ETN SEMINARS MAY 7

The final ETN Seminars will be at 10:00 May 7 with Dorothy Whitcomb of Middleton Health Sciences Library the presenter. She will be discussing "Immunology is Easy to Understand - A Historical Perspective". Dorothy is the History of Medicine Librarian at Middleton and has given presentations both at National Meetings and on the UW-Madison campus relating to immunology and Middleton's strong collection in that area.

These programs have continued to be sponsored by the University of Wisconsin Allied Health Program Unit and University of Wisconsin School of Medicine. They will again be offered in 1986-87.

WLA LIBRARY LEGISLATION DAY

Library Legislation Day sponsored by the Wisconsin Library Association on the morning of February 6, 1986 was successful, enjoyable and informative. The day began with a coffee hour. This was a time when librarian and legislator discussed issues and politics. The only slightly disappointing part of the day was that fewer legislators attended the social hour than expected. The original legislation day was planned for a time when the legislature would be in session. However, they adjourned unexpectedly the day before! Although it would have been great for everyone to have had the opportunity to talk with his or her legislator, every librarian benefited from discussing the issues with their colleagues.

Senator Russ Feingold was the first speaker on the agenda. He discussed briefly the state budget shortfall and the "repair" bill. He suggested to public librarians that they remind the legislators that public libraries "shared more of the pain" (10% cut in public library system budgets) when lobbying in the future for public library funding and programs. Senator Feingold also discussed ways a person can motivate and persuade legislators to support a point of view. He believes that meeting with your legislator face to face is the most effective form of lobbying. Letters come in second in terms of effectiveness, and phone calls are the least effective. He suggested that threats to the legislator were not appropriate.

A speech by Doug Zweizig followed. He is WLA's newly appointed legislative advocate and an associate professor of the UW-Madison Library School. Professor Zweizig gave a review of how the legislative process works in Wisconsin. He then suggested some ideas to develop with legislators when lobbying for library funding. Too often our requests for funds are seen as "self serving." Librarians need to elaborate on how library users and the state benefits from the use of libraries. We need to make the link from the abstract concept of library services to the direct benefits for the state's citizens from these services. Librarians need to point out that an informed citizenry benefits the state, that ignorance costs, and that the state hurts when information is not provided.

The next three speakers discussed current issues pertinent to the type of library they represented. John Nichols, Director of the Oshkosh Public Library, talked about AB537. A Section of this bill would make access to libraries and to library resources and services a statewide concern. Jim Klein, Media Services Supervisor from the Appleton Area School District, discussed the need to improve school library media programs and services for K-12 public school students, particularly to improve those programs for the elementary grades. Dennis Hill, Information Librarian at the UW-Madison Memorial Library, talked about obscenity bills that have been introduced into the state legislature and also about collective bargaining rights for the U.W. Academic staff. The last speaker was Larry Nix, Director of the Bureau for Library Development in the Division of Library Services. He talked about Gramm-Rudman-Hollings and its possible effects on LSCA funding. He mentioned that LSCA funding is part of the 27% of the federal budget that is not exempted from cuts if the G-R-H act goes into effect.

After the speakers, there was a question and answer period. This continued as I sneaked out the side door to return to my library. For me the morning was inspirational as well as being an eye-opener to the current political realities that affect library funding, staffing, and quality of services. I became a more informed citizen and librarian from attending Library Legislation Day. My library and the State of Wisconsin will benefit.
