HEALTH SCIENCES PROFESSIONAL NEEDS ASSESSMENT

One of the Regional emphasis is for State Councils to develop some way of determining health professionals information needs. The Council for Wisconsin Health Sciences Library Network at their September meeting asked each consortium to provide feedback from three libraries in their area with strong library users or a library committee to do a modified nominal group exercise in needs assessment. Margaret Allen had volunteered to synthesize the responses and report them to the region. The deadline for the responses was March 1, but that deadline has been extended to April 1. Consortium coordinators are asked to coordinate this effort in order for a Wisconsin response to be made to GMRMLN. The focus questions to be addressed to the three groups in each consortium are as follows.

Who are the health professionals?

- Definitions
- Where do they work
- Do different types of health professionals have different information needs

Access

- What are the information gathering habits of health professionals.
- Do they seek information outside of their hospital library? What is the best way for you as a health professional to obtain medical information
- In what ways can an information network join together to help the health professional in meeting his/her information needs.
- How can the non-urban health professionals be assisted in keeping up with the information overflow.

Use of Information

- How do health professional use information
- What kinds/types of information is most useful to health professionals. Are there some kinds of information that are not currently available to you.

Computers and Information

- What do you think of end user searching, i. e. the health professional as an online searcher.
- How to you use the computer in your practice.
- How else do you use the computer
- Did you use a computer as a medical education tool.

Cost of Information

- What are you thoughts on the cost of information.
- How much value do you put on information and access to information.

GMRMLN ADVISORY COUNCIL NEWS

GREATER MIDWEST REGIONAL MEDICAL LIBRARY NETWORK
REGIONAL COUNCIL MEETING REPORT

The Regional Council met December 7, 1987 at the University of Illinois at Chicago, Library of the Health Sciences - this was my last meeting as your state representative. Please read the following as supplement to the information you should have received in 3 Sources, February 1988 - in particular, Irwin Pizer's RML Director's Report on the front page.

The following topics were discussed at the Regional Council meeting on December 7th:

RML Director's Report - Irwin Pizer: The Region contract renewal, Management Office staffing problems, and the upcoming NLM debriefing were discussed - see 3 Sources for a report of the debriefing. Many of the issues discussed at the Regional Meeting were in preparation for his visit, along with Ruby May, to NLM for the debriefing.

Videos: Two videos available on loan from the Management Office are "Slow Fires: On the Preservation of the Human Record" and "The Regional Medical Library Program", produced by Region 5.

GMRMLN Union List of Serials: Problems relating to the viability of the union list produced at Louisville were discussed. These include decreasing sales/increasing costs, availability of other means, such as OCLC, for Regional Libraries to submit their holding to SERHOLD, and the fact that all but the most recent records are in Level X format, instead of Level 3 as required for the most efficient use of DOCLINE. Annelie Sober expressed the Minnesota State Council's support for converting the Louisville records to Level 3 (ANSC format); the Council Chair, P. Swanson, suggested that if reallocation of funds within the contract was possible, conversion of union list records should take precedence over other RML programs. I. Pizer agreed to pose this question at the NLM debriefing - in his report of the meeting, you will note that "a number of regions were facing the same problem and that NLM was considering how this problem might be solved on a national level."

IAIMS at the University of Cincinnati: Roger Vervy conducted a slide presentation on the IAIMS project, which was very instructive regarding the type of activity beyond the library involved in an IAIMS project. Points he stressed include gathering broad-based support, planning, use of political skills, and starting small.

FAX Update: Ruby May reported that the 1987 GMRMLN FAX Directory is now available from the region - see 3 Sources - the order form inside the back cover also includes the 1987 GMRMLN ULS. Our region has the greatest number of Resource Libraries with Fax capability. NLM is producing a videotape featuring the RML's - the Region 3 segment will include a simulation of the use of telefacsimile to transmit library document from NLM during a clinical emergency that occurred at Mercy Health Center in Dubuque, Iowa. Many libraries may have access to telefacsimile equipment in another office - you may wish to check with your administration.

Collection Development: Chris Millson-Martula reported on Collection Development activities. The first round of the conspectus project was almost completed. The Collection Development Committee made recommendations for awarding this year's collection development funds based on the data from the conspectus project. The \$25,000 will be used to purchase 14 journals not available in the Region that have been heavily borrowed from NLM in the last 2 1/2 years (\$8,000), and the rest for journals and monographs in the major subject weakness identified by the conspectus project: health administration. (In the February 3 Sources, you will note that Wisconsin's only basic unit participant, Gunderson/Lutheran Medical Center, LaCrosse, was awarded \$1600 for 3 journals and 6 monographs.) Data from the most recent NLM report on serial titles requested by Region 3 libraries indicated a 40% increase for the titles which will be funded, and an October 1987 study of DOCLINE ILL requests that were sent out of the region on the first route did not show any weaknesses that were not identified by the conspectus.

Following presentation of a plan for a Serials Commitment Registry focusing on journal titles held by two or less libraries according to the GMRMLN ULS, the Regional Council recommended the plan to seek commitment to these titles by at least one of the holding libraries. The purpose of the plan is to maintain resources at their present level in this era of increasing costs, with resulting decreases in subscriptions.

As a result of only 50% participation by resource libraries and negative survey results, it was recommended that the Serials Added List that had been published as a 3 Sources insert over the last two years be suspended indefinitely.

C. Millson-Martula also reported on the Technology Applications Survey which had a high response rate and indicated a high level of interest in integrated library systems. A summary of results will be reported in 3 Sources, and he plan to develop a matrix of the top five brands of integrated systems.

DOCLINE: Kim Goldnan reported on DOCLINE enhancements as announced at MLA. Iowa basic unit libraries are submitting holdings to SERHOLD and will be eligible for DOCLINE participation this year.

Consortia/Local Groups: A survey of interest in a consortia/local groups meeting adjacent to MC/MLA in 1988 had 80 responses, mostly favorable. Due to NLM policy, such a meeting would require 100% cost recovery, making planning difficult. Topics of interest included new technology, grants, and union list options. The council discussed the status of consortia today, and potential mechanisms for examination of current needs and future directions for consortia.

NLM's RML Network Participation Registry: Ruby May presented information on NLM's plans to identify and recognize network participants via a registry program. Participants will receive a certificate suitable for framing naming them as a network participant, as well as the usual network benefits we have been receiving - including regional and NLM newsletters, opportunity for input into RML programs and services, and guaranteed access to RML interlibrary loan services. Please return the survey form which you should have received early in March by the March 25 deadline.

State Council Representatives

The state council representatives met in the afternoon, following the Regional Council meeting. The first issue discussed was State Council affiliation with state health science library organizations, which I raised in relation to WHSLA and Wisconsin Council planning related to some type of a merger. All present were interested in this issue; each presented how state councils function in their state. Some were remarkably informal. The state council in Illinois functions under the "umbrella" of the state association, a model that sounded most attractive to the eight representatives present. Their bylaws were to have been forwarded to the region for distribution to the state representatives.

Discussion of the proposed GMRMLN Serials Exchange quickly turned into a discussion of developing some kind of an automated want list as had been discussed at the fall Wisconsin Council meeting. All present agreed that the time frame for producing merged exchange lists at state and regional levels would prevent libraries from participating, as exchange items need to be cleared as quickly as possible.

This is my personal report of the meetings, and is thus filtered by my impressions and concerns. If you would like more information, please contact me, your resource library director, or the Management Office. We are all interested in your input.
