"This One's for You" is the theme of the WHSLA Annual Meeting to be held at the Holiday Inn, Stevens Point, WI, April 18-19.

Thursday, April 18, two continuing education courses will be offered. "Writing for Results" presented by two English professors at UW-Stevens Point, and "Back to the Basics" - a workshop on book repair and basic library issues presented by the Librarians of the Northern Consortium.

The full program will begin Thursday evening with a dinner at the High Point Restaurant. "Prevention" will be the theme of the evening. Ray Spees, of Developmental Associates in Eau Claire, will be the Friday key note speaker. Meetings of the WHSLA Board and the Council for Wisconsin Health Sciences Libraries Network will be held during this time.

NEWS FROM GMRMLN STATE REPRESENTATIVE

The National Library of Medicine has offered classes for search intermediaries in training health professionals to use MEDLINE. The following Wisconsin health sciences librarians have attended and may be willing to share their knowledge: Mary Blackewelder, Kathy Strube, Carol Antoniewicz, Todd Wehr Library, Medical College of Wisconsin; Jackie Glick, Froedtert Hospital Library, Medical College of Wisconsin; Linda Oddan, Waukesha Memorial Hospital; Susan Anderson, Columbia Hospital, Milwaukee; and Wanda Auerbach, Middleton Health Sciences Library, University of Wisconsin.

The GMRMLN is conducting a Serials Exchange Pilot Program. The program began on January 1, 1985 and is intended to facilitate the exchange of duplicate serials material by providing a list that can be easily scanned and materials available matched with materials wanted. Five Health Sciences Resource Libraries are participating in the pilot program - the University of Iowa, Cleveland Health Science Library, Ohio State University, the University of Illinois, and the University of Wisconsin. Ruby May, Michael Felice, and Stuart Kolner prepared the proposal. The program developed for the IBM PC will merge the exchange offerings from the five libraries into a single alphabetic list by title, further sorted by year of publication with the most recent year first, and sorted by volume: issue number with the most recent volume first. The product is offered through Ontyme II, on diskettes, and paper copy. If the test is successful it will be offered to other libraries in the region and may be adapted for other equipment.

Sally is known to many people in the State for her introductory presentations on microcomputers long before most people were introducing them to their libraries. In this program, Sally will be updating her work with micros, especially in the area of software evaluation, after having worked with various programs for some time. She will also address the issue of the management of software. The program time is May 1 at 10:00-11:50.

DISTRIBUTION OF THE 1985.nlm COLLECTION DEVELOPMENT FUNDS

National Library of Medicine Collection Development funds will be available for the 1985 fiscal year and will be distributed through the Greater Midwest Regional Medical Library Network (GMRMLN) Management Office. Applications for the allocation of these funds may be submitted by any Resource or Basic Unit Library in the ten-state region. A total of \$30,000 is to be distributed throughout the region. Applications for any amount between \$4,000.00 and \$25,000.00 will receive consideration. Each proposal must be screened and endorsed by the appropriate State Council in an effort to eliminate any unnecessary duplication of materials and incomplete or inappropriate applications.

The funds are intended to be used for the acquisition of health related materials that will serve to enhance, extend, or expand on existing collection or to fill an identified need in the region. Successful applications in 1984 covered the topics of nuclear magnetic resonance, ethics, middle-age, environmental toxicology, and human nutrition.

No restrictions will be placed on the type of materials purchased (print, microform, audiovisuals, etc.) but the funds are not intended for the purchase of such things as shelving, office supplies, or equipment. If a new journal subscription is purchased with the funds, the library must be willing to pick up the subscription after the period of the grant. In submitting a proposal, each library will agree to process all necessary paperwork to order specified titles, to catalog, house, and maintain the materials and to make them available to other libraries through Interlibrary Loan.

Criteria to be used by the Collection Development Committee in making awards will include:

1. the development of a subject area not yet adequately covered in the region (inadequacies in subject areas must be documented and verifiable; e.g., description or survey methodology used in determining subject deficiency must be documented),
2. the ability of the library to provide housing, maintenance, and region-wide access to the materials.

Additional points that should be borne in mind:

1. The funds are not intended for the purchase of basic collections (e.g., the Brandon List.) The National Library of Medicine Resource Improvement grants are a more suitable resource for financial aid in obtaining such basic materials.
2. Patient education materials will not be funded although materials on the theory and practice of patient education would be suitable.
3. The application must include a complete list of materials to be purchased, including price, data of publication, and ISBN number, if known. Some changes in the final list may be necessary if items are found to be unavailable or if urgent need by the institution has required purchase before the awards are made.

4. Only those items requested in the application should be included. Copies of articles, letters from administrators, and publishers' flyers are not suitable enclosures.
5. Only one application from each institution will be considered.
6. You may re-submit any 1984 applications, but they must comply with 1985 criteria.

Wisconsin State Councils will screen and evaluate each proposal with respect to the guidelines and criteria listed. Incomplete or inappropriate applications will be returned to the State Council from the GMRMLN Committee.

DEADLINE:

Proposals, together with approval and comments from the State Council, must be submitted to the Management Office by July 1, 1985. Check with your State Council for its deadline. Applications for Wisconsin should be in to Debra Nordgren by June 1. The form is in this Newsletter.

The following article is reprinted from the January 1985 WAAL Newsletter. This is a very good summary of the State legislative situation. Contact your legislator as stated in the last paragraph.

DLS LEGISLATION--WHAT'S IN IT FOR ACADEMIC LIBRARIES

By now everyone should be at least vaguely familiar with the legislative package which will be presented for consideration by the Wisconsin Legislature during its 1985 session. In addition to regular reports and articles appearing in Channel DLS, there were a number of meetings at the La Crosse Conference which focused on the development and intent of the proposal. However, for those who remain a little unclear as to what this is all about - and what it may mean for academic libraries - here is one person's opinion.

Background: In May 1983, State Superintendent Herbert Grover appointed a Task Force on Library Legislation to address issues involving "the organizational and funding problems of public libraries and public library systems and multitype library cooperation, and to assist the Division for Library Services in developing a legislative policy statement on libraries." The Task Force had many meetings, held several public hearings, and completed its final report - including fifty-six specific recommendations and eight policy statements as well as recommendations regarding library funding - in July 1984.

The next step in the process was review of the Task Force Report by the State Superintendent. This was completed with the distribution of a position statement by Dr. Grover in October 1984 in which he indicated those items from the Report which he would be including in his legislative package. The Division for Library Services then began writing the actual language to be recommended to the Governor for inclusion in the biennial budget bill. A draft version of the language was distributed in late November and has been reviewed by many library groups, including WLA. The remaining hurdles to be crossed are finalization of the language and, of course, legislative review and approval.

Highlights for Academic Libraries: While it may be said that the primary focus of the proposed legislation is on public libraries and public library systems, these issues do affect all libraries. There are several items which would have a direct impact on academic libraries.

First: a legislative declaration of libraries and access to information as a matter of statewide concern. This may well be one of the most important issues addressed. If approved, this would clearly express the rationale for the state's involvement in promoting and funding not only public library service but also interlibrary cooperation among all types of libraries. Such a philosophy has not previously been understood nor necessarily accepted by the Legislature. It would assist in assuring the continued strength and independence of public library boards (which has come into question) and would be helpful in paving the way for future funding of multitype services within the State.

Second: significant increases in funding for libraries. This includes not only funding for public library systems but also funding for "state level resource contract" such as the contract between DLS and WLS. Increasing the general funding for library services is in all of our best interests.

Third: additional funds for public library systems for multitype demonstration projects. While this is an area of great potential benefit to academic libraries, it is also one area of the proposal where much work still needs to be done (WLA will be submitting language revisions on this issue). The concept of working towards state funding for multitype services - demonstrations should be seen as the first step in this direction - is generally well accepted. The procedure for accomplishing this, i.e., through public library systems, is not necessarily a popular idea, although it is a practical one given state laws concerning funding of non-governmental agencies such as the existing multitype organizations. However, the proposal is well worth a test. Its success in terms of benefits to academic libraries will be dependent upon how active a role academic librarians choose to play in its further development and implementation.

Fourth: establishment of the maintenance of the statewide data base as a responsibility of the State Superintendent, including a provision for the DPI to assist all types of libraries in the "development of computerized bibliographic data bases." Presently, the entire WISCAT project, as well as support for retrospective conversion, comes from LSCA funds which, in the strictest sense, are targeted primarily for public libraries. This new language could allow the state to be more flexible in providing this kind of support for academic libraries.

Where We Are Now: At this point, we are waiting to see what the final legislative bill will look like when it is presented to the Legislature. WLA will be taking a very active role in working for approval of the bill and for amendments as necessary. As a division of WLA, WAAL will be called upon to assist in this effort. For now, the best thing for every WAAL member to do is to contact your local Legislators to advise them that a major library initiative is forthcoming and to ask for their support. And remember, this is not just a public library proposal.

BOOK REVIEW

Living with the disabled: you can help; a family guide by Jan Coombs. Sterling, c1984. 192 p.; \$7.95.

This little book represents an excellent value for any library. Jan Coombs is a Marshfield writer, mother, library board member, and COLAND representative as well as a former nurse and social worker, and delegate to the White House Conference on Libraries and Information Science. Librarians Gil Johnsson, Sheldon Kaye, Alana Ziaya, and Al Zimmerman are mentioned in the acknowledgements. Needless to say, this is a very well researched book.

A daughter's disabling automobile accident provided the impetus for the book, which emphasizes the family's role in the rehabilitation process. Chapters cover psychological adjustment to disability, ins and outs of hospitals, rehabilitation alternatives, constructive convalescence, help for the helpers, living in the real world, and finances. The information provided in the last chapter on financial resources and the two appendices on organizations for various disabilities and those providing services to the disabled could stand alone to make this an excellent reference book. Many sources of free and inexpensive resources for vertical files are bibliography.

In addition to providing helpful information, it reads very well. Caregivers as well as the disabled and their families could profit from Living with the disabled. The best part is the price!
