WHSLA LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE

The Legislation Committee met by conference call Friday, August 26 to discuss our response to COLAND's recommendations regarding state Library Automation Funding and Multitype Library Cooperation. On September 1, 1988 I had the opportunity of presenting our conclusions at the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction Division for Library Services' hearing in Wausau. This was one of three hearings held around the state to gather input on these two COLAND issues and the interim report of the Task Force on Public Library Legislation and Funding. All Wisconsin libraries should have received a notice of these hearings, with a form for requesting copies of the three reports. The reports can still be requested, and written testimony may be sent to Leslyn M. Shires, Assistant State Superintendent, DPI/DLS, P.O. Box 7841, Madison, WI 53707. A copy of my testimony follows this report.

Other than division staff, most individuals present were from public libraries/systems or public library boards. All who spoke were in general agreement with the reports - they were, of course, most interested in the public library report which recommends establishment of public library districts for providing library services according to service patterns, which often do not match political boundaries. Such districts would have the power to tax - much of the funding would come from state, not local sources, and this would be a form of property tax relief. Some specific concerns regarding the language(definitions, etc.) of the various reports were raised. One speaker was concerned that school libraries would be unwilling to share resources via interlibrary loan, due to curriculum demands. Many stated that they had not had enough time to review the reports and discuss them with their boards. The total hearing took less than an hour, with added opportunity to socialize with DLS staff before and after. Leslyn commented that she was impressed with WHSLA's ability to respond in a timely fashion - "You people always have your act together". Thanks are due to Cindy Reini for being alert and getting us going on this issue while Mary Kotschi was on maternity leave.

You will note that I spoke only on behalf of the committee - time did not permit involving the board and membership. If you have any comments or concerns, please direct them to Mary Kotschi, myself, or another member of the Legislation Committee.

MARGARET ALLEN'S STATEMENT TO DPI/DLS

Thank you for for the opportunity to speak regarding state funding for library initiatives. I am speaking on behalf of the Legislation Committee of the Wisconsin Health Science Library Association (WHSLA). WHSLA is the state organization of health science librarians. Most members work in hospitals, clinics, and academic medical centers; we also have members in special and academic libraries with health science interests. We would like to address the COLAND issue papers on Multitype Library Cooperation and Library Automation funding. In general, we endorse the recommendations of both of these issue papers.

Multitype Library Cooperation

Our committee endorses the Legislative Proposal presented in the Multitype Library Cooperation issue paper. We believe that health science libraries and their patrons would benefit from participation in area multitype systems. In particular, we see benefits in the areas of interlibrary loan agreements among all participating libraries, enhanced opportunities for inservice training at the area level, and support for system-wide/statewide union databases. We are pleased to see incentives for public library systems that wish to become multitype systems to market their proposals to all types of libraries. Those of us in areas where the public library system serves all libraries believe in these benefits; we have difficulty selling this concept to librarians in areas where the public library system has not demonstrated an interest in multitype concerns.

With respect to interlibrary loan services, we feel that loan patterns should encourage borrowing directly from holding libraries rather than exclusive reliance on the clearinghouse approach. This is particularly important for access to Journal articles. Health science libraries rely heavily on Journals for access to current information - in many cases, this is the key to the most effective treatment of patient's problems. While the biomedical network is very efficient in meeting most of these needs, health scientists are becoming more interdisciplinary and require rapid access to all fields of knowledge. Our only concern with the proposal is that union listing of serials is not a visible priority. We strongly believe that the Wisconsin Union List of Serials (WULS) must be maintained as the system-wide/statewide union list of serials, as well as maintaining WISCAT. It is our understanding that many state libraries, including some of the largest academics, have not maintained/updated their holdings in this list. Access to a current, valid union list of serials is critical in the current health science environment. We would like to see the proposal for Multitype Library Cooperation amended to clearly support union listing of serials.

Funding for Statewide Library Automation

We agree with the COLAND issue paper position that statewide automation projects should be funded from state, not LSCA, funding. Many of our libraries benefit from WISCAT participation; we were disturbed to learn that funding has prohibited participation by all interested libraries. With state funding, it should be easier to encourage more special library participation in WISCAT. We were pleased to learn that partial funding of CD-ROM equipment for all participating libraries was part of the proposal. We see CD-ROM technology as having many applications for improved library services in health science libraries - not just access to the statewide database - and feel that state support for the necessary equipment would be extremely beneficial. We also agree that direct funding of local automation systems should not be a state funding priority.

As with the proposal for Multitype Library Cooperation, we are concerned about the lack of support for the Wisconsin Union List of Serials (WULS). We believe that state level financial support is necessary to ensure that all libraries, large and small, maintain their holdings in this list, even when the effort may duplicate a local online serials system. Establishment of various local systems - each with their own protocol for access - is counterproductive to the efforts of the small library looking for the most rapid route to access statewide holdings.

In conclusion, we basically endorse the COLAND issue papers on Multitype Library Cooperation and Funding for Statewide Library Automation. Our only concern is the lack of explicit continuing support for a statewide union database of serials that would facilitate the rapid interloan of current journal literature.

WISCAT ON CD-ROM AT ST. ELIZABETH HOSPITAL, APPLETON

For the past three months, St. Elizabeth Hospital has served as one of seventeen test sites for the WISCAT on CD-ROM study being conducted by the Division for Library Services. Following a training session in May held at the Manitowoc Public Library, Karen Knorr, my library technician, and I have been experimenting with using the compact disk version of WISCAT, the statewide database of library holdings, for a number of library purposes.

A variety of equipment is being tested at different sites to help the Division assess and recommend equipment configurations at the end of the testing project. We are using our own microcomputer equipment - an IBM-XT with Tandon monitor and Okidata printer. The Division has provided three Hitachi CD-ROM drives on loan, the Le Pac program software, and the three compact disks containing the data.

Field testing of the equipment and program was designed to provide information on equipment problems, training, and documentation, screen displays, indexes, holdings data, search times, system performance and interlibrary loan operation.

We recently completed an evaluation form based on our experience to date. Although the present version isn't perfect, we think that using WISCAT on CD-ROM is superior to searching the microfiche format. It was especially useful to us in retrospective conversion of our holdings for entry in Mitinet. We also used it for interlibrary loan information and for cataloging difficult items, especially non-medical books that are outside NLM classification.

The program includes an interlibrary loan form that can be filled in, printed and mailed. Some libraries are testing downloading this information for use with area electronic bulletin boards.

Some of the disadvantages of the system are the very slow response time for some types of searches and the need for expensive, multiple CD-ROM drives to run the program.

We have demonstrated the program to members of the Fox River Valley Area Library Consortium and to other interested librarians in the Fox Valley area. Please call us at 414-738-2325 if you have any questions about the project or if you would like to arrange to see the system in operation.
