GMRMLN COLLECTION DEVELOPMENT FUNDS

National Library of Medicine Collection Development funds for Region 3 will be available for the 1984-85 fiscal year and will be distributed through the Greater Midwest Regional Medical Library Network (GMRMLN) Management Office. Applications for the allocation of these funds may be submitted by any Resource or Basic Unit Library in the ten-state region and awards will be made by the Executive Committee after recommendation by the Collection Development Committee. A total of \$25,000.00 is available to the region. Applications for any amount between \$2,000.00 and \$25,000.00 will receive consideration. Each proposal must be approved by the appropriate State Council in order to eliminate duplication of materials.

The funds are intended for use in the acquisition of health-related materials that will enhance, extend, or expand an existing collection, fill an identified collection need. Preference will be given to those proposals which clearly indicate the fulfillment of

a need within the Region, e.g., materials dealing with the health problems of a specific population such as the mine workers of Appalachia or the influx of Asian immigrants. However, these funds may not be expended on patient education materials.

Criteria to be used by the Collection Development Committee in recommending proposals and the Executive Committee in making awards will include: 1) the development of a subject area not yet adequately covered in the Region; 2) the ability of the library to provide housing, maintenance, and region-wide access to the materials.

No restrictions will be placed on the types of materials purchased (print, microform, audio-visuals, etc.), but the funds are not intended for the purchase of such things as shelving or office supplies. If a new journal subscription is purchased with the funds, the library must be willing to pick up the subscription after the period of the grant. In submitting a proposal, each library will agree to process all necessary paper work to order specified titles, to catalog, house and maintain the materials, and to make them available to other libraries through Inter-library Loan.

A list of materials purchased with the 1984 Collection Development funds will be published in 3 Sources.

DEADLINES for this program are:

Proposals, together with approval from the State Council, must be submitted by August 1, 1984 to Rikki Horne, Management Office, GMRMLN, P.O. Box 7509, Chicago, Illinois 60680.

Proposals recommended by the Collection Development Committee will be forwarded to the Executive Committee Chairperson by September 1, 1984.

Notification of awards will be made by the Executive Committee by September 14, 1984.

Paperwork (i.e., typed purchase requisitions in proper format) must be completed by those libraries submitting successful proposals and must be received in the GMRMLN Management Office by October 15, 1984.

To avoid duplication within the state, the Wisconsin State Council has formed a committee composed of Deb Nordgren, Chair, Barbara Schmiechen and Eileen Emberson to review applications and send those approved on to the Management Office. To meet the August 1, 1984 deadline, please send applications by July 1, 1984 to Deb Nordgren, Howard Young Medical Center, Health Science Library, P. O. Box 470, Woodruff, WI 54568. An application form is included in this Newsletter.

CONSORTIUM COORDINATORS FEEDBACK NEEDED

Consortium Coordinators are reminded to please get the list of interlibrary loan charges for those libraries within your area with collections which are used often by other libraries in the GMRMLN Region to Deb Nordgren (address above) by June 30, 1984. This list was requested at the Greater Midwest Regional Medical Library Network (GMRMLN) Council meeting and will be published in 3 Sources.

CWHSLN SPRING MEETING

Representatives from all Council units were present at the 7:00 am meeting at Appleton held in conjunction with the WWSLA Annual Meeting. There were a number of new members present including the newly elected people and several new consortium coordinators.

Debra Nordgren reported on the Regional Advisory Council Meeting held in March. In particular she indicated NLM's interest in end user searching, their recruitment of trainers, and the initiation of their user friendly program called CITE later this year. Several items of state importance were discussed. GMRMLN is interested in creating state pages in 3 Sources for distribution in each particular state. Since we have a state newsletter the Council felt that we would rather read about other states news in order to generate new program ideas. The management office is also interested in simplifying the interlibrary loan statistics forms. If you have any ideas contact Deb Nordgren. There again is \$25,000 available for Regional Collection Development. Please note the article elsewhere in the Newsletter. A committee was formed to create a state plan to submit for the 1985 year collection development plans.

The Serials Locator Committee reported that our state list was due to be run mid-summer. At the same time there has been a recent announcement that approximately nine new Resource Libraries would be added this summer. This may delay our state list. The Council voted to create a graduated fee schedule for the state list. The cost will be different for libraries that are not in the list as well as those lists sold to out of state libraries. A small amount of the fee will be used for Network business.

The health sciences libraries still owe COWL for those libraries that were originally profiled for the OCLC Serials Union List and later changed to the Louisville List. Pay back on this will begin through the State Serial List also.

Deb Hall and Barbara Schmiechen will develop a brochure on the Council to be included with the distribution of the State Serials list.

Virginia Holtz, COWL representative reported on recent COWL activities. There are currently eighteen health sciences libraries in the COWL Serials Union List. Several hospitals were sites for the OCLC cataloging project. Most of them felt the system was of great benefit, but too

expensive for a small library. COWL is also involved in a telefacsimile project. Libraries should investigate if interested. The project is still ongoing.

There are some problems with the current guidelines in regard to the election time table. The guidelines will be reviewed by Barbara Schmiechen and Sandra Hoffman.

Betsy Merriam reported on the Legislative Task Force. Feedback to Leslyn Shires must be in to her office by April 11.

Vicki Schluge accepted the invitation to serve as Chair of the Council for the 1984-85 year.

The fall meeting was scheduled for September 14. Full minutes of the meeting will be available from Barbara Schmiechen.

This meant that presently the omission of the medical library in the conditions for participation was not approved by her. MLA will continue to monitor this issue in the future.

SOUTH CENTRAL VAN SYSTEM

Libraries in the South Central Health Sciences Cooperative that are located within the boundaries of the South Central Library System (Dane, Green, Columbia and Sauk Counties) are participating in an SCLS grant funded project to provide van service between multi-type libraries. The van runs daily in the Madison area and several times a week to outlying libraries. It has met with enthusiasm by the health sciences libraries in the area. The grant for the project currently runs until June 30, 1984.
