Sandra Hoffman, Information Specialist at the University of Wisconsin, Madison Rural Health will serve as the non-consortium representative to the State Council.

The State Council (CWHSLN) serves as a vehicle to bring together issues of health sciences libraries in the State. It is the liaison Council with Region 3 and other Wisconsin Library Networks and Associations.

WHSLA BOARD MINUTES

WHSLA Executive Committee Meeting
September 22, 1983
Clinical Sciences Center
Madison, WI

Call to order

The meeting of the Executive Board was called to order by President, Peg Allen on Thursday, September 22, 1983, at 10:16 a.m. at the Clinical Sciences Center, Madison, WI.

Present

In addition to Peg Allen, the following board members and committee chairpeople were present: Pat Craven, Barb Schmiechen, Jackie Glick, Anne Taylor, Xena Kenyon, Kay Cimpl, Mary Bayorgeon, Harvada Oitzinger and Diana Slater.

Minutes

The reading of the April Executive Committee Minutes was dispensed with. However, these minutes were corrected in Nominating & Election Committee section to read "...Members at large are Linda Oddan, Xena Kenyon, Jackie Glick, Susan Anderson, Mary Bayorgeon and Pat Craven."

Treasurer's Report

Pat Craven, WHSLA Treasurer, distributed copies of the Treasurer's report. The 1982 WHSLA Annual Meeting made a profit of over \$700.00. Peg Allen suggested that the Executive Board send a letter of commendation to the co-chairs of the meeting, LaVerne Samb and Sister Louise Lotze, thanking them for their hard work. Peg agreed to send the letter in behalf of the Executive Board.

Peg Allen distributed copies of the WHSLA expense reimbursement forms and reminded committee chairs and board members that these forms were available, that these forms should be used when submitting receipts, and that they need to be directed to the WHSLA President for approval before submission to the Treasurer.

Peg indicated that she had not yet worked out a WHSLA budget for 1984.

There was some discussion about who had copies of the WHSLA Guidelines. Apparently, the Treasurer's copy has been misplaced.

Pat Craven described the Membership Committee charge to recommend possible guidelines for officer/committee expenses that may or should be reimbursed. Pat indicated that committee discussion centered primarily on travel, (reimbursement for mileage) and meals for board, committee and possible annual meetings. Nancy Wacker is currently surveying committee chairs for their ideas. Once the results of the survey are tabulated, Peg Allen suggested that these recommendations be submitted to the entire membership for comment and approval since they may have a profound effect on the WHSLA budget.

Committee Reports

Membership Committee

Pat Craven, Membership Committee Chair, distributed copies of the membership committee report.

Board discussion centered on the committee's proposed guidelines on how to handle situations when checks are returned to the treasurer for insufficient funds. (These checks may be in payment for membership dues, meeting/continuing education course registration or meals.) Anna Green, membership committee member, suggested the following: Upon receipt of the first insufficient check, return it to the member with a letter requesting another and enumerating the consequences of dismissal from the organization and loss of all

associated privileges. If the second check is insufficient, return it with a notice of membership cancellation. The board accepted these guidelines with some modification: first, the individual whose second check bounced would receive the second letter which would be a letter of dismissal and would ask for reimbursement for the bounced check fine (to be reimbursed by money order or cash rather than check.) Secondly, such an individual will not be allowed to rejoin (be reinstated) WHSLA without paying past debts. (This includes insufficient fund fines.)

Pat Craven will formulate the guidelines based on these recommendations of the Executive Board and Membership Committee and insert these into the overall Treasurer Guidelines.

Program Committee

Mary Bayorgeon reported on the planning for the 1984 Annual Meeting to be held on April 26 and 27 at the Paper Valley Hotel in Appleton. The program theme is technology and the library. Mary described in detail planned activities, including the continuing education courses -- one MLA continuing education course and one non-MLA course on the use of microcomputers to be taught by a UW Oshkosh faculty member. Mary requested recommendations about whether this non-MLA course should be a whole or half-day course and what topics should be included.

She indicated that the Executive Board meeting is scheduled for Thursday evening, 5:30 -7:00 p.m. The Council breakfast is scheduled for Friday morning at 7:00 a.m. She also talked briefly about Friday's events including the keynote speaker, a UW Oshkosh professor, who teaches microcomputers and the concurrent sessions.

Continuing Education Committee

There was no report from Eileen Emberson, committee chair, but Mary Bayorgeon reported activity for the Annual Meeting.

Online Users Committee

Barb Schmiechen reported that the Educational Telephone Network programs for online users have been approved for MLA continuing education credits. She also indicated that the Online Regional Technical Resource person is willing to come into the State to teach a 4-hour update session. There was some discussion about whether this update session could be offered statewide over the Educational Telephone Network or whether there might be some value in having her speak at the WHSLA Annual Meeting.

Bylaws Committee

The Committee is currently waiting for input from WHSLA members about which bylaws they are having problems with. Committee chairpeople, officers or anyone else who have noted difficulties should contact Darel Robb before the end of December 1983.

Election Committee

The Elections Committee will be providing biographical information for the next WHSLA election. Right now the Committee is devising a form to gather this biographical information.

Legislation Committee

Peg Allen reported that the Committee will be putting together a notebook describing the

legislation communication chain for both the state and national (including the Medical Library Association) levels.

Peg also reported on her presentation at the Annual Meeting for discussion of the State Superintendent's Annual Report on Multitype Library Cooperation. She reported that a Library Legislation Task Force will hold hearings in Rhinelander and Madison to talk about the funding and structure of public libraries and multitype library cooperation. Peg will attend the October 14th hearing in Rhinelander to support multitype library systems, and Barb Schmiechen or someone else from the State Council (CWHSLN) will read a statement, supporting the multitype library system, at the October 5th Madison hearing.

Peg mention also that the Wisconsin obscenity laws are currently being revised and some bills may require watching.

Old Business

1. Planning and Development Committee

Kay Cimpr discussed the survey conducted by the Planning and Development Committee two years ago. She expressed concern that the survey may no longer be relevant due to the delay in action by the Board.

Mary Bayorgeon felt that planning and development for WHSLA should be an ongoing activity and that there should be a standing committee to handle it. Kay indicated that the committee charge should be written by the Board rather than just the president or the committee chair.

It was recommended that in the future WHSLA surveys be coordinated. Small returns (such as in this survey) may not reflect true membership feelings. (Several committee surveys on different topics had been conducted in this same year.)

Barb Schmiechen thought that the WHSLA Board should work to set up a standing committee and generate whatever bylaws changes were needed and a charge for this committee by next Spring (the next Board meeting.)

The general feeling was that this standing, planning and development committee, chaired by the president-elect, should propose planning activities. Peg Allen will appoint an ad hoc committee (revitalize the former planning and development committee) to try to work out the composition of the standing, planning and development committee and to design a charge for it. Peg will also recommend to the Bylaws Committee that the new committee become a standing committee.

2. Newsletter Report

Barb Schmiechen reported that \$744.00 paid for the 12 monthly issues for the WHSLA Newsletter reflects true costs. She indicated that in previous years some of the staff and printing costs had been picked up by the UW Middleton Health Sciences Library. The amount paid by WHSLA this year pays for all costs in distributing the Newsletter to all WHSLA members.

Barb also encouraged people to send articles or items of interest to her for publication in the Newsletter.

New Business

1. Peg Allen volunteered to write to the GMRMLN its Suggested Minimum guidelines for Health Science Libraries published by MHSLN as part of the packet to administrators, recommending that it seriously consider substituting the proposed MLA Standards for Health Science Libraries in Hospitals for its own Suggested Minimum Guidelines. Jackie Glick seconded Peg Allen's proposal. Peg Allen will then write to GMRMLN Management Office in WHSLA's behalf.
2. Elections for the 1984-1986 are representatives are to be held by January 20, 1984. The name of the newly elected representative should be sent to Peg Allen as soon as the new area representative is chosen. The new representatives are welcome to attend the WHSLA Board meeting at the Annual Meeting and will officially take office immediately after the 1984 Annual Meeting in April

Peg mentioned that because all WHSLA members in a specific geographic area may not necessarily belong to the local consortium, it might be wise to use mail ballots to elect area representatives.

3. Barb Schmiechen talked about the State Council's (CWHSLN) need for funds for such things as subsidies for the COWL serials project and to cover postage and other costs that arise when conducting Council business. Since the Council is a mandatory organization, representing Wisconsin libraries' interests to the region (GMRMLN), she felt that WHSLA might begin to seriously think about allotting funds to the Council for conducting its business. Further discussion about this was delayed for the time being.

Adjournment

The meeting was adjourned at 1:00 p.m.

ONLINE USER NEWS

NLM Online Update Clinic, October 13-14, 1983.

The two day clinic was in two parts. The first day consisted of a search strategy clinic in the morning, at which participants split up into small groups to discuss strategies of specially chosen searches, comparing the method used by the facilitators with those suggested by the group. The afternoon was entirely taken up with details of the changes in the National Library of Medicine databases for 1984. The rationale for additions and deletions of subject headings, etc. were explained from the point of view of both indexing and online searching.

The second day was devoted to six concurrent sessions. It was possible to attend four. Peri Schuyler of the NLM staff presented two excellent

sessions on immunology, one a basic review of definitions, terminology, etc. and the other of subject headings to be used in searching. There was an informative session on pharmaceutical searching by Michael Homan of Upjohn, and a presentation on suggested post-search communication and quality control for searches. Another session was on the new GTE/AMAnet. GTE (which we all know as Telenet) is marketing the services for AMA. Services available include online reference books such as "AMA Drug Evaluations", "Current Procedural Terminology" and "Current Medical Information and Terminology". AMA has available a machine-searchable version of "Medical Socioeconomic Research Sources" and is going to be making available a subset of "Excerpta Medica". The AMA library will provide document delivery. The 6th session was on end-user searching of databases. Many places have end-users searching private (or internal) databases, but few have had much experience with having end-users actively searching the commercial search services.

National Library of Medicine News

DIRLINE: Directory of Information Resources Online is the new NLM online directory. This database developed by the National Referral Center at the Library of Congress, contains descriptions of approximately 13,000 organizations including federal, state or local government offices and laboratories, research institutes, university and research center, libraries and information centers.

TOXBACK 65: the TOXLINE file has become available online back to 1965.

End-User Training: NLM announced that progress has been made in the development of an end-user training seminar for health professionals. A one-day seminar focusing on the MEDLINE database and including hands-on practice will be taught at several sites throughout the United States beginning in 1984. This seminar will not replace the regular Initial Training Class given by NLM but will provide a mechanism for clinicians, investigators, etc. to access MEDLINE themselves for the most basic types of searches.

GAO OPPOSES DOWNGRADING OF LIBRARIAN STATUS

Some of our recent discussions on legislative issues have included reports of the Federal Office of Personnel Management attempts to downgrade federal librarian's entry level ranking.

The October 1, 1983 Library Journal indicated that the General Accounting Office has opposed that attempt. Librarians were concerned that the possible lead that was proposed by the federal government would have negative effects on librarians' salaries in other employment areas. The downgrading would have placed the entry level for librarians at GS-7 rather than GS-9. In opposing such a move, librarians stated that it was motivated by discrimination since librarianship is a female dominated profession.

MODIFIED CML FOR NURSES

Valerie Sagers and Marjorie Seeger reported a modified CML program for nurses carried out at McKay Dee Hospital Center, Ogden, Utah in the September issue of Nursing Management.

Because nurses shifts are so structured it is often hard for them to come to a library even in the same site. Ms. Seeger developed a program where she rotates to a nursing unit once a month and meets with the staff to discuss an unusual illness or subject area in which they would like to be updated. She then researches the subject and sends material to that nursing station for the people on various shifts to read and file in that ward. Ms. Seeger suggests that the Director of Nurses be contacted before beginning the program. She began the program with one unit and one head nurse, then established a routine for all units.
