COUNCIL ELECTION RESULTS

Election results for the Council of Wisconsin Health Sciences Library Network election have been announced.

TELEFAX FACTS

Waukesha Memorial Hospital Medical Library installed a Sharp FO-600 telefacsimile machine in March 1987. The machine is available to all hospital departments, but has been used most by public relations and administration. PR uses the machine to send proofs to and from local and out-of-town advertising agencies. Administration uses it to send and receive material from our law firm. Purchasing is able to send purchase orders to vendors.

The library is the lightest user, but it has been valuable in emergency situations. It is also nice having the machine in a public area of the library, rather than tucked away in an administrative office.

Expense beyond the \$1500-2000 for buying the machine is minimal. Most sources are in agreement that a maintenance contract for the machine is unnecessary, since the machines are quite dependable. This telefax uses heat sensitive paper (like that used in Texas Instruments computer terminals). Paper for this year will cost less than \$300. Some telefax machines can use plain paper. The other major expense is phone charges. The telefax should have a separate phone line, and long distance charges will mount up if you are using out of city suppliers.

NLM News

DOCLINE

NLM has announced that there will be no DOCLINE charges in the foreseeable future. The announcement was made by Donald Lindberg, Director of NLM as follows-

"It is the Congressional intent and the NLM mission to provide the most effective medical services to our Nations's health professionals. The NLM development of the DOCLINE system in conjunction with the biomedical library community is a major achievement.

This cooperative initiative has already resulted in improved document delivery to the health community. In appreciation of your efforts and to ensure the continued success of the development, NLM will not institute a DOCLINE charge now or in the foreseeable future."

Approximately 1,450 libraries are part of the DOCLINE system.

NLM ILL Charges

Beginning April 1, 1988 NLM will increase their interlibrary loan charges by \$2.00 making their charges \$7.00 per filled. This is the first price increase since 1983.

NLM International Centers

A Chinese MEDLARS Center has opened in Beijing, the 16th foreign MEDLARS Center to be established by NLM. The first one became operational 21 years ago at the University of Newcastle-upon-Tyne in England. Other foreign centers are located in Australia, Brazil, Canada, Columbia, Egypt, France, Germany, Italy, Japan, Kuwait, Mexico, South Africa, Sweden, and Switzerland.

HEALTH SCIENCES LIBRARIANS TESTIFY

Channel DLS quoted several health sciences librarians in the November 1987 issue as they testified at the hearings on the "State Superintendent's Report on Interlibrary Cooperation and Resource Sharing" held at Marshfield on September 25. Comments from both Al Zimmermann and Margaret Allen were included in the article on the support for multitype cooperation. Those librarians commented on the strong use of their libraries by various user groups and the need for immediate access to information in the health sciences field.

RML NETWORK MEMBERSHIP

The RML Network has been in existence for the past 20 years and within this year NLM plans to formally register its members. Within the next month materials should come to you via the GMRMLN Office giving you the opportunity to indicate your active participation in the nation-wide network of health sciences libraries.

Membership is open to those libraries and information centers that make their collections of materials open to health professionals and students. Libraries of any size may want to show their participation in the RML Network by registering when the packet arrives on your desk.

FCC PROPOSED ACCESS CHARGES

At this time no word has been received in regard to the FCC proposal to eliminate enhanced service providers as exempt from access fees. Enhanced Service Providers are the online database services that rely upon telephone communications to transmit their services. The new proposal would have taken effect January 1, 1988. This would greatly increase the telecommunication charges for online searching. Some sources cited potential increases of 30-60%.
