CWHSLN SPRING MEETING

Early morning hours have become the rule for the meetings of the Council for Wisconsin Health Sciences Libraries Network. April 29 was no exception as full representation was present at the LaCrosse meeting. It was a very busy two hours with members feeling that we could have used a full day. The Council also began to feel more uniquely its need for existence as it moved through many items created by the new Region 3 directives from NLN, and its own state work as it worked to strengthen the Wisconsin Health Sciences Library Network.

Eileen Emberson, State Representative to the Regional Council (RC) presented several items for discussion and action relating to the new Regional contract. One of those items was the survey of the underserved and unserved areas of the State. All areas responded, but the Council felt that there was more work that it might do in regard to this issue that would better meet the needs of Wisconsin's

unique geographical coverage of the State by consortia. Another issue was the availability of a small amount of contract funds for collection development within the Region. The Council went on record asking GMRMLN (Region 3) to distribute the money among the States for Councils to make the decisions about its use. The Council also requested the Region to continue to publish the Directory of Consortia.

The major action taken was the decision to create a State Serials Locator List through the University of Kentucky as a first and immediate step in serials listing. After investigation by Joy Shong, Chair of the Committee, it was determined that listing through the University of Kentucky would be available almost immediately and at a cost manageable by most libraries. The COWL grant awarded for listing through OCLC will still be considered, but current energy will be utilized to bring as many libraries as would like into the University of Kentucky serials list. Full information and procedure will be presented at the summer CWHSLN meeting. Libraries will be resurveyed very shortly for inclusion in the union list. The cost for input will be either .07 or .10 per title depending on the level of information sent to Kentucky.

Other important items included a long range planning proposal, and instructions for a fall election for state representative, alternate, and member-at-large to begin a January 1 two year term. Full minutes are available from Barbara Schmiechen.

CANCER INFORMATION NEWS

Cancer Information New Phone Number

The Wisconsin Cancer Information Service (CIS) has a new easier to remember toll-free number: 1 (800)-4 CANCER. The service, located in Madison, now has the same number as the 20 other CIS offices across the nation, allowing callers to pass it on to out-of-state friends and relatives who will automatically be connected to the CIS offices serving their areas. Despite great progress, the disease still affects two of every three families. CIS is there to help when people need it and the new number will make it easier to remember where to call. The Wisconsin office, established in 1974 by the UW Clinical Cancer Center, was the first of its kind. It became the model for the national program which started two years later. Since opening, the Wisconsin CIS has handled about 35,000 calls.

PDQ

Have you introduced your medical staff to the Protocol Data Query (PDQ)? This is an important service of MEDLARS in assisting in the care of cancer patients, and all physicians should be notified of its existence. (See the November 1982 Newsletter for full details). Search time is free through June allowing you to learn to search the Data Base, and to do demonstrations. Take time to acquaint people with this service now!

ONLINE NEWS

Acquired Immunodeficiency Syndrome (AIDS)

Last month the Newsletter gave you an elaborate search strategy for AIDS. Almost immediately following, it was announced in the March NLM Technical Bulletin that Acquired Immunodeficiency Syndrome will be a new MeSH heading beginning in the June Index Medicus. It is already up via

computer, but currently it is not mapped back, so both MeSH and the strategy in the April Newsletter must be searched for a comprehensive search.

New Material Added to the HEALTH File
Weekly Government Abstracts: Health Planning Series published by NTIS has been added to the HEALTH file. (See the March 1983 NLM Technical Bulletin for complete information.)

BRS After Dark - DIALOG Knowledge Index
People are inquiring about using their personal computer to access bibliographic data bases. Carol Tenopin authored an article in the March 1, 1983 Library Journal, pp. 471-474 in which she evaluates and compares the two services "BRS After Dark and DIALOG Knowledge Index: Database Searching on Personal Computers".

UW-EXTENSION LIBRARY SCIENCES PROGRAM

One thing that is interesting and enjoyable about educational experiences is the opportunity to meet librarians from all different types and sizes of organizations with a whole range of educational backgrounds and work experiences. Participating in the Certificate of Professional Development in Library Management provides just such an opportunity.

The Certificate of Professional Development in Library Management is a new program of courses offered by the UW-Extension Communication Programs/Library & Information Sciences. It is an organized curriculum of required and elective courses open to anyone who has library supervision or management responsibilities or aspirations. The Certificate, which will be suitable for framing, is earned by enrolling in the program, completing three core courses and four or five elective courses for a total of 12 Continuing Education Units (CEUs).

Three CPD program courses have been held so far. "Effective Communication for Library Managers." (an elective course) September 17-18, 1982; "Personnel Management," (a certificate core course) October 1-2, 1982; and "Community Analysis," (an elective course) November 12-14, 1982.

Four more courses are planned for the spring and summer. It will be interesting to see whether the participant representation changes as the number of enrollees increases.
