Continuing education courses announced for the 1987 meeting are Health Information for the Layperson with Allan Rees, and Strategic Planning with Eugenie Prine.

The new bylaws and directory should be available by the end of the year.

WHSLA EXECUTIVE BOARD MEETING MINUTES

October 3, 1986
Green Bay, Wisconsin

The meeting was called to order by President Linda Oddan on Friday, October 3, 1986 at 10:16 at St. Vincent's Hospital, Green Bay.

The reading of the minutes from the May 20, 1986 Annual Meeting and the April 25, 1986 Executive Committee was dispensed with. The minutes were approved with several minor corrections.

Jan Curnes, Treasurer, reported that as of October 3, 1986 WHSLA has a balance of \$3609.27.

Committee Reports
1986 Program and Local Arrangements.
Forty-three people registered for the WHSLA Spring Meeting. About 50 attended. The bill from the Hyatt Hotel was approximately \$500.

Bylaws and Guidelines Committee
Bylaws revisions were passed by mail ballot. New revised bylaws will be mailed with directories.

Continuing Education Committee

CE classes for WHSLA Spring meeting will be Health Information for the Lay Person to be presented by Allen Rees, Case Western University, Cleveland and Planning-Strategic and Tactical by Eugenie Prine, Glendale Adventist Hospital, California. Stipends of \$200 plus expenses will be paid to each speaker. Fees will be \$60 for members and \$75 for nonmembers. Both will be full day programs. An Electronic Mail Workshop will also be offered for CE's. Barb Schmiechen will be contacted about the possibility of offering the Basic Library Management Course.

Legislation Committee

A discussion of the COLAND automation Committee papers was held. COLAND asked for a response to 13 issues. Linda Oddan passed these issues on to CWHSN for a response and sent a general response from WHSLA. The Legislative Committee was also asked to respond to COLAND. A Newsletter article discussing COLAND, WISCAT, etc. will be written by Margaret De Bruine. Peg Allen suggested that the Legislation Committee sponsor a session at the 1988 Annual Meeting to keep WHSLA members informed about legislative issues. Mary Blackwelder will attend WLA Legislative Day in February. Postage for urgent mailings is available so the Committee can keep us informed in a timely manner. NTIS has started to charge interest on overdue bills. Any one with billing discrepancies should call the management office.

Membership Committee

WHSLA currently has 128 members. A new membership list will be sent out at the end of October. Renewals will be sent in November and are due back by January 1. The committee will recommend action regarding the targeting of library technicians and non-health science librarians.

Planning Committee

The committee has been reviewing guidelines and soliciting input. Their goal is to complete the review before December. Peg Allen coordinated the guidelines with the newly revised bylaws. Mary Bayorgeon suggested that the committee emphasize long range planning and priorities after bylaws and guidelines revisions are completed.

Election Committee

Guidelines revisions are in progress. Nancy Campbell has been contacted for input. Revisions of election guidelines should be completed by the 1987 Annual Meeting.

Nominating Committee

Linda Oddan will be appointing two members. Midge Wos is a current member.

Online Users Committee

ETN programs include the Medline Update, Marketing, Government Documents, and Full Text. Twelve people have registered to date. The Online Consultants Directory is ready and will be mailed soon.

Newsletter Committee

The ad hoc Newsletter Committee will not be reappointed. More responsibility for newsletter input should be placed on Area Reps. Newsletter deadlines will be October 8, November 12, and January 7. Linda Oddan will send a reporting form to all reps every other month to solicit newsletter input. Al Zimmerman offered to report on WILS in the Newsletter.

1988 Annual Meeting

Margaret De Bruine has made arrangements for the meeting to be held at the Civic Center Inn in Eau Claire on April 28 and 29, 1988. Rooms will be \$40 single and \$46 double. She will contact the Minnesota Health Science Library organization to see if there is interest in co-sponsoring an annual meeting. It was suggested that Madison host the 1989 meeting.

Old Business

1. 1987 Annual Meeting registration will be \$50 for members, \$65 for nonmembers, and \$15 for students. The Board meeting will be held from 6 to 8 pm on Wednesday. The Council meeting will be held from 7 to 9 am on Friday. Registration will include a half day workshop for CE's, one lunch, two continental breakfasts, and a wine and cheese reception. The reception will precede entertainment at the Milwaukee Public Museum. Room rates at the Marc Plaza will be \$50 single and \$58 double. A motion was made by Jackie Glick and seconded by Peg Allen to ask Barb Schmiechen about offering Basic Library Management on the Saturday after the annual meeting. Up to \$200 honorarium and expenses will be available for a speaker. The motion was passed unanimously.

2. WHSLA is still exploring tax exempt status. Sharon Gebhardt has the forms. The goal is to have this accomplished by May 1987.

New Business

1. CWHSLN Report

The Council will strive to involve end users in the Council but will not appoint an end user as a Council member. Joy Shong has been authorized to have the Union List sorted by consortium for up to \$200.

Virginia Holtz was reelected as COWL representative. The MLA salary survey is available. Nominal group results will be in the WHSLA Newsletter.

Announcements

Dona Bowman and Joan Zweifel both retired and were sent honorary WHSLA membership. Betsy Merriam moved to Colorado. A new DLS representative must be appointed to WHSLA and the Council.

The meeting adjourned at 1:00 pm.

A fall meeting was held and a decision was made to create a committee to plan for the future of South Central. The people on that planning committee are Pat Craven, St. Marys Hospital Library; Robert Koehler, Methodist Hospital Library; Joan Muellenbach, Madison General Medical Library; and Margaret Peters, St. Clare's Hospital Library, Monroe. They will be reporting to the Consortium members at a spring meeting.

NLM'S 150TH ANNIVERSARY

The year is ending that has marked NLM's 150th anniversary. Many events both at the National Library of Medicine in Bethesda, MD and throughout the country have celebrated the year. The recognition of that anniversary in the midwest will be this month when RML 3 hosts an exhibit and a Nakata lecture by Dr. Donald Lindberg. This will be held in conjunction with the Regional Advisory Council November 21-22 in Chicago.

PEOPLE

MICHELE JACQUES and BARBARA SCHMIECHEN will be presenters at an ETN for Physical Therapist on December 4. They will be discussing library services for physical therapists focusing on the use of local resources and the networking aspect of Wisconsin health sciences library services.

Wisconsin librarians had several opportunities to attend conferences in Chicago. MC/MLA was well represented by the eastern seaboard of Wisconsin from both Fox River and Milwaukee areas. Online 1986 was also in Chicago and a number of librarians from Wisconsin were present. Both Conferences were of high calibre.

WHSLA LEGISLATION COMMITTEE

1) National Health Planning and Resource Development Act. Congress failed to reauthorize funding for the National Health Planning and Resource Development Act, thereby bringing to a close 12 years of federal funding for state and local health planning agencies. The AMA supported health planning program provided federal regulation over capital expenditures by health facilities. In Wisconsin, three health planning agencies remain open, however two face closure within six months. Southeastern Wisconsin Health Systems Agency has no immediate plans to close.

2) Government Information Act of 1986 (H.R.5412) This bill was introduced to the House of Representatives in August. It calls for the establishment of the Government Information Agency as self-sustaining, independent entity, designed to enhance the economic, scientific and technological position of the United States in acquiring, processing and selling the results of federally-sponsored or federally performed research, development or analysis. The GIA would subsume NTIS and the information sales portions of the Department of Defense, Energy, NASA, and the Government Printing Office. A public hearing is being planned for early 1987. Opinions and concerns about this should be directed to -

SWHSL DOCLINE INSTRUCTIONS

BEFORE YOU LOGON, THINK ABOUT THE FOLLOWING:

... the request is for a pre-1975 journal, verify a SWHSL library holding the correct volume, to use as an override.

If the request is for a journal where few SWHSL libraries have complete holdings, do not route multiple times in the first 2 calls of the routing table. If it is widely held, you can override up to 10 times in each of first 2 cells, but why make 20 libraries look at a request that only 2 or 3 have.

If you don't have Medline UI, Serline UI is included in Wisconsin Biomedical Union List as well as in NLM's List of Journals Indexed, GRMLN list, etc.

You will probably have to use MCW's code as an override to get Children's Journals.

If you don't want to pay for the article, and it is not widely available in SWHSL, its going to float through the resource libraries, until one erroneously fills and charges you for article, until your Not Needed After date has been reached, or until it reaches NLM and is rejected.

Since SWHSL put both Middleton & MCW in same cell, Middleton is getting swamped with requests MCW could fill. If not available in SWHSL, and you know MCW has it, use MCW's code as override to save Middleton.

DOCLINE does not screen routing of article by charges, so you are depending on filling library to check that charges are within your budget.

If the journal title is not listed in Wisconsin Biomedical Union List of Serials, and is not held at Middleton or MCW, Docline will probably not fill for a charge of less than \$5.00. If title is not in Serline, you will not fill in DOCLINE.

Journal request is non-medical, you may be better off using ALA form to local universities.

*L will log you off the system from anywhere.

To bypass DOCLINE routing

if you:

1. want to change, for that request only, the monograph routing table you previously filled out, or if you never filled out the monograph routing table.
2. know only 1-4 libraries in consortium with needed issue & don't want request to leave the area.
3. do not want automatic routing to take over and send to library that charges.

The following example shows how to bypass the system. By not giving DOCLINE a recognizable Serline identifier, it can not route within the long table and moves request into the 4 library table that you set up for monograph routing.

If you answer monograph to type(j,m,a) question, it will also put you into your 4 library monograph table. You can either stay with your 4 chosen libraries or bypass with 4 other codes.

If none of the 4 local libraries can fill, request will still go to NLM.

The following list of codes will help you convert from the 3 letter code to the libid. We don't guarantee that all the libraries are using DOCLINE.

Other Hints

EDIT (pp 25-6 in manual)
Enter *P. This will display your request with line numbers. To change data entered, enter line number followed by /(slash) followed by new data. Do not space between the slash and the corrected data.

If the record is very wrong, you may cancel the entire request by entering *E.

HIGH SPEED DATA ENTRY (pp. 27-9 of manual)
In order to use this, you must know the order of the fields and the default values for each field.

NOTE: Do not use any slashes in your data field, i.e. Jul/Aug. The system will assume slash means high speed entry and skip to the next field.

RECEIPT (pp. 30-2 of manual)
After all the requests have been printed, you will have 3 options. In order for the receipt to be completed and the system updated, you must eventually select
OPTION 1-ALL Printouts OK

LEND (pp. 33-4 in manual)
Stack FILLS by entering several Request Nos. separated by slashes.

Stack REJS by using:
Reason/RequestNo/Reason/RequestNo/Reason/RequestNo

If you are getting requests for a journal you don't own, check your entry in the UNION LIST-- it may need to be corrected.

Requests as printed out from DOCLINE will fold so that requesting library address will show in a window envelope. It may be most efficient to make a copy of each request, one to send back to requestor in window envelope, and one to keep for your records, first to update as filled in DOCLINE, then for monthly statistics.

If you reject as incorrect citation, the requesting library is only notified by using Status function. Be sure citation is incorrect, because you are killing it. It might be nice to return a copy of incorrect request to library so they are aware that it is dead.

STATUS (pp 35-8 in the manual)

This function is used to display an individual request routing history, to display all outstanding requests as lender, or to display outcome of all input ill requests.

If NOT appears in Reason column, your request will not be filled.
