there are approximately 55 OCLC libraries or processing centers (representing a total of 137 libraries) participating in this project, there are over 1,000 separate 4-letter holding library codes. Each holding library represents a separate branch library or a specific collection within a library, such as reference or juvenile non-fiction. A holding library may also have its own automatic stamp, user defined input stamp, oversize designation, and classification. Detailed information on every holding library was sent to Brodart as part of the specifications. Every library uses the OCLC cataloging subsystem in certain unique ways, and it was not possible to write technical specification for a project this large that would incorporate everyone's local practices. However, the specifications followed the general cataloging procedures recommended by OCLC and WILS. By following recognized guidelines, fewer problems will be encountered in tape processing and the best results on a statewide level will be obtained.

The Medical Library Association has collaborated with the University of Wisconsin—Extension Communication Programs/Library & Information Science in redesigning one of their regular continuing education courses to be presented over ETN. Members of MLA may use this course towards recertification.

This course is intended to acquaint librarians, who have online searching experience in the National Library of Medicine Databases, with the techniques of searching the literature of psychiatry. The course will include an indepth examination of the psychiatric terminology in the third, **Diagnostic and Statistical Manual (DSM-III)** of the American Psychiatric Association, and of the relationship between DSM-III and Medical Subject Headings (MeSH). There will also be a comparison of psychiatric searching techniques in four databases: Medline, PsychoINFO (Psychological Abstracts), National Clearinghouse for Mental Health Information, and Social SciSearch. It is hoped that participants will thus become more effective mediators between the end users and the database systems.

- III. Treatment Methods
- IV. Special Populations
- V. Forensic Psychiatry
- VI. Major Online Databases
- VII. Other Pertinent Databases
