Thursday's schedule includes a MLA-CE course on MeSH taught by Susan Hill of Kansas City, Missouri. Arthur Hafner, Director of the AMA Library in Chicago, will be the instructor of the course he developed for MHSLN on descriptive statistics. This course has been expanded from the usual half-day course to a six hour course. Susan Kirkbride of Middleton Health Sciences Library-Madison will teach a half day course on the reference interview. HOSPITAL LIBRARY STANDARDS - MARCH 2-ETN

Rosalind Dudden currently chairs the MLA standing committee, the Hospital Library Standards and Practices Committee. The present activity of that committee is to write quantitative, minimum standards for hospital libraries, as directed by MLA.

We are pleased that Rosalind has consented to join us on the ETN Network, March 2 for the third in our series of ETN Seminars for Health Sciences Librarians at 10:00. The handouts will include the sixth draft of that committee. Although the deadline for responses to the draft is February 1, this can still be a good time to respond to the committee. These standards would be considered as recommendation by MLA for a minimal practice of librarianship in a hospital library and would provide consultants and practicing librarians with a standard for levels of service and collection size that would be considered minimum.

VIDEOCASSETTE SERIES SOON AVAILABLE FOR INTERLIBRARY LOAN

The UW Center for the Health Sciences Library Audiovisual Unit has recently been investigating the possibility of subscribing to the Audio-Video Digest Foundation's videocassette series, produced by the University of California-San Francisco School of Medicine, for statewide loan.

Theoretically, the series is aimed at primary care physicians. (This is because the Audio-Video Digest Foundation is a nonprofit subsidiary of the California Medical Association.) However, this information, while not necessarily oriented specifically to other health professionals, certainly may prove useful to nurses, physician assistants and other health care personnel.

Each of the programs, a 50-minute videocassette program with accompanying printed summary, bibliography and self-assessment examination, is acceptable for two prescribed Category 1 hours by the American Medical Association's Physician's Recognition Award and for prescribed hours by the American Academy of Family Physicians.

We will need assistance from you in determining what titles we purchase and in publicizing these programs to potentially interested people within your institution. Each month we will receive a listing of available programs and the "Feature Program of the Month." (Please see attached questionnaire.) If others in your institution are responsible for audiovisual services and programs, could you please either ask them to respond directly to the following questionnaire or obtain their input in filling it out? If there is no response, we will have to assume that there is little interest at your institution in these programs.

For the time being, we will be subscribing to these programs in a 3/4-inch videocassette format. We realize that many of you have 1/2-inch machines, but unfortunately, we do not know how many of you have what. Depending upon your response to our questionnaire, we may have to shift our subscription to another format.

SUBJECT: U.S. Department of Health and Human Services/Health Care Financing Administration
Proposed Regulations for Hospitals' Participation in Medicare and Medicaid:
Effects on Hospital Libraries.

BACKGROUND

In 1966 the Medicare planners, believing that access to information was needed to practice good medicine, wrote the following provision into the CODE OF FEDERAL REGULATIONS... (4) hospital should have "modern textbooks and current periodicals relative to the clinical services offered." The planners stated that the library must be "organized, easily accessible and available at all times" and that it must contain "modern textbooks in basic sciences and other current textbooks, journals and magazines..."

The Health Care Financing Administration (HCFA) of the Department of Health and Human Services is proposing a revision in the above section of the CODE OF FEDERAL REGULATIONS. The revision would affect the regulatory requirements which hospitals must meet to be certified for participation in Medicare and Medicaid.

The stated purpose (Federal Register, January 4, 1983) of the revision is "to reduce Federal requirements, simplify and clarify regulations, and provide maximum flexibility in administration, while protecting patient health and safety."

PROPOSED CHANGE

"19. Medical Library. Current regulations (42 CFR 405.1030) require the hospital to maintain a medical library, in or adjacent to the facility, containing modern textbooks, journals and periodicals. We would delete the provisions that address medical libraries. We believe this should not be a Federal requirement, but that each hospital should have the flexibility of deciding if it wants to have a medical library."

IMPACT

This proposed revision deletes the federal requirement for a medical library as a condition for participating and being reimbursed for medicare/medicaid. The deletion of these federal regulations would not affect Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals (JCAH) or American Osteopathic Association (AOA) Standards and would directly affect only about 1500 of 6700 hospitals currently participating in Medicare and Medicaid programs. (JCAH and AOA accredited hospitals, with their own standards, are automatically eligible for Medicare and Medicaid programs.)

However, the impact of the recommended changes could have other implications:

1. If standards for hospital libraries are withdrawn, your hospital may eliminate the "expense" of a library . . . professionals and patients will lose access to essential, current medical information and the quality of care would be diminished.
2. JCAH or AOA standards could be lowered following the lead of the federal government and a larger number of hospitals could be affected.

- 3. Your hospital could opt out of costly JCAH accreditation (hospital must pay for this). Since by meeting (lowered) federal standards the hospital can still be reimbursed for Medicare/Medicaid, there may be no need to continue the costly JCAH accreditation.

WHAT CAN YOU DO Write a letter and ask PROFESSIONALS FROM OTHER HEALTH RELATED AREAS in your institution to write making the following points:

- 1. There is a critical need for current information in providing quality patient care services. Especially relevant: anecdotes and examples illustrating instances of ^{when} information provided to the practitioner affected patient treatment. Cite the following article, or other documentation.

Scura, Georgia and Davidoff, Frank. "Case Related Use of the Medical Literature". JAMA, 1981, vol. 245:50-52. The authors measured the impact of library services on actual case management. Patient management was affected in 20% of cases and diagnostic thinking was influenced in an even higher percentage of instances.

- 2. Since the deletion of the medical library requirement is part of a larger deregulatory effort to provide more flexibility to hospitals and to reduce hospital costs, it is important to point out potential savings from library services--information provided on diagnostic or treatment regimens may reduce costs by avoiding unnecessary laboratory tests, consolidation of library materials can eliminate costly duplication of journal subscriptions, trained library staff can save time for hospital personnel in retrieving information, etc.
- 3. Cite examples of interlibrary loan programs, regional journal holdings lists, staff training programs, and other cooperative arrangements which provide improved services for even the smallest libraries at lower costs and increased efficiency.
