MINUTES

PRESENT

CALL TO ORDER

Robert Koehler called the meeting to order at 7:08am. Robert is the outgoing chair. He agreed to chair this meeting until a new chair would be elected at the end of this meeting. Introductions were made. The reading of the minutes was dispensed with. Copies of the minutes for both the April 12, 1989 meeting as well as the October 27, 1988 were distributed.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Joanne Muellenbach reported that the current balance is (roughly) \$900. Since there has been no sale of serials lists, there has been no income. It was agreed that \$300 would be sent to Middleton Health Sciences Library for the COWL repayment. After this payment, the balance owed Middleton will be \$304. Virginia Holtz stated that the remaining balance should be forgiven, since the Council debt is so old. Virginia's offer was warmly accepted by the Council. Therefore, the \$300 payment which was authorized today will be considered as the final payment, and there will be no more debt to Middleton.

STATE UNION LIST REPORT

Discussion of the Union List question was postponed until later in the agenda.

GMRMLN REPORT

Joanne Muellenbach briefly reported on the July 10-11, 1989 Regional Advisory Council meeting which took place in Chicago. She noted her report which appeared in the September Newsletter which described the discussion groups reaction to NLM's Outreach Panel Report. Virginia Holtz added that the Region is solvent in regards to the number of people who have joined the Louisville Union List. The serials list committee is back to looking into the regional options to the Louisville entry. Virginia also mentioned the Regional Advisory Council's plan to respond to the NLM Initiative which has been distributed by NLM.

WHSLA REPORT

Vicki Schluge recapped the WHSLA Board's meeting from the previous night. Most notably, there were some by-law changes which were approved, the Northern and Western Consortia have merged to form the Northwestern Consortium, and that there is a consideration to reduce

the number of area representatives and representatives-at-large which will be discussed at the Board's Spring meeting.

CONSORTIA REPORTS

Fox River—Cindy Reini reported on their July 7 meeting which included a CE presentation on disaster planning. A representative from the State Historical Society of Wisconsin discussed what to do in case of fire, flood, etc. Their next meeting is scheduled in November.

Northwestern—Al Zimmermann confirmed that the the Northern and Western Consortia have indeed merged to form the Northwestern. Rita Sieracki who was the Consortium chair resigned in September. Al took over from the position of chair-elect.

South Central—Pat Craven reported that their consortium held an emergency meeting on August 7 to discuss the OCLC conversion question. Joy Shong and Vicki Schluge came to Madison for the discussion. South Central voted to convert to OCLC. Their next meeting will be Spring, 1990.

SWHSL—Terry Bochte stated that SWHSL has decided to go with OCLC, and members are in the midst of the conversion process. The Consortium met on September 8 and discussed the DLS Multitype legislative proposal (see agenda item below). No action was taken by SWHSL regarding the requested endorsement. The Dean of MCW spoke on the Health Information Technology Center. Their next meeting is scheduled for December.

RESOURCE LIBRARIES REPORTS

Medical College of Wisconsin—Patrick Brennen discussed the upcoming HITC concept, including the IAIMS concept and the Libraries involvement. MCW now has 2 subscriptions to CD Plus, one available through the College's mainframe for dial-up access. MCW has also purchased Science Citation Index on CD-Rom, as well as a disk version of Current Contents. There is a plan for the library to move to a new building, but that is at least five years away.

UW Center for Health Sciences Libraries—Virginia Holtz discussed some of the campus wide activities which the Libraries are involved in, including experimentation with text management database systems which could be available for statewide use. The Middleton library is a participant in a recently awarded FAX grant from HEA. CD-Rom use of Cambridge is at a maximum, with two stations located at both libraries.

SERIALS LIST CONVERSION TO OCLC

Joy Shong reported on the results of the survey which she had mailed to Serials lists participants in August. Basically, the response from libraries was that the conversion to OCLC should proceed, provided that that was the consensus from the state members. Joy reported that there was some additional news from WILS regarding the status of the inactive OCLC profile codes. The codes are currently not attached to WULS listings; to attach them will cost about \$35 each. It is a requirement that the codes be attached to WULS in order to produce the serials list. This additional \$35 will be applied only to those codes for libraries which already have existing, inactive codes. Codes for new profiles for libraries which have never been assigned an OCLC code should cost an approximate \$83. (The difference is the cost for creating a new code and profile; libraries which already have a code have already had this fee paid through the COWL grant of many years ago.) In summary, libraries which have active codes in OCLC will have no additional fee charged, libraries which have inactive codes will have the \$35 fee charged, and new libraries which have had no previous code at all will have the \$83 fee charged. These fees do not include the standard charge for the conversion of titles, which will be assessed on a per library basis depending upon how many titles each library must convert. Joy will be working on sorting out the status of all the codes (who has them, and whether or not they are active). Joy will also be preparing a statement of charges which will be assessed for each participating library. Each participating library will receive notification from Joy regarding their charges. WILS is requesting a list of intended participants by October 13, 1989. Total cost for codes is estimated to be about \$2500. This is based on the participation of 72 libraries.

Joy also mentioned two other items regarding the serials list. Libraries which have existing listings will have all of their holdings appear on the Biomedical List, not just their health-related titles. Also, state agency libraries catalog their holdings through a group of their own, and there may be some difficulty in separating out the health agencies.

The Council's final decision was to formally proceed with the conversion of the state's biomedical serials list from the former method of entry to SERHOLD through Louisville to the new method of entry through OCLC. Joy will make sure that WILS will place priorities of conversion on the DOCLINE libraries, so that their participation in SERHOLD will not be jeopardized. There are still decisions to be made regarding the creation of the paper/microfiche list, the charges involved in producing it, and the cost of the final product.

CHAIR ELECTION

Robert Koehler called for nominations/volunteers for Council Chair. Terry Bochte from Curative Rehabilitation Center was elected as Chair. His term will expire at the end of the Spring, 1991 Council meeting. Thus, the election and term will be back on schedule. (Guidelines state that the chair shall be elected in the Spring by the Council membership and shall serve for one year. Robert had consented to continue to serve as chair through this election.) It was agreed that the Chair should continue in office even if his/her term on the Council would normally end during the year as Chair.

COWL REPRESENTATIVE

Virginia Holtz stated that her term is over as the COWL representative. She was willing to continue as representative, and was unanimously re-elected as the COWL representative for the Council.

MULTITYPE LIBRARY COOPERATION

The Division for Library Service will be sending a representative to the WHSLA Business meeting to present the Division's "Legislative Proposal for Multitype Library Cooperation at the System Level." Kay Ihlenfeldt from DLS will be seeking endorsement for the proposal, which has so far met with some concerns from the Health Sciences consortia.

ADJOURNMENT

The meeting was adjourned at 9:00am.
