Peg Allen reports on several new and upcoming developments:

CINAHL on CD ROM. We've been asked to be a test site for the CINAHL CD ROM, tentatively scheduled for June.

OCLC Interlibrary Loan. Since February, we've been accessing OCLC for interlibrary loan via the Wisconsin GAC (Group Access Capability). We use OCLC Terminal software on an IBM AT. The system is excellent, especially for monographs.

Columbia Library System. We've purchased an integrated library system and are loading WISCAT records to create our database. Circulation is now by barcode. The system prints labels and cards, although we plan to close the card catalog as soon as the workstation for the online Public Access Catalog is approved.

WISCONSIN TASK FORCE ON RECRUITING LIBRARY PROFESSIONALS

This task force was developed from an ALA Preconference on Recruiting Library Professionals: Each One Reach One. The purpose of the conference was to give ideas and strategic plan concepts for recruitment programs at the state, local, and institutional levels. The Wisconsin Library Association, through its various divisions, put together this task force that will look at library recruitment in Wisconsin. Since I was a member of the Special Libraries Division, I was asked to participate and Mary Bayorgeon was named as an alternate. The following presents the goals, priorities, and objectives of the Task Force.

Goal Statement: The Goal of the Wisconsin Task Force on Recruiting Library Professionals is the continuing recruitment of the best and the brightest people for librarianship.

Priority Areas Under This Goal: 1. Image - Librarians need to recruit people with high scholastic achievement plus good interpersonal skills. 2. Minority Recruiting - Librarians need to recruit an ethnically diverse pool of applicants. 3. Recruiting in special areas - Librarians need to focus some recruiting efforts in special areas, i.e., children's services, cataloging and technical services, and subject areas like science, math, business.

Objectives Under the Priority Areas: 1. Inform the Library Community of the need for ongoing recruiting. 2. Inform the public of what we are as professionals. 3. Change perceptions among career advising and placement counselors. 4. Recruit students at an early age into careers in librarianship. 5. Recruit minorities into careers in librarianship.

REPORT AND TESTIMONY FROM WHSLA LEGISLATION COMMITTEE

The Legislation Committee met by conference call, along with Cindy Reini and Mary Bayorgeon, on March 23 to discuss our response to the Study of Interlibrary Loan and Reference Referral Services in the State of Wisconsin. On March 29, I presented our opinions at a hearing held in Appleton by COLAND. The hearing was sparsely attended, with only two other individuals present besides myself. I spoke only on behalf of the Committee since there was not time to take the issue to the Executive Board. The following is the testimony which was presented.

Thank you for the opportunity of speaking to you today regarding the Study of Interlibrary Loan and Reference Referral Services in the State of Wisconsin. Having once served on this Council, I feel privileged to come before you today. I am speaking on behalf of the Legislation Committee of the Wisconsin Health Science Library Association (WHSLA). WHSLA is the state organization of health science librarians. Most of our members work in hospitals, clinics, and academic medical centers; although we also have members in special and academic libraries with health science interests.

We are pleased to see that special libraries were included in this study. We are sorry that some special libraries did not respond to the survey. We felt the statistics presented by the study are both fascinating and useful. The report contains much pertinent information.

On the other hand, we felt the conclusions of this report are weak. None of the options presented were very innovative. We also felt the direct borrower was ignored in the survey. The report failed to mention DOCLINE, the major interlibrary loan network for the health science libraries as well as failed to explore the integration of the various networks that now exist.

I would like to focus for a minute on the improved hybrid system option discussed in the report. This option assumes that libraries that initiate over 1,000 interlibrary loan requests per year would use WISCAT on CD-ROM and go direct to the library that owns the material. It further assumes that libraries that initiate fewer than 1,000 ILL requests would go through a clearinghouse. This is an overgeneralized approach for an interlibrary loan system. It is not at all clear what libraries would go to what clearinghouse. It is assumed that WISCAT on CD-ROM would generate more work in a small library. We disagree. We feel it would make us more efficient and more productive. The rule of 1,000 only covers one end, that is, what is borrowed. It doesn't take into consideration what we lend. We represent libraries with highly specialized resources. Many of us lend more than we borrow. It is not only cost effective for us to go directly to other libraries, it is imperative because of timeliness involved in the clinical setting. When a "clearinghouse" is talked about, are we talking about only one? Would the state, according to this option, only assist larger libraries in obtaining WISCAT on CD-ROM? Would the state only assist the clearinghouse? Without WISCAT, it is sometimes difficult to know what specific item is needed.

Another area that seemed unclear is the issue of compensation for net lenders. A clarification of exactly who that includes is in order. What would happen to current charging structure?

Finally, we were disappointed to see that the study completely ignored the role of serials in interlibrary loan. Serials are most important for the special library. We believe that state level financial support is necessary to ensure that all libraries, large and small, maintain their holdings in this list, even when the effort may duplicate a local online serials system. We need to continue a strong statewide data base of serials.

In conclusion, we believe the Study of Interlibrary Loan and Reference Referral Services in the State of Wisconsin is a good start. However, there seems to be a need for further study and action. Again, thank you for allowing me to speak with you today.

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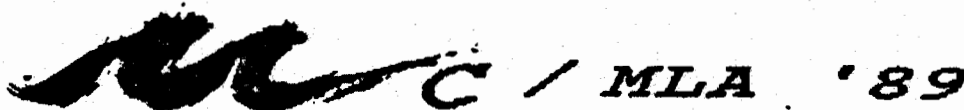
