NEW REGION 3 MEETING REPORT

The first meeting of the new Region 3 (now known as GREATER MIDWEST REGIONAL MEDICAL LIBRARY NETWORK) was held at Pheasant Run, St. Charles, Illinois on Feb. 7-10, 1983. The meetings were structured to cover Organizational Development (O.D.) programming during the day, with the Regional Advisory Council sessions scheduled during the evening. Allan Yamakawa from the University of Illinois led the O.D. sessions.

In setting up the governance structure of the new region, a model was chosen in which five geographically based groups of resource libraries would elect two representatives from among themselves to sit as voting members on the Regional Council. The five groupings

The ten resource library representatives together with the ten state council representatives make up the Regional Council, an advisory body to the Regional Medical Library which oversees network activities in our region. The executive Committee was elected from the Council membership with David Curry serving as the first chairperson. Betty Sawyers, Sue Ager and Pam Elwell make up the rest of the committee.

Initial discussions the first day centered on our perceptions of the possible meeting outcomes both positive and negative. Common concerns expressed covered the development of regional programs that were "valuable" to users, the need to seek user input and use this input in setting realistic priorities for Region 3. The need for open communication in all directions, cooperation and accountability were several additional outcomes discussed. Following this, Yamakawa led the group in a needs identification session which focused on our "network" needs of the next three years. These identified needs became, in essense, our strategic planning variables on which the rest of the organizational development sessions were based. Each person selected four items from the list of twenty-six identified needs. The overall priorities or "key result areas" were:

- 1. LOCATOR TOOLS DEVELOPMENT
- 2. BETTER USE OF TECHNOLOGY
- 3. MULTICHANNEL COMMUNICATION IN THE NETWORK
- 4. USE OF ELECTRONIC COMMUNICATION AND OTHER HIGH TECH ISSUES
- 5. DEVELOP STRATEGIC PLANNING PROCESS FOR REGION
- 6. ESTABLISH UNIFORM ILL POLICIES

Using these "key result areas" Tactical Action Planning Groups of five or six people were set up where each group actually laid the groundwork for upcoming Region 3 programming. Specific proceedures were outlined for each priority (objective) with potential target completion dates and the individual or group responsible for its accomplishment were identified. More specific information will be published in the upcoming issue of the new Region 3 newsletter to be call 3 RESOURCES.

WHSLA LEGISLATION COMMITTEE

The WHSLA Legislation Committee met in December to discuss the Committee's function and priorities for this year. WHSLA President Anne Taylor attended the meeting and worked with committee members in expanding the functions of the Committee. The two new functions in the following list are underlined.

WHSLA FUNCTION OR ASSIGNMENT: (as assigned by the WHSLA President)

- The Committee shall serve as a clearinghouse of information on state, regional and national legislation and government action related to libraries and librarianship and keep members informed on a regular basis through the WHSLA Newsletter.
- When appropriate, write and/or inform members to write elected officials on matters affecting libraries and librarianship.
- Provide liaison with MC/MLA Legislation Committee.
- 4. Provide liaison with other state library legislation committees.

There were two main agenda items at the meeting:

 Preparation of an Information Paper to members regarding steps to be taken on the proposed changes of the Federal Medicare/Medicaid Conditions of Participation, specifically on the proposed deletion of a requirement for hospitals to have a medical library.

You all should have received a memo from Mary Blackwelder and myself giving information regarding the proposed changes in regulations for hospital participation in Medicare and Medicaid and the effect on hospital libraries. The WHSLA Newsletter has also been providing up-to-date information on this issue. I hope we were able to generate many letters to the Department of Health and Human Services on this important issue.

WHSLA Legislation Committee communication chain in Wisconsin.

Legislation Committee members also discussed the important issue of how the Committee disseminates information to members and to others in the state. The hope was to effect a legislative information chain which was sensible, effective and efficient. (The MC/MLA Legislative Committee was also interested in this information.) The procedure which was established tries to take into consideration individuals and groups (Council of the Wisconsin Health Sciences Libraries Network, Wisconsin Library Association Library Development and Legislation Committee as well as WHSLA members) who might be interested in relevant issues. It also attempts to establish a method for disseminating information quickly in emergency situations such as the Medicare/Medicaid proposed regulation changes. The proposed procedure for communication is as follows:

The WHSLA Newsletter serves as the usual communication method.

Action papers, defined as critical communications to those concerned about current issues requiring timely action or reaction, are also sent. For timely communications or action papers, the Legislation Committee prepares an action paper, e.g. sample letter to legislators or outline of pertinent information. The materials are then sent, with a cover letter, by the Legislation Committee Chair:

- to the CWHSN President who distributes it to council members who, in turn, distribute to consortia members
- to the WHSLA President who sends a copy to all WHSLA members
- to the WLA Library Development and Legislation (L D and L) Committee and, if possible, to its Legislative Network representatives. (In most cases materials will go to the WLA Library Development and Legislation Committee and its Chair. The Committee Chair then distributes the materials to WLA Legislative Network representatives. In situations requiring a timely dissemination of information, the materials would be sent directly to the Legislative Network representatives by WHSLA Legislation Committee Chair.)

Please contact one of the Committee members if you have questions or suggestions about this procedure. In addition, please let me know if you would like to be part of the WLA Legislative Network. WLA Library

Development and Legislation Committee Chair, Kathy Schneider, has told me that they are looking for special library representatives.

MEDLARS NEWS

Medlars Study Favorable
The November-December 1982 National Library of Medicine
News reports that the Office of Technolgy Assessment's
report was supportive of NLM's MEDLARS system and the
policies that guide that system. The OTA report preface
signed by OTA Director John H. Gibbons states "a
principal finding is that in most respects MEDLARS is an
efficient system for disseminating health-related
bibliographic information".

The study was carried out by OTA analysts with advisory assistance of twenty members from the health care community. It was an in-depth report of 150 pages that addressed the "development, current status and conditions under which MEDLARS databases are made available to the biomedical community. There is also a discussion of private sector health information systems, the relationship between these and NLM'S services and pricing, and other policy issues as they relate to both NLM and the private sector. (NLM News p.3) The full report - MEDLARS and Health Information Policy: A technical memorandum, September 1982, is available from USGPO for \$6.50. Stock number 052-003-00891-2. Middleton will be receiving this report.

New Computers

The recent installation of two new IBM 3033 processing units and equipment to couple them as a multiprocessor system has resulted in expanded capacity of the NLM computer. Because of this, services through SUNY of Albany, NY have been discontinued. Since 1973, SUNY has acted as a back-up to the computers at NLM and since 1980 new users were assigned access to SUNY as their primary computer. The new system will provide room for future developments.

MEDLINE online back to 1966
The new computers now allow MEDLINE users to search all files back to 1966 online. This allows for immediate access to all backfiles. The option to run backfiles offline for mailing the next day is still available. The segmentation of the files is as follows:

HOSPITAL LIBRARY STANDARDS

Rosalind Dudden of Mercy Medical Center Library and Chair of the MLA Committee on Hospital Library Standards and Practices gave a very complete picture of the proposed standards at the March 3 ETN. The MLA standards will be quantitative as a guide to measure specific library services and materials. The Committee is currently doing the last draft before presenting the document to the MLA Board for approval this spring.

Participants at the ETN received a copy of draft #6 of the standards and Rosalind discussed rationale for the structure and wording. The Wisconsin Survey was one of the resources used in determining final figures.

During the program it was reported that a very recent contact with Eloise Foster of the AHA library indicated that JCAH is currently revision the JCAH Accreditation Manual. Four chapters are out for review and there is no indication that the Professional Library chapter will be in the next review group. JCAH has traditionally worked very closely with MLA in the development of the library chapter, and every indication is that they will continue to do so in the future.
