VIRGINIA HOLTZ NAMED JANET DOE LECTURER

Virginia Holtz, Director of the Center for Health Sciences Libraries, UW-Madison was chosen as the recipient of the 1986 Janet Doe Lectureship. The lectureship was established in 1966 to honor Janet Doe who, prior to her death in 1985, served as Librarian Emerita of the New York Academy of Medicine, past president of MLA, and editor of the first two editions of the Handbook of Medical Library Practice. The Janet Doe Lectureship is subsequently published in the Bulletin of the Medical Library Association. The theme of the lecture is either the history or philosophy of medical librarianship.

Lucretia W. McClure, Director of The Edward G. Miner Library, University of Rochester Medical Center introduced Virginia with the following narrative.

"The individual who to present the 19th Janet Doe Lecture is a person of wide-ranging interests. You may know her through her work in Wisconsin where she is recognized and respected for:

- *developing the Medical Library Service which provides information to physicians throughout the State
- *encouraging the formation of consortia to strengthen medical libraries across the State
- *serving in a variety of capacities in the Greater Midwest Regional Medical Library Network
- *creating telephone network library courses for medical librarians in Wisconsin
- *and her leadership which is acknowledged at every level of library activity in Wisconsin and most assuredly at the Center for Health Science Library at Madison where she serves as Director and Professor. Here her accomplishments include assisting in development of an online catalog and installation of an automated serials and acquisitions system, establishing a branch library in the hospital, and encouraging participatory management and staff development, to name but a few.

You may know her from her work in the Medical Library Association and the many other organizations to which she contributes. She has served on at least a dozen committees of this Association, including the Board of Directors, and as Chair of the Finance Committee. Working with her is a great experience for she has that rare ability to bring many seemingly fragmented ideas together in the formation of concepts. As one of her colleagues said:

She always brought sanity to the wranglings of the Board. First, she could produce a historical perspective on why the issue existed, what previous

decisions had been made, and why, giving us a context and a structure for discussion. Second, she was able to summarize the sense of the group discussion in a motion for action at the time when people were beginning to repeat themselves. And always it was done with gentleness and humor.

You are fortunate if you know her as a friend and colleague for she gives willingly of herself and her knowledge. She has enriched all of us through her creative and expressive writings. To me she embodies all that is meant by "medical librarian," for she is a person of the highest integrity, a person of deep knowledge and rare insight, and one whose kindness is extended to all.

If this were not enough, she is known nationally for breeding, showing and judging collies, many of whom won national awards. Through secret sources I learned that she loves to cook, is a connoisseur of tea, and is most fond of dark chocolate, licorice and marshmallow Easter bunnies!

It is an honor and a privilege to introduce Virginia H. Holtz, the 1986 Janet Doe Lecturer, who will speak on "Measures of Excellence: the Search for a Gold Standard."

We congratulate Virginia for receiving this honor!

MINUTES OF THE 1986 WWSLA ANNUAL MEETING

CALL TO ORDER: The meeting was called to order by President Susan Anderson on Tuesday, May 20, 1986 at the Hyatt Regency, Minneapolis.

MINUTES: The reading of the minutes for the 1985 Annual Meeting was dispensed with; the minutes were approved as submitted.

TREASURER'S REPORT: Janice Curnes, Treasurer reported that as of May 16, 1986, WWSLA has a balance of \$4,890.71.

PROGRAM 1987: WWSLA's annual meeting "The Information Odyssey" will be held in Milwaukee, April 30-May 1, 1987 at the Marc Plaza Hotel. Donald King will present the keynote address; speaker sessions will include Eric S. Anderson, Martha E. Williams, and Kathleen Cimprl. Patrick Brennan is the overall conference coordinator and is also in charge of the local arrangements; Ann Towell and Sunja Shaikh are program coordinators.

BYLAWS AND GUIDELINES COMMITTEE: Peg Allen reported that at the Executive Board meeting, the committee recommended several bylaws changes which were accepted or revised. The bylaws revisions recommended by the board will be sent to the membership for a mail ballot following the Annual Meeting. Changes include some editorial revisions, some elimination of details that belong in the Guidelines, and substantive changes covering the following areas:

1. Five instead of six Area Representatives, with areas defined by counties. Former Western and West Central areas are combined - others are the same. Also, five representatives at large are recommended.
2. Uniform process for selection of area representatives, utilizing the Nominating Committee and the annual ballot.
3. Changing of Program Committee to Annual Meeting Committee, with guidelines to encourage statewide membership involvement in planning the annual meeting, especially on the program subcommittee.
4. Addition of responsibility for planning Annual Meeting continuing education to the Continuing Education Committee.
5. Addition of Guidelines responsibility to the Bylaws and with a corresponding change in name.
6. Clarification of responsibility for elections procedures, giving all election related duties to the Election Committee.
7. Addition of a Planning Committee to be chaired by the President-Elect and include three other board members.
8. Standing committee status for the Online Users Committee.

CONTINUING EDUCATION COMMITTEE. Kathy Blaser reported that an education needs assessment was sent to the members via the August WHSLA Newsletter. The responses were compiled and presented to the Board at their Fall meeting. Board members were asked to prioritize the results. Full day sessions were requested for programs on the one person library and Medline updates; half day programs were requested for classes on automation, software programs, and how to be persuasive. Other topics that generated interest were Grateful Med., censorship, DIALOG, and end-users.

LEGISLATION COMMITTEE: No report.

MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE: Janice Curnes, Membership chair reported that WHSLA has 127 members, nine of which are new members. It was also noted that thirty-nine members did not renew their membership.

The committee also helped to promote attendance at this year's annual meeting by working through the area representatives.

Membership rosters were sent to the members in March. Because of the work involved, Jan suggested that someone should be in charge of maintaining the membership list; Linda Oddan volunteered.

PLANNING COMMITTEE: Linda Oddan reported that WHSLA is now divided into five areas rather than six. This change resulted in a change in the number of area representatives and representatives at large.

The 1988 Annual Meeting will be held April 28-29 in Eau Claire. Ginny Wright will be in charge of local arrangements. A statewide program committee will be formed shortly.

NOMINATING COMMITTEE: Jan Curnes reported for Katie Pavloski that two candidates were obtained for president-elect and for area representatives, except for the western area.

NEWSLETTER COMMITTEE: Su Mallampalli, chair reported that the Newsletter Committee was made an ad hoc committee. The committee has submitted articles in the newsletter on a monthly basis. Su recommended that the committee be continued for 1986-87.

ONLINE USERS: Jackie Glick reported that the 1985/86 programs were a success with 21 registrants for the Update and 18 for the other two sessions. The schedule for the 1986/87 program has been set. On November 13, Helen Ann Brown will give the MEDLINE Update. The second session on January 29, 1987, will consist of two parts. Marketing Databases will be presented by Linda Reel, Director of Medical Services at Jewish Hospital, Louisville, Kentucky and Government Databases will be given by Melissa Yorks, Technical Information Specialist at the National Heart, Lung and Blood Institute, Bethesda. The final session will be on March 12, 1987 with Jane Everitt, Information Specialist for the Upjohn Company, Kalamazoo, teaching a class on full text databases.

The Consultant's Directory will be distributed in the near future.

Jackie also asked if it would be possible for WHSLA to subsidize the costs for the online sessions. She asked that with WHSLA's help they could charge \$40 instead of \$48.

OLD BUSINESS

TAX EXEMPT STATUS: No report.

WHSLA POSITION: Pat Brennan asked if WHSLA had a position concerning the union list for health science libraries at the Council meetings. The group has no official position on this matter. It was suggested that since the organization has a voice at the Council meetings an official statement should be formulated.

NEW BUSINESS

1988 MEETING: As stated before, Eau Claire will serve as the site for the 1988 Annual Meeting. Volunteers for the statewide program planning committee will be sought.

NEWSLETTER: Due to financial constraints, Barb has revised the newsletter's mailing list. It was also suggested that only WHSLA members would receive the exchange lists, therefore reducing the postage for the newsletter. At the Spring Board meeting, it was approved that only ten issues be produced for this year; the June/July and November/December issues will be combined.

BUDGET: Linda Oddan reported that she has budgeted \$1,620 for expenses during the coming year. This figure dips into our cash reserve because at the present time, our projected income is \$750 based on \$5.00 membership dues for 150 members.

CWHSNL: Peg reported on the Council meeting that was held in Waukesha on April 16, 1986. She noted that the GRMLN report was included in the WHSLA Newsletter.

The council decided to table the suggestion to add a health professional to the group until the September meeting.

The Council also decided to have consortium coordinators poll their membership as to their interest in including Wisconsin's two Resource Libraries in the State Union List for a higher purchase price; they are also being asked about the possibility of including BHSL's in the GRMLN List.

NEWSLETTER NOTES

Collection development funds will again be available through the Region. A State Council Committee must review the applications; Midge Wos, Peg Allen, and Barb Schmiechen will serve on our State Committee.

Deb Nordgren will serve as the new Council chairperson. Virginia Murphy will take Jay Kirkwood's place on the Council.

MC/MLA: Barb Schmiechen reported that MC/MLA is looking at how the representatives at large function. The annual meeting will be held in Chicago, October 22-25. The 1987 meeting will be held in Cleveland.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT: Susan Anderson thanked everyone who helped her during her term. She also made suggestions for the future. The recommendations are:

1. Priorities should be set for the future.
2. Committees should make use of the WHSLA Newsletter
3. A means should be devised to establish committee membership continuity.
4. Committee members should use their collective imaginations to try to come up with innovative ways to be in contact and to share the work included in their committee's charge.

NEW PRESIDENT: Linda Oddan, the new WHSLA President, thanked Susan Anderson for all of her hard work and also presented her with a baby gift.

ADJOURNMENT: The business meeting was adjourned at 6:40 p.m. A wine/cheese social followed.

At the recent Medical Library Association Annual Meeting in Minneapolis, I had the distinct impression that "everyone" is talking about costs and charges for library services. Although I did not attend the session, I overheard several librarians discussing a thought-provoking quote from the Hospital Library Colloquium. "Librarians are 'hung up' on free information--in a free society, there should be a free flow of information; not necessarily information-for-free". It seems all of us are facing the realities of escalating costs and the necessity of recovering some of those costs. At the roundtable Pricing Strategies for the Library--Fee for Service, Charge-Back System, most of the 20 or so librarians in the group admitted they could no longer offer all library services to patrons at no charge. In fact, one librarian insisted that part of the library's image problem is the fact that in our society people value only what they pay for.

Coincidentally, when I arrived back at my desk a new book had arrived entitled, Cost Analysis, Cost Recovery, Marketing, and Fee-Based Services: A Guide for the Health Sciences Librarian. M. Sandra Wood, Editor. NY, Haworth Press, 1985. In her introduction, the author points out that the retrieval of information is big business and libraries must compete in a "business-like" manner with commercial information brokers. This book offers practical advice especially in the areas of cost analysis and marketing of reference services.

WHSLA LEGISLATION COMMITTEE

Pressler Letter to FCC. Sen. Larry Pressler (R-SD), a member of the Senate Communications Subcommittee, has drafted a letter to FCC Chairman Mark Fowler on the continuing problems libraries face in connection with AT&T private line tariffs. He has circulated this letter to his Senate colleagues, and hopes to get at least as many Senate signatures within the next few weeks as cosigned his earlier letters on this subject. (In April 1984, 26 Senators joined his first letter, 27 cosigned in February 1985.)

The FCC is continuing to investigate the tariffs, which the Commission allowed to take effect in April 1985 with an average 20 percent increase for OCLC libraries. Since then, several incremental increases have been approved, raising library costs by about another 23 percent. The process of increases every few months has caused planning, paperwork, and cost problems for libraries. If such increases continue, rates will soon approach the original AT&T request for a 73 percent increase for OCLC libraries; that tariff proposal was found unlawful. Several Senators have written individually to the FCC recently on behalf of library constituents, and have been dissatisfied with the response. Sen. Pressler feels another joint letter is timely and may have more effect.

ACTION NEEDED: Please contact your own Senators immediately to urge them to sign the letter. Sen. Pressler's continued efforts on behalf of libraries deserve our support. The more Senate signatures on the letter, the greater its impact will be. (Library supporters in Washington, D.C., for the April 8 Legislative Day were able to take copies of the letter to Senate offices. It's important now to make additional contacts, and if you were in Washington, to follow up to make sure your Senator signed on.)
