GUIDELINES FOR JOURNAL LOCATION VERIFICATION

(For Libraries Requesting an Average of 50 or More Interlibrary Loans a Year From Wisconsin Resource Libraries)

Starting in January 1986, the University of Wisconsin-Madison, Middleton Health Sciences Library and Medical College of Wisconsin Library will require that libraries check their requests against ONE of the following union lists:

- A. UW-Madison Center for Health Sciences Libraries (MHSL) List of Serials. (For requests to Middleton.)
- B. Medical College of Wisconsin Libraries (MCW) Philsom List of Serials. (For requests to MCW.)
- C. Greater Midwest Regional Medical Library Network Union List of Serials (GMRMLN).

You are not required to purchase all three union lists. However, a library should have either (A & B) or C.

1. Each interlibrary loan request should indicate the union list in which the title was found, the year published and page number. This information should be indicated in the lending library area of the ALA form. If using electronic mail, indicate in the remarks area.

Example: MHSL, 85, p. 20.
MCW, 4/85, p. 6.

2. Requests should be sent directly to the appropriate resource library that carries the journal.

3. It is still important to verify the accuracy and give the source of the citations. Notice this is in addition to location verification.

4. If unable to verify citation and/or location, please indicate "unable to verify" and state source and send to the appropriate resource library for referral.

Example: Unable to verify not in MHSL or MCW union list.

5. All requests must indicate REFER if not owned by the resource library or the request will be returned. REFER should be typed at the top of the ALA form or in the remarks field when sending by electronic mail.

6. When using the GMRMLN union fiche, if available, please indicate up to four libraries holding the particular journal being requested. Make sure the volume is held by the resource library before indicating the library code on the request.

Example: GMRMLN, 4/85, fiche 3 -
WIS, IND, MAY.

7. The following requests may be returned unfilled.

- A. No MHSL or MCW location, or evidence of an attempt to verify location.
- B. No refer statement.

DIRECTORY OF WISCONSIN NURSING EDUCATION PROGRAMS

If you have found assisting persons interested in education for a career in nursing increasingly perplexing, help is available. The Wisconsin Nurses Association in conjunction with the Wisconsin Organization of Nurse Executives has produced a directory of nursing education programs in the state for use by persons planning to enter the field of nursing, nurses seeking advancement through the educational route and by career counselors, reference librarians and educators.

The Directory of Wisconsin Nursing Education Programs is a resource never available before in the state. It contains a complete description of each nursing education program by type -- doctoral, masters, baccalaureate and technical -- as well as information about admission and educational requirements, tuition, financial aids, class schedules and a wealth of other details of interest to persons who are weighing factors of importance to their future. MEDLARS STORIES: DO YOU HAVE ONE TO SHARE?

The following letter was recently sent to librarian MARTHA C. CHILDS (University of Tennessee, Memorial Research Center and Hospital, Knoxville):

Dear Ms. Childs:
The use of the MEDLINE computer retrieval system was of great importance in my management of a recent case of acute fatty liver of pregnancy. Because this disorder is so rare it is important when managing a case of this magnitude to have quick access to the recent literature on the subject. I was quite impressed with the ability of MEDLINE to deliver to me in less than an hour a complete bibliography of the recent journal articles relating to that disease entity.

This prompt obtaining of necessary medical information was important in our management of her case and I am deeply appreciative of the service that this provides the practicing physician.

The case Dr. Conley was writing about was a dramatic one featured in a local newspaper article. Stories about MEDLINE and its usefulness have also appeared recently in the professional literature, and two are cited in our "NLM in Print" column (p.6): "The Computer as a Medical Tool," by William M. McClatchey, M.D., and "Computer-Assisted Surgery," by Norman Sohn, M.D., and Richard D. Robbins, M.D.

A bibliography you obtained from the HEALTH PLANNING & ADMINISTRATION database may have yielded the article needed in making an important decision for your administrators. BIOETHICSLINE may have helped solve a crisis involving ethical questions. A MEDLINE search may have influenced the course of treatment for a patient.

How the literature can help in medical treatment. Experience from various hospitals has shown that the information received from journal literature, indexes and databases has a direct positive impact in improving patient care. Twenty percent of the doctors interviewed advised that the information supplied to them directly influenced their treatment of patients and altered their methods applied in patient care. Speed and precision is very important in supplying information to the medical doctors and health professionals in order to give them time to digest the information before the decision on treatment is made. Some of the indexes and databases are briefly described, which will give the necessary information with the minimum time and effort for use in medical treatment. Machinery of access to the databases and indexes is suggested with the accent on the microcomputer programs which will allow even the health professionals and librarians who might be unfamiliar with the search techniques to use the databases and indexes effectively.

COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

Introductory Training (INTRO): A full-day session designed for searchers who are new to the BRS/SEARCH System. The emphasis is on basic searching procedures and commands, with an explanation of the creation of an inverted file, use of the BRS logical operators, and unique system features. Hands-on practice is included, and additional practice time is available to each workshop attendee. MLA recertification credit: 7.0 contact hours.

Who should attend: All new BRS users, as well as searchers with limited experience on BRS but not formally trained.

INTRO/2: A half-day session introducing the BRS/SEARCH System to searchers with experience on other systems. The session covers basic commands and system features, but in an accelerated, condensed format. MLA recertification credit: 4.5 contact hours.

Who should attend: Experienced searchers who are new to BRS.

MEDLINE: This half-day session introduces the searcher to the structure and content of MEDLINE and how it is loaded for searching on BRS. The emphasis is on NLM's indexing policies, and the structure of the Medical Subject Headings Vocabulary as well as effective searching techniques on MEDLINE. The Medical and Psychological Previews (MPPS) database is discussed. MLA recertification credit: pending.

Who should attend: Searchers with some experience on BRS.

BUSINESS: This full-day session features the BRS Business databases by providing file descriptions, sample searches, database teamwork applications and a review of the BRS system. The course contains key business databases such as ABI/Inform (INFO), Harvard Business Review Online (HBRO), Management Contents (MGMT) and Predicast Prompt (PTSP). Also included are databases unique to BRS such as Index to Frost & Sullivan Market Research Reports (FSIS), Abstracts of Working Papers in Economics (AWPE) and Corporate & Industry Research Reports (CIRR).

Who should attend: Searchers with some experience on BRS.

FULL TEXT: This full-day session provides an overview of full text searching. The session focuses on the unique features of each of the BRS full text databases, and includes explanations of full text commands and print features. Hands-on practice time is included and additional practice time is available to each workshop attendee. MLA recertification credit: 6.6 contact hours.

Who should attend: Searchers with some experience on BRS.

ADVANCED: A half-day session — designed for BRS searchers who have taken the Introductory Training and would like a review of the system with special emphasis on advanced searching techniques. Using examples from various databases, ADVANCED highlights such features as merged printoffs, SDIs, and search formulation using BRS databases CROS, TERM and FILE. MLA recertification credit pending.

Who should attend: Searchers with prior training and some experience on BRS.

BIOMEDICAL: This full-day session features the BRS Biomedical databases by providing file descriptions, sample searches, database teamwork applications and a review of the BRS system. The course contains key biomedical databases such as MESH (Medline), NAHL (Nursing and Allied Health Literature), EMED (Embase) and BIOL (BIOSIS Previews). Also included are databases unique to BRS such as: CCML (Comprehensive Core Medical Library) and IRCS (IRCS Medical Science Database). Hands-on practice time is included and additional practice time is available to each workshop attendee. MLA recertification credit pending.

Who should attend: Searchers with some experience on BRS.

EDUCATION: This full-day session features the BRS Education databases by providing file descriptions, sample searches, database teamwork applications and a review of the BRS system. The course contains both key education databases such as ERIC and ECER (Exceptional Child Education Resources), as well as databases unique to BRS such as: PETE (National College Databank™) and VECM (Vocational Education Curriculum Materials). Hands-on practice time is included and additional practice time is available to each workshop attendee. MLA recertification credit pending.

Who should attend: Searchers with some experience on BRS.

ON-SITE Training: Any BRS course can be conducted at your facility. Please contact the Training Manager for additional information.
