Area Representatives

WHSLA Expenses

FALL ETN PROGRAMS BEGIN

The August Newsletter announced and included registration forms for various Fall continuing education courses. November is fast approaching at which time the Fall ETN programs begin. Two series are currently available for health sciences librarians. People must register for all sessions within a series. There are registration forms for both series included in this Newsletter.

Health Sciences Library Seminars

On Wednesday November 2 at 10:00-11:50 the first session will be conducted by Mary Williamson of WILS-Wisconsin Interloan Service. She will be addressing the issue of copyright and will be bringing us up to date in that area. Join us in keeping in touch with other librarian in the State and participating in relevant issues within the field. This has been an annual series for a number of years sponsored currently by UW-Extension, Allied Health Program Unit and the UW-Madison Schools of Medicine and Allied Health. The series has been granted MLA accreditation.

Health Sciences Online Users

A new ETN series has been initiated by the WHSLA Online Users Committee for all searchers in the State. There is now a large number of people with online searching capabilities in the health sciences libraries in Wisconsin, and it is important that quality searching be maintained. The Online Users Committee designed this course with that purpose in mind.

The first of this two part series will be held Tuesday, November 15 at 1:00-2:50. That first session will focus on Drug Related Databases. The instructor will be Ruth Swanson, formerly of Middleton Health Sciences Library, UW-Madison. Ruth is currently a search analyst for Abbott Laboratories in North Chicago, IL.

You are urged to be a part of this new series in order to enhance your searching skills in a practical workshop type ETN where specific searches will be discussed. Make this a must if you are a searcher.

ONLINE SEARCHING AND FILE HEALTH: AN UPDATE

If you have retrieved pertinent references to NTIS documents in searches of the Health Planning and Administration File but do not want to buy them from NTIS, you should consider contacting the Institute for Health Planning's Reference Service. The Reference Service is a microfiche depository for documents announced in NTIS's Health Planning and Health Services Research newsletter, from which Health File's newly added references are derived. IHP's 10,000 microfiche are arranged in the library by NTIS order number (usually beginning with "HRP" or "PB"). A request for microfiche loan should include the number, which is part of the full computer record. Interlibrary loan requests are welcome by phone or mail. There is no charge to Wisconsin health science libraries for microfiche loans. INTERLIBRARY LOAN NEWS

Since the beginning of October, NLM is charging \$5.00 per item for interlibrary loans. A credit account can be set up through NTIS and /or bills will be sent quarterly.

The other important change is that if you have verification tools you can go directly to Resource Libraries in the Region as well as NLM. In order to make this possible YOU MUST HAVE TWO TOOLS--the GMRMLN List of Serials and SERHOLD. These are both in microfiche. They are available through the GMRMLN Management Office. (See the latest issue of 3 Sources for complete ordering information.)

GMRMLN REGIONAL COUNCIL MEETING

The Regional Council met in conjunction with MC/MLA at Cincinnati, Ohio, September 27-28. This was not a regionally funded meeting therefore neither our State Representatives Eileen Emberson nor alternate Deb Hall were able to be present. Pat Brennan, Director of Todd Wehr Library-MCW, attended as one of the two elected Resource Library Representative from Iowa and Wisconsin. Barbara Schmiechen attended from Middleton Health Sciences Library as an observer.

Fran Johnson of NLM reported that Resource Improvement Grants for single institutions and consortium development and the Project Grants are available and that libraries are encouraged to apply. It is not clear how much money will be available until the Medical Library Assistance Act is passed by Congress.

Wisconsin's State Council application was accepted, therefore it is recognized as a State Council within Region 3.

A great deal of time was taken discussing the GMRMLN series list. There are forty-four copies that must be sold in order to guarantee that the University of Illinois through the Contract will be willing to continue to participate in producing such a list in the future. Resource libraries will be asked to help supplement the debt in order that future issues will be released after this year. It was also determined that any group can negotiate with the University of Louisville in order to segregate any smaller set of library holdings.

In the online area, NLM has decided not to videotape this current years indexing session. The response of the Region libraries was not adequate to create a videotape of the Region 3 update session. The good news is that NLM is looking at taping next years session. Pat Pinkowski is still working with BRS to clean up and update the Online Regional Monograph data base.

Several unserved-underserved projects were reviewed and additional data is being sought. The Executive Committee will make the final decisions for inclusion in the proposal for the 1984 contract renewal.

LIBRARY LEGISLATION TASK FORCE HEARING STATEMENTS

Library Legislative Task Force
Public Hearing
October 1, 1983

Statement on behalf of WHSLA

I, Margaret Allen, President of the Wisconsin Health Science Library Association, am very glad to have this opportunity to testify on behalf of the membership. We are pleased that the Library Legislation Task Force has invited library organizations to comment on the issues that the task force should consider.

The information we as health science librarians provide assists health professionals in delivering the best health care to Wisconsin citizens. Wisconsin health science librarians are committed to providing more comprehensive outreach and consultant services to rural and urban areas through increased access to health care information for the state's health professionals and citizens.

We recognize our role in the health science information system as well as the importance of working with librarians from other types of libraries.

The special needs of health science libraries were addressed in the Report of the Council on Library and Network Development on State Aids to Medical Libraries in Hospitals, December, 1982 - a study directed by the Legislature. At our September 22, 1983 Executive Board Meeting, acting for the membership, we decided to support the goals and recommendations of the COLAND report. The goals were:

Goal I:

Strengthen and improve the state level health sciences library coordinator position at the University of Wisconsin-Madison William S. Middleton Health Sciences Library.

Goal II:

Strengthen and improve resource sharing programs involving health sciences libraries, both among themselves and with other types of libraries through three subgoals:

- Goal II - A - Inclusion of health science library collections in state union list of serials.
- Goal II - B - Development of compatible communication systems and automation programs, in health science libraries and adaptation of these programs, as necessary, to basic unit (hospital) library needs.
- Goal II - C - Strengthen the ability of Wisconsin Health Science Resource Libraries to provide interlibrary loan and reference referral services to health science professionals and consumers.

We believe that the issues raised by these goals should be addressed by the task force; they are too critical to wait another ten years.

Likewise, we would like to see the task force address the issues relating to cooperation with other types of libraries by seriously considering the COLAND report on Regional Organizations for Interlibrary Cooperation and Sharing: The Development of Multitype Library Systems in Wisconsin; December, 1982.

Some of our members have experienced the benefits of active multitype cooperation in their areas; others have not been so fortunate. We would like to see multitype library systems considered, as a better way of meeting the library/information needs of the residents of Wisconsin. We share many concerns with all types of libraries, such as continuing education, consultant services, and the need for resource sharing.

In conclusion, in today's health-conscious society, the health-related information needs of both health sciences professionals and the consumer can be better met through improved state support of the health science library network and multitype library cooperation.

Library Legislative Task Force
Public Hearing - Madison

October 5, 1983

I come to you today wearing a number of hats. I am on the staff at W.S. Middleton Health Sciences Library on the UW-Campus - a State Level Resource Provider. My portfolio at Middleton includes a half-time position as State Coordinator for Health Science Libraries in Wisconsin. I also come today as a member of the Council for the Wisconsin Health Sciences Libraries Network (CWHSLN), and a member of the Wisconsin Health Science Libraries Association (WHSLSA) - the H.S. professional organization. My statement therefore attempts to coordinate all those facets.

Issues relating to the state health sciences libraries were addressed in the COLAND Report released December 1982 on "State Aids to Medical Libraries in Hospitals." Since health sciences libraries exist in medical schools, institutions and businesses, the findings reflected on us all - not just hospitals. We appreciated the opportunity for input into that document and would hope that the recommendations will be kept in mind as the Library Legislative Task Force proceeds with its work.

Health sciences libraries see as their mission the enhancement of access to information to the health care provider and all health science support staff, and in many instances they assist in making available information to the public. Libraries which may provide these services range from the State Level Resource Providers whose services are always available to the public to many of the smaller hospital libraries. Regardless of the source, the intent is to provide assistance to the health care professional and support staff in providing the best possible health care to the people of Wisconsin and/or assist people of the State to understand better their own health and health care.

Our roles as members of the health sciences library information system can not stand alone, for our librarians and our user's needs extend beyond the health sciences literature. Other disciplines, techniques, and resources cross the specialized area. We therefore look to library cooperation to assist us. We in turn assist others in the use of health sciences library services and materials.

Many of our libraries are involved in multitype library structures and some of our health sciences consortia are multitype. Some libraries must withhold cooperative activities because of the potential strain of increased workload with no future prospect of personnel increases. I can not speak for them individually, but must speak for the principle of multitype structure with local option a necessity as we look at parent structures of the health sciences libraries.

We therefore want to be active participants in this legislative process and ask that the Task Force be aware of the role we play in this total library information system within the State - both within the formal multitype structures and the health science library network.

In conclusion some of the issues arising from several recent COLAND reports that we would like to see addressed by the Task Force are:

1. Continued inclusion of health sciences libraries along with all other types of libraries in planning and governance at all levels.

- 2. Continuing recognition of special networks as contributors to public good.
- 3. Needed funding for State level resources providers of all kinds which may not be under contract at present with the Division for Library Service (DLS).
- 4. If the decision is made to continue with public library systems, segregated funding for intertype or multitype functions should be available to promote cooperation rather than competition for scarce resources.
- 5. There should be a clear definition of what is to be accomplished either through segregated funds or multitype systems so that the many library groups and organizations around the State can work in a complementary way with intertype networks.
