MINUTES
ANNUAL MEETING
APRIL 19, 1985
STEVENS POINT, WISCONSIN

CALL TO ORDER

The meeting was called to order by President Sharon Gebhardt on Friday, April 19, 1985 at 1:00 p.m. at the Holiday Inn/Holidome, Stevens Point.

MINUTES

The reading of the minutes for the 1984 Annual meeting was dispensed with; the minutes were approved as submitted.

TREASURER'S REPORT

A question concerning the newsletter expense resulted in the Board tabling the Treasurer's report until Pat Craven could be contacted.

COMMITTEE REPORTS & BOARD DECISIONS

Membership Committee

Sharon Gebhardt gave the report for Pat Craven. As of April 19, 1985, WHSLA has 142 members, as compared to 139 members in 1984. The total paid membership for 1985 is 125 renewals and 17 new members.

Nominating & Election Committees

Midge Wos, Nominating Committee chair, submitted a slate of officers and their biographical sketches to Nancy Campbell, Election Committee chair. Ballots were sent out, returned and tallied; the results are as follows:

Program Committee

Barb DeWeerd reported that 37 members and 5 non-members registered for Friday's session. She also noted that 14 attended the "Back to Basics" class and eighteen registered for the writing course with twelve attendees from St. Michael's.

Continuing Education Committee

Kathy Blaser, chair, reported that a sample survey to assess members' continuing education needs was sent to committee members for approval; additions, deletions, and/or corrections were incorporated into an updated survey form. The updated form was distributed to the Board members for their input. After the final revisions are made, the general membership will receive the survey for completion.

Bylaws and Guidelines Committee

Al Zimmerman, chair, noted that the committee will be working on reconciling some differences between the bylaws and guidelines. Also, in conjunction with the Planning Committee, WHSLA's geographic divisions will be studied.

Legislation Committee

Mary Kotschi reported that the committee met on March 6, 1985 at Winnebago Mental Health Institute. Phyllis Kauffman and Mary Kotschi went to and reported on the WLA legislation day which was held on February 7. Library initiatives that were requested in Superintendent Grover's budget were dropped in the Governor's budget. The library community introduced them through the Senate and Assembly Education Committees. The Joint Finance Committee has conducted hearings out in the State and received comments on the library initiatives.

On the national scene, DLS has LSCA monies until June 30, 1986. The Reagan budget, however, recommended a zero budget for LSCA as well as the National Commission on Libraries and Information Science. Because of this, it is recommended that librarians contact their congressmen. As of late, LSCA has been put back in by the Senate and agreed to in the budget compromise from the White House.

Information was received from Linda Reel, chair, MC/MLA Legislative Committee. Our committee will assist in updating the Wisconsin portion of the handbook.

The committee reprinted an article in the WHSLA Newsletter that was written by Kathy Schneider for the WAAL Newsletter.

Planning Committee

Susan Anderson reported that the committee devised recommendations concerning the issue of reimbursement for expenses incurred while performing WHSLA duties. These recommendations were revised at the November Board meeting and sent to the general membership with the Spring ballot. The recommendations were passed overwhelmingly.

The committee also designed a survey to provide information concerning future planning needs. The surveys were sent out late; however, fifty percent of the members have already responded; the results will be sent to the next Planning Committee.

Recommendations concerning the status of the Online Users Subcommittee and Planning Committee were made by the present committee. The Board accepted the committee's proposal that the Planning Committee be established as a standing committee, chaired by the President-elect with three other members appointed from the Board; appropriate changes will be made by the Bylaws and Guidelines Committee with final approval made via ballot by the general membership.

The Board also agreed that the Online Users Subcommittee become an ad hoc committee for 1985-86, subject to reappointment from year to year depending on continuing membership interest; if it is deemed necessary, the committee could later be made a standing committee.

Newsletter Report

Barb Schmiechen distributed copies of the newsletter report. For 1984, the estimated cost of twelve issues totaled \$756.00, \$63.00 per issue; the estimated cost for 1985 (based on eleven issues) is \$743.60, \$67.60 per issue. Barb also asked that the 1984 check, if it has not already been sent, be issued before July 1, while the 1985 check should be sent after July 1.

Council of Wisconsin Health Sciences Libraries Network

Vicki Schluge reported that fifty percent of the five dollar union list fee goes to the Council while the other fifty percent is used to offset the COWL loan; a \$10.00 maintenance fee will also be charged.

Interlibrary loan statistics from the local groups will be gathered for the months, March and November. Barb Schmiechen would like copies of any Interlibrary Loan Statistics.

Joy Shong stated that she has received 67 orders for the state union list. Of the 64 libraries that participated in the project, 49 have purchased lists. Fifteen requests came from Wisconsin libraries that did not participate in the project; three orders came from outside of the state.

NEW BUSINESS

1986 Meeting

Linda Oddan reported on the Board's decision to hold the 1986 WHSLA Annual Business Meeting in conjunction with MLA. Linda or Susan Anderson will contact MLA about holding the meeting either on Sunday night or Monday morning. The 1987 meeting will be held in Milwaukee.

Closing Remarks by the President

Sharon Gebhardt thanked her committee chairs and

other people who helped her during the year. She also suggested that a decision should be made concerning the annual meeting, particularly since many libraries are facing financial constraints.

New President

Susan Anderson, WHSLA's new President commented that she would be working on officer and committee reappointments. She also mentioned the possibility of establishing an ad hoc editorial committee, comprised of members from throughout the state. This committee would be charged with gathering information to be included in the newsletter.

- *The serials list will only be made up of basic units.

TREASURER'S REPORT

On behalf of Pat Craven, Sharon Gebhardt, distributed the treasurer's report. It was noted that the newsletter was not listed under disbursements. Because of this, the treasurer's report was tabled until Pat could be contacted.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Membership Committee

Sharon Gebhardt gave the report for Pat Craven, committee chair. As of April 18, 1985, WHSLA has 142 members, as compared to 139 members in 1984; the total paid membership for 1985 is broken down as follows:

Program Committee

Peg Allen, reporting for Barb DeWeerd, stated that the CE course "Writing for Results" was attended by nineteen, of which six were WHSLA members and thirteen were from St. Michael's. MLA/CE credits were applied for; however, the committee was waiting for MLA's response. Eleven attended the "Back to basics" class. Peg also mentioned that forty-one individuals had registered for Friday's session. The committee thought that they would break even.

Continuing Education

Kathy Blaser, chair, reported that a sample survey to assess members' continuing education needs was sent to committee members for approval; additions, deletions, and/or corrections were incorporated into an updated survey form. The updated form was distributed to Board members and is to be returned to Kathy Blaser by June 1, 1985. After the Board has made its recommendations, the survey will be sent to all WHSLA members for completion.

At one time the possibility of publishing a WHSLA monograph was discussed. It was decided that a monograph would not be published; however, if members would like to write a substantive article, it could be incorporated into the newsletter.

Online Subcommittee

Barb Schmiechen, reporting for Jackie Glick, commended the SWHSL group for hosting a MEDLINE update and encouraged them to continue. The 1985/86 ETN program is also in place and the topics are: MEDLINE update; MeSH with Susan Kirkbride; and searching the nursing literature with Gertrude Foreman and a representative from CINAHL.

Bylaws

Al Zimmerman, chair, reported that the committee responded to points made by Diana Slater and Deb Hall. In response to Diana's suggestions, the committee decided that WHSLA stationery, logo, and masters be housed with the President; this decision will require a change in point four of the guidelines. It was also decided that the mailing labels be kept with the President; however, the Treasurer will be responsible for keeping the labels accurate. Finally, the secretary will be responsible for mailing and distributing the membership directory; this will require a change in the guidelines, shifting the responsibility for the aforementioned task from the Membership Committee to the Secretary. Deb Hall, via Carolyn Barloga, suggested that the Nominating Committee be responsible for mailing the ballots. This suggestion prompted a discussion concerning the duties of the Nominating and Election Committees and as a result, the inconsistencies between the bylaws and guidelines. Susan Anderson then noted that there are other possible bylaws/guidelines changes that should be discussed; she will gather these changes and charge them to the proper committee.

A motion was also passed to assign the Planning Committee the task of studying the organization's geographic representation.

Susan Anderson noted that in the future the Bylaws Committee will be referred to as the Bylaws and Guidelines Committee. It was decided that the committee's size will remain the same.

- *The Election Committee's duties are quite minimal so the committee could be limited to two individuals, a chairperson and backup. At this point, it was suggested that the Nominating and Election Committees be combined; Susan Anderson will add this item to the list of areas to be investigated during her term.

MEDLARS - MAJOR CHANGES

Several new and important aspects of the MEDLARS system were changed this spring.

1) The minimum monthly charge of \$15.00 per user ID is being discontinued as of April 1. User codes will be charged only for actual use.

2) The hours of operation of the NLM computer will be changed to 24 hours with 15 minutes down time for regeneration of files and other maintenance work.

3) DOCLINE - the electronic Interlibrary Loan transfer system of MEDLARS is expanding. In the near future, Resource Libraries and a few Basic Health Sciences Libraries (BHSL), will be added one region at a time. There will be a gradual increase in BHSL users, region by region through 1985 and into 1986. The Resource Libraries entering the system first will be those in SERHOLD. Implementation will be gradual.

Writing and publishing by individual nurses is important to the nursing profession. The future of the profession may depend upon nurses who can express themselves clearly in writing. But for many people, nurses included, writing is a difficult and painful process. Although there is no easy route or magic way, this course will give nurses specific ideas about improving their writing and becoming effective authors. The course includes:

1. Overview of Publishing in Nursing
2. Query Letters, Developing a Topic
3. Developing a Topic for a Journal Article
4. Article Writing and Rewriting
5. Publishing Opportunities
6. Resources for Nurse Authors
7. Other Kinds of Writing
8. What Does an Editor Expect? What Can an Author Expect?

Nurses have something important to tell both their colleagues and the public. This course helps potential authors to think clearly, explore ideas, and to write down their thoughts in an organized manner.

The University of Wisconsin—Extension Continuing Education in Nursing is accredited by the North Central Regional Accrediting Committee of the American Nurses' Association as a provider of continuing education for nursing.

Writing For Nursing Publications

Audiocassette courses for independent study include taped instruction and printed materials. The eight sessions in N85 include audiotaped lectures, session objectives, pre-lesson activities, session outlines with study guides, post-lesson activities, and bibliographies. Enrollees may elect to take a final examination and earn up to 4.0 CEU for successful completion of the course.

Courses are available for purchase in two formats, with or without cassette tapes. Those who have tapes available may purchase the printed material only, at half price plus handling fee. Purchase of either format establishes eligibility for the final examination.

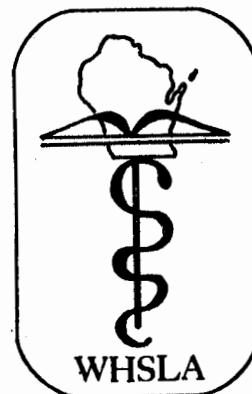
