GMRMLN REGIONAL ADVISORY COUNCIL REPORT

Highlights from the Regional Council Meeting held February 21, 1986 include the following, roughly in the order discussed:

Irwin Pizer reported on the status of the new RML contract for the five years beginning with FY 86. Details were still being negotiated with the University of Illinois. The contract will permit a Management Office staff of three professionals and two support persons. The total amount for the five years is \$2,000,000, which is similar to the previous contract. The addition of several resource libraries had been proposed - only three were allowed. They include the Chicago College of Osteopathic Medicine, the American Dental Association, and the State Library of Ohio. There will be reductions in the number of committees which will be limited to three members each and annual meetings. Several proposed programs were not funded, including collection preservation, medical student education, cooperative acquisitions planning, and strategic planning.

The contract requires increased involvement of health professionals in a network planning, including formal representation; this is a NLN concern. A Task Force of Health Professionals chaired by John J. Buchino, a Kentucky physician, will be formed. Its mission will be to provide feedback from the health professional's point of view. Also, state councils are expected to add an end user to their membership, with appropriate bylaws changes. Please be thinking of health professionals who would be willing to serve on the Task Force or on our State Council. The contract also requires direct services to health professionals. Task force nominations should be sent to Ruby May immediately.

Kim Goldman, formerly interlibrary loan librarian at the University of Illinois, has joined the Management Office staff as Program Coordinator for Regional Development and will be working with DOCLINE implementation.

The contract plan provides for Irwin Pizer and Ruby May to visit each state in the region in the next five years. It was suggested that these meetings be coordinated with state meetings of health professionals and/or librarians - this could be a planning issue for WHSLA and the State Council to consider.

The executive committee is concerned about the relative lack of volunteers for committees, especially from hospital libraries. If you are interested in serving on one of the five regional committees, please contact Ruby May immediately. Their list of volunteers was based on those returning interest forms; of the six Wisconsin volunteers, only one was from a hospital library. Call me if you have any questions about regional committees. If I cannot answer your questions, I'll try to get an answer.

The role of consortia was discussed - is it changing? I am interested in your ideas on this subject to report back to the Network.

The November Regional Council meeting will be held in conjunction with a visit by the MLM Director, Dr. Donald Lindberg, to our region. He is visiting each region as part of the Sesquicentennial celebration of the National Library of Medicine.

Nominal group discussions were held, with a group assigned to each of the following issues:

- How can the Network facilitate interaction with health professionals in Region 3?
- What are the unmet service goals in Region 3?
- How can the RML Management Office facilitate the intra-regional communication?
- What steps should be taken to coordinate collection development regionally?

Results were not available at the meeting; they should be published shortly.

The pros and cons of a standard interlibrary loan charge by Resource Libraries for out-of-state interlibrary loans were discussed. The Council recommended that Resource Libraries be encouraged to charge a \$7.00 out-of-state fee.

The GMRMLN Union List of Serials cost was discussed. A \$100 break even price will be set for 1986. In 1986, states will be allowed to include their state's Resource Library holdings in their state list for a \$1,000 fee, with the approval of the involved Resource Libraries. Adding basic unit holdings was discussed, along with future alternative mechanisms for financing union list activity. One idea was some kind of a tariff on every loan filled/verified by the Union List. Another thought was that inclusion of basic unit holdings would increase sales, thus decreasing unit costs, as much of the cost is in the maintaining of the database, not the actual microfiche.

A final request from the region is for greater participation in the project to update the state directories. Wisconsin's response to this project is insufficient to publish our directory. If you have not returned your directory update form (a copy is attached to this newsletter), or if you don't remember, please do so. Return to:

NEW POLICY FOR TELEPHONE REQUESTS MADE TO
MEDICAL LIBRARY SERVICE (MLS)

Presently, MLS accepts Interlibrary Loan requests via the telephone. A maximum of five requests per institution per day are permitted. Requests which are phoned in must be of an urgent nature, otherwise, an ALA form which has been typed in standard format should be mailed to MLS. MLS would like to be able to continue to accept requests via the telephone because we feel it is important to be accessible by phone. However, in order to process your requests more efficiently, the following new policies will take effect March 1, 1986:

1. Referrals will no longer be made on a routine basis for interlibrary loan requests received via the telephone.
2. If the requesting library must phone in a request and then indicates that the item must be referred (should MLS be unable to fill it), the requesting library will then be charged a \$1.00 fee to cover the cost of typing up the ALA request form.

We regret we must now charge for this service. The reason is simply that in order to send your request to another library, it must be typed on an ALA form in standard format. Up until now, the MLS staff has been able to type these requests for you free of charge. Of course, there is no typing charge added if your request can be filled from the holdings of the Middleton or Weston Libraries. The requesting library wishing to avoid the typing charge should originate their request on an ALA form which has already been typed in standard format.

NEWSLETTER NOTES

Northwest Wisconsin Library System, because of state revenue shortfalls, will implement significant service cuts. To reduce costs, NWLS has canceled the 1986 library development grant program, slashed 1986 AV materials purchases by one third, and cut back 1986 book purchases by 15 percent. Cut in book purchases will have a detrimental effect on the NWLS bookmobile, mail-a-book, and rotating book collection services.

According to Northwest Wisconsin Library System Director, Douglas Baker, these service reductions were necessitated by the Legislature's action to concur with the governor's January 21, 1986 recommendation to cut back library system funding in 1986 by 10 percent.
